Dear Dr. Ben-Maimon:

On behalf of more than thirty women's health and reproductive rights organizations, we are writing to express our appreciation for your commitment to bringing Plan B® emergency contraception (EC) over-the-counter (OTC).

In the United States, where approximately half of all pregnancies are unintended, EC is an extremely important but underutilized women's health option. While awareness and use of EC have increased over the last five years, women's access remains stifled because of incomplete information about EC products and limited access to prescribers. Securing OTC status for Plan B will help eliminate these barriers and greatly expand American women's ability to obtain and use EC effectively.

Despite the challenges that have delayed and disrupted the FDA review process, we remain hopeful this effort will be successful because we know that science, public health, and public opinion are *all* on our side. Reducing unintended pregnancies by expanding access to Plan B® EC is a winning, common ground prevention strategy – even in the current political climate.

Throughout the FDA review process, Barr Pharmaceuticals has demonstrated a commitment to realizing our common goal of an OTC product, as exemplified during your presentation at the FDA Advisory Committee meeting last December and the subsequent meetings you participated in with the women's health community. As we enter this next critical phase, we are relying more than ever on the company's leadership to keep the process moving forward.

As advocates, we will continue to work with our members and constituencies to maintain a strong, positive public message about the need for Plan B® OTC. As the product manufacturer and distributor, we hope you as the product manufacturer and distributor will continue to demonstrate a dedication to realizing that goal.
