Re: Public Records Request / Automatic License Plate Readers

To Whom It May Concern:

On behalf of the New York Civil Liberties Union, I write to request, pursuant to the state's Freedom of Information Law (Public Officers Law, Article 6), records regarding automatic license plate readers (ALPRs). ALPRs are also sometimes referred to as Automatic Vehicle Identification, Car Plate Recognition or License Plate Recognition equipment and/or software. This records request uses ALPR in reference to any of this technology.

Records Requested

Please provide copies of the following records created from January 1, 2006 to the present:

1. All records regarding your policies, practices and procedures for procuring and using ALPR technology, and for storing, accessing and sharing data obtained through ALPR technology;
2. All records regarding the procurement of ALPR technology, including
 - a. sources of funds used to pay for ALPR technology;
 - b. invoices for the purchase of ALPR technology;
 - c. local government approval for any ALPR purchase;
 - d. interactions with vendors, suppliers and potential suppliers of ALPR technology, including materials and fact sheets supplied by vendors describing their products;
3. All records regarding the use of ALPR technology, including
 - a. what types of data are obtained;
 - b. number of license plates scanned and/or read in a given time period (day, month, year, etc.);
 - c. the number of ALPR units or systems acquired;
 - d. the number of vehicles equipped with ALPR technology;

- e. for stationary deployments, the number and physical location of ALPR units;
- f. the technical capabilities of the ALPR units;

 - e. the existence or non-existence of a system that records who accesses the data and when the data is accessed;

- 6. All records regarding the sharing of data obtained through ALPR technology, including
 - a. what type of data is shared;
 - b. which databases your agency puts collected ALPR data into;
 - c. third parties, governmental or private, that may access your agency's ALPR data, including what procedures third parties must go through in order to access the data and any restrictions placed on third parties regarding further sharing of your ALPR data;
 - d. any agreements to share ALPR data with outside agencies, corporations or other entities;
- 7. All records regarding obtaining ALPR data from third parties, including which databases your agency can access;
- 8. All training materials used to instruct members of your agency in ALPR deployment, data management, or operation of automated records systems that contain ALPR data to which any member of your agency has access, including regional or shared ALPR databases.

The Freedom of Information Law requires that an agency respond to a request within five business days of receipt of a request. Please note that if the requested records cannot be provided within 20 business days, Article 6 of the Public Officers Law mandates that the agency state, in writing, both the reason for the inability to grant the request within 20 business days and a date certain within a reasonable period, depending on the circumstances, when the request will be granted in whole or in part.

If for any reason any portion of this request is denied, please inform us of the reasons for the denial in writing and provide the name and address of the person or body to whom an appeal should be directed.

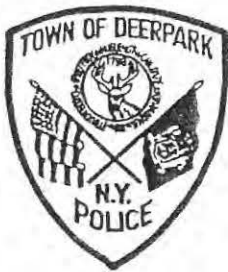

SUBJECT: License Plate Reader
DATE: 10 December 2010

The following protocols are suggested for usage of the license plate reader and technology. The proactive entry of any data, except as stipulated in this directive, or the access to License Plate Reader (LPR) records **MUST** be approved by the lieutenant or police chief, and the request **MUST** have a specific criminal investigative or patrol purpose. Deployment of LPR equipment is intended to provide access to stolen and wanted files, and for the furtherance of criminal investigations. Use is restricted to these purposes. No officer may use, or authorize the use of, the equipment or database records for any other reason. A request for LPR use or data access beyond the cited reason(s) herein must be made to (Agency Defined).

The lieutenant is to administer and oversee the LPR program whose responsibilities include the following:

- Maintain an adequate number of trainers;

- Select and train of approved members to operate the LPR system (all training must be documented);

- Arrange for additional training when and as deemed necessary; and

- Maintain records identifying approved LPR details and their results and ensure appropriate documentation of significant incidents and arrests that are related to LPR usage.

LPR Operator Selection:

Consider the following qualifications when approving members for LPR training:

- Members driving record;

- Past demonstration of good judgment regarding vehicle pursuits; and

- Excellent Vehicle and Traffic Law (VTL) and Penal Law (PL) enforcement activity.

Training:

- Officers are prohibited from using the LPR system until they have been properly trained in its use, and have been instructed as to operational protocols.

Patrol Operations:

Officers MUST notify and obtain approval from the lieutenant or police chief to use the LPR during routine patrol. This information must be documented on the LPR System Use Log.

A lieutenant and the police chief MUST be notified of all appropriate matters (i.e. pursuits, significant arrests, etc.). Activity must be reported monthly by the lieutenant on the DCJS LPR Survey Form.

