I, Member A, hereby declare and state as follows:

1. I am over eighteen years old, and I have personal knowledge of the facts set forth in this Declaration. I could and would testify competently to those facts if called to be a witness in this case.

2. I am a parent member of Family Forward Oregon, a non-profit organization that organizes and empowers Oregon mothers and caregivers to fight for racial, gender, and economic justice, including access to affordable and quality childcare for all Oregon families.

3. I am a resident of Portland, Oregon, and a mother of three children between the ages of three and six.

4. My three-year-old daughter is currently enrolled in a Head Start program in
Oregon.

5. When I first moved to Oregon about two years ago, I couldn't afford childcare here because the cost of living was so high. I was relieved when I was finally able to get my daughter placed in Head Start.

6. Head Start has given my daughter the ability to develop her self-identity and confidence. She now has a stronger sense of independence and is more eager to take on tasks on her own. Now, when I ask her if she needs help with a big task, she says, "I've got this!"

7. Since joining Head Start, my daughter has been able to develop her skills to advocate for herself amongst her peers and adults in her life. She is able to experience what it's like to be around different personalities of other kids and adults, and learn to build resiliency and adaptability in different settings. Because of Head Start, she has learned to stand up for herself, to communicate what she needs to the people around her, and to better handle conflict with other kids.

8. My daughter also has developed her fine and gross motor skills in ways that working parents can't feasibly help with. For example, she has access to Head Start care providers who do things with her that help build those skills, such as making slime, playing

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with sand, building letters and numbers with macaroni noodles, creating art, and other activities.

9. In Head Start, my daughter gets to be more creative and exploratory because she has care providers who have the skills, training, time, and patience to do those activities with her. Working parents don't have that luxury, because they are so focused on keeping their families financially stable and sound.

10. Because of Head Start, my daughter is even learning a new language. My daughter is in a bilingual early education environment, and she has been learning Spanish and picking up on it really fast. She loves learning Spanish. She understands her teachers when they give directions in Spanish and often helps other kids by translating for them.

11. Access to Head Start has also encouraged my daughter to try new healthy foods that she wouldn't normally try at home, including broccoli and other vegetables. Seeing her Head Start classmates try new foods makes her more interested in trying them too.

12. Head Start has given my daughter the chance to explore her gifts, and she is now advanced for her age in many ways. When we meet new people, they don't believe that my daughter is really only three years old because she is so smart and able to relate to the world in ways beyond her years. It makes me smile every time.

13. I tip my hat to the early educators in her life, because they all have played a very big role in her development. I know all of her gifts didn't come from just me. They all helped.

14. Access to Head Start also means that I am able to work and have a full-time job and career. It also means that I have time to be able to go grocery shopping, go to the gym, and take care of myself and my family in ways that I wouldn't be able to do if I didn't have childcare.

15. Without my children being able to get into Head Start, I don't think my family would have been able to survive out here. Without having access to Head Start, the cost of childcare alone for one child was my whole paycheck. I wouldn't have enough money to cover

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our family's cost of living, such as rent, food, utilities, and other bills. Knowing how hard it was for me as a single mother with one income, it was impossible for me to imagine how anyone else could afford it, even if they had two incomes.

16. Losing access to Head Start, and especially the bilingual classroom environment, would be devastating for my daughter. She has loved learning Spanish and speaking to her teachers and classmates in Spanish. If the program or its bilingual education services were eliminated, it would disrupt my daughter's learning and emotional wellbeing.

17. Losing Head Start would destroy families – especially families like mine. Without Head Start, I would not have had the ability to sustain a permanent place or grow within my career. I would not have been able to take care of my family as a single mom with three kids. Head Start is a lifeline for families like mine.

18. For families who rely on Head Start, it will be impossible to survive without it.It is so hard to find childcare, because the facilities in my area too expensive or already have waitlists.

19. I am submitting this declaration anonymously, because I fear retaliation from the current presidential administration, as well as harassment and threats from members of the public, for challenging the policies and practices of the Trump administration related to the Anti-DEI and Anti-Immigration Executive Orders.

I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct.
