#### Dear Congressman Roskam:

Thank you for your e-mail of January 19, 2010, requesting information on the Transportation Security Administration's (TSA) Screening of Passengers by Observation Techniques (SPOT) program.

TSA employs approximately 3,000 Behavior Detection Officers (BDOs) at 161 of the Nation's airports. Several factors determine the number of BDOs assigned to an airport, including passenger throughput, checkpoint/airport configuration, and airport risk category.

The initial SPOT curriculum was developed in 2006 at a cost of approximately \$137,812. That amount does not include the cost of curriculum revisions since that time. It costs approximately \$1,665 to train a BDO at his or her home airport or \$2,465 if he or she must travel to another airport for training. The difference in cost is due to lodging, airfare, and per diem costs.

The SPOT certification course consists of 32 hours (four days) of classroom training consisting of lectures, demonstrations, and job knowledge assessment, with a fifth day available if the trainee requires remediation. Successful completion of the classroom training allows the trainee to proceed to a 24-hour (three day) on-the-job training (OJT) period. Upon successful completion of OJT, the trainee is certified as a BDO.

TSA developed the SPOT program in 2003, with assistance from the Massachusetts State Police at Boston Logan International Airport, to meet TSA-specific security and public service needs. Transportation Security Officers performed SPOT as a collateral duty until 2006, when the curriculum was revised into a certification course and the BDO position was instituted. The revised course was based on updated behavior recognition methodology.

All BDO applicants must apply for the position and be selected through the competitive process. Applicants who successfully complete a written and oral structured interview are selected to attend the BDO certification course. Appointment as a BDO is contingent upon successful completion of the course.

The SPOT program office selects and certifies BDO instructors. Expert knowledge of the SPOT program and behavior recognition principles are criteria to be an instructor. Instructors attend a train-the-trainer course and after successful completion of this training, the BDO instructor shadows a primary instructor until he or she is ready to teach the course. Instructors must complete an annual re-evaluation to maintain their BDO instructor certification. Regarding how instructors stay abreast of new techniques, SPOT subject matter experts provide instructors with updates on new methodologies through teleconferences and workshops.

Hi Peter,

Our Homeland Security LA recommend you as the best person at TSA Leg Affairs to talk about TSA training. I pulled some background off of the general TSA website on the training procedures of Behavioral Detection Officers, but was hoping to find some further detail on the below questions.

- How many BDO does TSA currently employ? How are they distributed amongst airports?
- How much did TSA spend to create the curriculum for SPOT training? How much does it cost to train one officer?
- On TSA's website it says SPOT training takes a four day instruction course and 24 booked hours of on-the-job training – is this accurate or are there any other additional training steps used? Who qualifies?