A "daily user" log will be maintained in the station. Copies of Patrol Car Reports shall be consolidated and forwarded to the lieutenant monthly. The lieutenant shall review the log(s) to ensure that inquiries are properly completed and logged. This log must be retained for a minimum of current year plus one year. If the log has an arrest or hit associated with it, it must be retained as part of the case folder. Retain the log until all arrests associated with the log page have reached a final disposition.

Requests to review stored data shall be recorded and maintained in the same manner as criminal history logs. LPR data is stored for a short time frame on the LPR hard drive (up to thirty days). Access shall be limited to the lieutenant and the police chief. The lieutenant when conducting the query must make the log entry. The log shall be retained for a minimum of current year plus one year. If the log has an arrest or hit associated with it, it must be retained as part of the case folder. Retain the log until all arrests associated with the log page have reached a final disposition.

The lieutenant or the police chief MUST approve LPR use during non-traditional VTL details such during criminal investigations. LPR equipment may be used to further criminal investigations by providing access to stored records and/or by assigning LPR equipment in a designated manner and area.

Participation by outside agencies is not prohibited.

Use of the LPR system in a roving capacity should require a driver and a system operator in the LPR equipped vehicle. The LPR operator is responsible for confirming any hot list hits via NYSPIN, and to identify target vehicles for any possible support vehicles.

Concealed use LPR vehicles, focused on high crime reduction initiatives, will not be used to initiate the traffic stop absent exigent circumstances.

Stationary mode usage requires only one member to operate the system, verify hits and identify target vehicles for any support cars.

The lieutenant or police chief may issue further restrictions, taking into account knowledge of the area to be patrolled and the particular assignment.

LPR equipped vehicles should be used as often as possible but within the established and approved Patrol car Rotation Schedule. When not in use the cameras will be removed from the vehicle and secured.

A copy of the Car System User Guide shall be maintained in a folder in each LPR equipped vehicle or in its vehicle clipboard.

Numerous details conducted have yielded the following effective strategies when using the LPR for investigative purposes. The LPR is used by specialized units with uniform patrol support in an effort to saturate a specific geographical area. The chance of identifying a crime in progress is directly related to the amount of vehicles stopped for violating the law. This requires that all vehicles whose registration plate returns any "hit" from the hot list be stopped. The greatest numbers of vehicles which return a hit by the LPR are in the suspended and revoked registration category. When applicable to established department policy these vehicles shall be impounded and an inventory search conducted. Addressing all suspended and revoked registrations can quickly exhaust the resources of a patrol.

The LPR can be used to locate vehicles of interest for a specific investigation. An example would be locating one or more recently stolen vehicles in close proximity to each other or located near a suspected chop shop. The stolen vehicle(s) can then be surveilled.

Specific vehicle files can be loaded into the LPR that may relate to a situation of concern to a certain geographical area. Some examples would be gang members or associates, prior sex offenders, burglary, robbery, auto theft, larceny and criminal mischief targets. The data collected may enable investigators to take immediate action or provide solid leads should a crime occur in the vicinity of the captured plate.

Mutual Aid Situations:

Emergency Based Operations:

During the course of normal law enforcement duties, incidents may occur that require immediate assistance from other local, county or state law enforcement agencies. The License Plate Reader can be a valuable tool in these situations, such as an AMBER Alert, bank robbery or other violent crime, and can help bring the incident to a safe and successful conclusion.

Upon notification of an Alert or broadcast in our area all patrols using LPR equipment must manually place involved vehicle plate number(s) into the vehicle database. Officers should proceed to patrol areas which are likely to increase the chance of encountering the suspect vehicle. Upon receipt of updated information (i.e., involved vehicle plate number changes), patrols must immediately update database entries.

Officers must promptly search the vehicle LPR databases to determine if a record of past encounters exists

If the vehicle is encountered, the actions taken should ensure the safe recovery of the missing child. Officer experience and judgment, as well as department specific policies and procedures will dictate the best course of action to take. All actions should be documented in accordance with department policies and procedures.

The Division of Criminal Justice Services encourages local, county and state law enforcement agencies to utilize the license plate readers in targeted traffic enforcement details such as Stop DWI checkpoints or seat belt enforcement details. As with any roadblock or targeted operation, the departments involved should consult with the police chief and discuss the proper manner in which to conduct the roadblock, taking into consideration established legal precedent and the legal rights of the person(s) involved.

Legal Considerations:

There does not appear to be any legal impediment to the use of a license plate reader by law enforcement. It does not appear that such use would constitute a Fourth Amendment search.

An observation made by a police officer without a physical intrusion into a constitutionally protected area does not implicate the Fourth Amendment or require a search warrant (see, *Hester v. United States*, 265 U.S. 57 [1924]). A police officer who is lawfully present in an area may look into the windows of a parked car (see, *United States v. Martin*, 806 F.2d 204[1986]).

