TSA Screening of Passengers by Observation Techniques (SPOT)

The SPOT Program is a behavior observation and analysis program designed to provide TSA Behavior Detection Officers (BDOs) with a non-intrusive means of identifying potentially high-risk individuals who are exhibiting behaviors indicative of high levels of stress, fear and/or deception possibly indicative of terrorism and / or criminal activity. TSA's evaluation of the SPOT Program has found that SPOT activity provides the following benefits:

- SPOT is an added risk-minigation measure providing another layer of transportation security;
- SPOT has significant potential to detect and deter activities by potential terrorists at high-risk locations;
- SPOT is an effective method to address threats at relatively low cost;
- SPOT remains the only screening process that addresses passenger behavior directly rather than
 relying on the discovery of prohibited items they may be carrying; and
- SPOT is an effective additional passenger screening process with minimal customer inconvenience;

OVERVIEW

BDOs screen travelers for observable behaviors that may indicate that the individual or individuals may be a risk to the aircraft or airport. They are trained to detect involuntary physical and physiological reactions that people who fear being discovered exhibit when trying to dissipate the mental stress associated with the fear of discovery; those physical and physiological reactions typically present as recognizable signs of stress or fear and / or deception.

CURRENT STATUS

SPOT is currently deployed at 42 airports with 785 certified Behavior Detection Officers

- Phase II (through January 2008) 45 airports (additional 3 airports) to 1,100 BDOs
- Phase III (through February 2008) 58 airports (additional 13 airports) to 1,301 BDOs
- Phase IV (through September 30, 2008) 158 airports to 1,744 BDOs


