Dear Romell:

We are in the process of reviewing our equipment inventory and ran across a couple of errors in Fiscal Year 2010. The equipment below was purchased without approval and we would like to request retroactive approval for the equipment.

On September 14, 2009, we sent a request for NHTSA approval to purchase three vehicles for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department. We received an approval letter for this purchase on October 14, 2009. After reviewing the file, it appears we purchased four vehicles and did not receive approval for the additional vehicle. Three vehicles were purchased 1/21/10 costing \$28,398 each. Jefferson County later requested purchasing an additional vehicle and we revised their contract but failed to get NHTSA approval for the additional vehicle. This vehicle was purchased on 2/16/10 costing \$28,298 (Project #10-154-AL-25).

We also requested a License Plate Reader for Jackson County Sheriff's Department in the September 14, 2009 letter. It was approved in the October 14, 2009 letter and the purchase was made. We inadvertently requested one License Plate Reader but should have requested two. We also purchased a License Plate Reader for the Kansas City Police Department but failed to get NHTSA approval for this purchase. It was purchased on 2/24/10 at a cost of \$24,080 (Project #10-154-AL-42).

Re: Electronic Vehicle License Plate Camera Readers

Dear Ms Cooks,

We have received a request from the Nebraska State Patrol asking for approval to purchase two Vehicle License Plate Camera Readers utilizing available Section 163 funding.

Because the Reader units cost approximately \$25,000 each, we are requesting NHTSA authorization to purchase this equipment. License plate readers are infrared cameras which are installed in patrol units and have the capability of reading more than 800 license plates per hour. These units instantly transmit information to a laptop computer inside the patrol vehicle that alerts the officer whenever a match of a suspect vehicle is identified.

The camera has the capability of scanning multiple lanes of traffic for previously identified violators. Identification of: traffic violation suspect vehicles; vehicles owned by suspended/revoked drivers; and stolen vehicles are just a few of the traffic safety benefits that are expected with the utilization of this technology.

Dear Mr. Zwonechek:

The Nebraska State Patrol is respectfully requesting your assistance in obtaining approval from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to purchase two license plate readers with funding provided through the Section 163 award / .08 project. The readers cost approximately \$25,000 each.

License plate readers are infrared cameras which are installed in a patrol car. The reader has the capability of reading more than 800 license plates in an hour. They instantly transmit information to a laptop computer inside the car, notifying the officer whenever there is a match in one of the down loaded databases.

The infrared reader instantly scans multiple lanes of highway traffic alerting officers to law violations. The detection of stolen vehicles, wanted persons, and suspended rivers are a sample of how these devices could dramatically increase highway safety with their deployment.