Given the foregoing, it seems clear that a police officer's observation of a license plate on a car located in an area viewable from a public street would not constitute a search. The use of a license plate reader to enhance the officer's observation would likely not cause the observation to become a search for purposes of the Fourth Amendment. For example, the use of artificial illumination to aid an officer's observations does not constitute a search (see, *United States v. Lee*, 274 U.S. 559 [1927]; *People v. Hughes*, 211 A.D.2d 576, 622 N.Y.S.2d 12 [1995]; *People v. Vasquez*, 229 A.D.2d 997, 645 N.Y.S.2d 672 [1996]).

Similarly, the use of binoculars to magnify an object does not constitute a search (see, *United States v. Lee*, supra). A license plate reader merely accomplishes, more efficiently, the same task that a police officer may accomplish by reading a license plate and manually entering the number into a data-base. Therefore, it is reasonable to assume that a court would not hold that the use of a license plate reader would constitute a search. However, at this time there is no decisional case law from any court concerning the use of a license plate reader.

The License Plate Reader (LPR) constitutes one of the latest computer based investigatory tools to be used by officers in the field. The system requires an ongoing download of target license plates emanating from the Department of Motor Vehicles and the State Police. The hardware required is either attached to a vehicle or mounted as a stand alone. The scanner reads all license plates which are within view and compares them with the wanted database. The computer also stores the location of every read via GPS. When the computer matches a plate with the database, it notifies the officer of the reason for the match, and shows a color photo of the image capture. A record of every plate read and its result is kept. The officer confirms the hit and a car stop occurs. If an arrest is made and the officer testifies at a hearing or trial, is the information contained in the computer Rosario?

Rosario material is part of the discovery process found in sections 240.44 and 240.45 of the Criminal Procedure Law (CPL). It is "Any written or recorded statement...made by such witness...which relates to the subject matter of the witness's testimony." The statement must be in the possession or control of the People. It must relate to the subject matter of the witness's direct testimony but the People are not required to create Rosario material. If the material is deemed to be Rosario, the People are obligated to turn it over if it is under their control.

There is no question that the information stored in the computer is under the control of the operator. The remaining issue is whether the hit (data) the operator relies on to proceed to the confirmation step is a statement. Although the data is a written instrument under the Penal Law, it should be argued that is not a statement by the operator/officer. Statements are either recorded or written notations of the witness. In the case of LPR's, the data generated has no connection to any statement made by the operator/officer. However, any notes made during the confirmation process by the operator/officer to verify the information would be Rosario because they would constitute notes which the

operator/officer would be expected to testify about.

LPR's have the ability to store any information which the operator/officer requests. It is recommended that scans which lead to arrests be stored in the computer until such time that a court of competent jurisdiction definitely rules that the scan alone is not Rosario.

The Town of Deerpark is located in western Orange County and has a population of 8600 residents. The town is 69.9 square miles in area and is considered part of the Tri-State Area where New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania connect. The Town of Deerpark borders the City of Port Jervis Town of Greenville, Town of Mount Hope, and the Towns of Mamakating, Foresburg, and Lumberland on the Sullivan County side. The City of Port Jervis is also part of the Orange County Impact Program. The Town of Deerpark Police department is made up of 5 full time members and 12 part time members. Over the last several years, the department has evolved from part time work to a well trained professional police department with a balance of part time and full time officers encompassing a multitude of certifications, knowledge, and experience. The Town of Deerpark Police Department is dispatched by the New York State Police Troop F. Headquarters in Middletown NY and the Orange County E-911 Center in Goshen NY. The Town of Deerpark Police Department is responsible for patrolling over 120 miles of roadway. There are several arterial roads that directly connect the Town of Deerpark to the City of Port Jervis as well as the the rest of the county. First, there is Interstate 84 of which 2.4 miles are located within the town. When exiting I-84 exit 1 westbound motorists travel on County Route 1 just a hundred feet from the New Jersey border. From the exit 1 eastbound ramp, motorist exit onto U.S. Route 6. Route 6 leads to the Middletown area in a easterly direction and is highly traveled. County Route 15 also experiences a high volume of motorists due to the 5 gas stations which are located in New Jersey where motorists can fuel their vehicle's at a less expensive price per gallon. From the town of Deerpark, U.S. Route 6, U.S. Route 209, and State Route 97 all lead into the City of Port Jervis. The route 97 corridor is known as the scenic byway and is part of the "Hawks Nest" area. These arterial roadways are known to experience large volumes of commuter traffic, several motor vehicle accidents, and the transportation of illegal drugs between New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. During the warmner months, the Town of Deerpark see's a large increase in traffic due to the various recreational activities which the Delaware River presents. The Delaware River is located along the Route 97 corridor. The Town of Deerpark also host a Deerpark Family Festival is July which also increases the traffic and population to our area. During these high traffic times, it increases the chance of more offenders driving through the town with either a suspended/revoked registration or license, or wanted for a crime. Withing the Town of Deerpark are three of the City of Port Jervis School District Schools. The first in Hamilton Bicentennial School which is located on U.S. Route 209 and consists of grades K through 6. The other in the A.S.K. Elementary School (K-6) and the Port Jervis High School (9-12) which are both located in the same complex on U.S. Route 209. These three school house more that 2630 students. These students bring increased traffic to the area and with th Licence Plate Reader, we will be able to identify any vehicle's that are registered to sex offenders that may be within the school area's. Also in the town is over eight miles of railroad and three reservoirs which supply water to the City of Port Jervis. The Town of Deerpark is located in zone 4 terrorist watch list. A License Plate Reader will identify any vehicle on the Homeland Security Watch List. The Town of Deerpark experiences a high amount of vehicular traffic and significant portion of these operators/occupants are on c are in possession of illegal controlled substances or otherwise intend on committing a crime. It is common knowledge that people who commit crimes also drive vehicles during there commission of/or which traveling to or from the site of the offense. It is also common knowlege that people so inclined				

