Created on the recommendation of the 9/11 Commission in 2007Serve as the liaison between DHS and SLTT law enforcement agencies across the countryMission: To lead the coordination of DHS-wide policies related to SLTT law enforcement's role in preventing, preparing for, protecting against, and responding to natural disasters, acts of terrorism, and other man-made disasters within the United States

If You See Something, Say Something

■ The "If You See Something, Say Something™" anti-terrorism public awareness campaign was first started by the New York Metropolitan Transportation Authority (NY MTA) following the attacks of 9/11In July 2010, the Department – with a license from the NY MTA – in partnership with the U.S. Department of Justice's Nationwide Suspicious Activity Reporting Initiative (NSI) launched the campaign nationwide



If You See Something, Say Something

The NSI is a joint collaborative effort, which includes: U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Federal Bureau of Investigation, and SLTT law enforcement Together, they gather, document, process, analyze and share suspicious activity reporting to the National Network of Fusion Centers



Homeland Security Advisory Council

• HSAC provides organizationally independent strategic advice and recommendations to the Secretary and leadershipHSAC is comprised of 40 members representative of various sectors and disciplines, including law enforcement, SLTT governments, national policy making, academia and research, the private industry, and public health

Committee Management Office

• What is FACA? Federal Advisory Committee Act is the statute that governs the management and operation of committees established by a Federal agency to obtain advice from non-Federal individuals or entities. Why is this important? FACA committees provide specific, timely and actionable advice to support homeland security efforts. A committee as a whole may advise DHS on taskings issued from leadership, legislation, or recommend legislative action. Ensure the public is afforded an opportunity to weigh into key government decisions before finalization.
