COMMITTEE ON JULY 2 CONSIDERED MATTERS PRESENTED IN YOUR TELEGRAM AND BY THIRTEEN TO TWO VOTE DECIDED TO REGARD NEW POLICY A MANDATE ONLY AS TO FUTURE CASES, INSISTING IT HAS COME TOO LATE TO PERMIT US IN GOOD CONSCIENCE TO BREAK OUR COMMITMENTS IN KOREMATSU CASE. CERTAINLY CORPORATION'S VOTE NEVER CONTEMPLATED WE BREAK FAITH WITH OUR CLIENT AND REFERENDUM DID NOT INCLUDE THE FACTS OF OUR SITUATION. SUGGEST BOARD SUPPORT CASE ON BASIS STATED ABOVE AND IF NECESSARY REFER QUESTION TO MEMBERS CORPORATION. OUR COMMITTEE UNDER BYLAWS CAN MAKE SUCH FORMAL REQUEST IF YOU WISH IT.