		frequently do not appear for traffic court appearances leading to their licenses' being suspended. They also tend not to follow the Department of Motor Vehicle's registration and insurance guidelines which leads to their registration being suspended or revoked. The License Plate Reader has proven to work in other agencies and is a wonderful tool to enhance public safety and reduce part 1 crimes.

All prior mentioned problems are interrelated and the strategy to address all of them would involve the aquisition and deployment of the License Plate Reader. The device would compliment and increase the efficiency of all available officers and it would suppliment our previously aquired tracs technology. The goal related to the purchase and deployment of this License Plate Reader would be to increase the arrest rate for all offense including UCR part 1 offenses while increasing public safety. The project will also attempt to reduce the total number of UCR part 1 crimes in the Town of Deerpark through more aggressive and effective enforcement which would provide a deterrent for future offenders. The License Plate Reader will enhance the department's ability to apprehend perpetrators and property identify who they are for proper disposition after an arrest is made, thereby, increasing public safety. Future evaluation of these objectives will be discussed in section 4 below in the On line GMS submission. The License Plate Reader would be mounted on a police vehicle with either a laptop or mobile data computer containing an update of the Department of Motor Vehicle's Database. When deployed the License Plate Reader rapidly reads license plates of all vehicle withing the infared beam device (up to 450 per minute) nd alerts the operator when a vehicle is stolen, its registration is suspended/revoked, or anyting else the computer is programmed to look for. The reader gives real time identification of all vehicle's status. The device is an incredibly effective tool to allow officers to efficiently trget vehicles that are no committing any obvious, tangible traffic infractions. Such vehicles would normall drive right by enen to the most vigilant officers. IN addition to the DMV date, virtually all other date can be added into the overall search database. NYSPIN information pertaining to wanted subjects can also be used which would include anyone on the Homeland Security watfh list hthat has an associated vehicle registration. Data pertaining to amber alerts may also be added to the search database. Any relevant local information may also be included, such as any known vehcile owned or operated by persons who are registered sex offenders. The device itself would interface with the Tracs computer previously aquired. The License Plate Reader will allow us to identify possible criminal offenders what otherwise would not have been able to apprehend. The License Plate Reader along with the Tracs programs will significantly increase the efficiency of our detection, interdiction, apprehension, processing, nad reporting of offenders. The project will be operated withing the Town of Deerpark and available to our neighboring Police Departments if they choose to use it. The area's within the town which are known to experience a high volume of drug trafficking will be exploited. While the plate reader will always be on in the vehicle it is mounted in, many target details will focus on these areas.

It provides 16 hours of service to the citizens of the Town. It is a department that has evolved from part time work to a proffesional, well trained, police department with five full time members and 12 part time members encompassing a multitude of certification, knowledge, and experince. We provide service to approx. 8600 people 7 days a week. The police department consists of a full time chief, one full time lieutenant, one fu time sergeant, a full time detective, and two full time patrolmen. There are also 12 part time members which include one sergeant, one detective, and 1 part time patrolmen. The annual budget for the police department is \$771,000. The Town of Deerpark Police Department is dispatched primarily by the New York State Police Troop F. Headquarters in Middletown N.Y. and the Orange County E-911 center in Goshen N.Y. The department

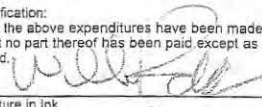

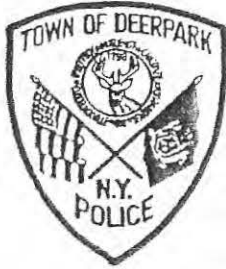
