Dear Congressman Mica:

Thank you for your letter of May 20, 2010, expressing concern with the state of aviation security and, in particular, the recently published Government Accountability Office (GAO) report on the Transportation Security Administration's (TSA) Screening Passengers by Observation Techniques (SPOT) program. The Administration remains steadfast in its determination to secure the aviation sector and ensure the safety of the traveling public. Your leadership and support are appreciated.

The Times Square incident and attempted attack on Northwest Flight 253 on December 25, 2009, demonstrated that terrorists will go to great lengths to defeat the security measures that have been put in place since September 11, 2001. As such, we have taken aggressive action to develop and expand the use of the next generation of aviation security technology, strengthen aviation security protocols with our foreign partners, develop long-term law enforcement capacities in aviation security and to streamline and improve the U.S. watchlist matching process for air travelers. Additionally, TSA continues to add elements of randomness and unpredictability to the airport security environment as well as utilizing every risk-based tactic available to help identify threats, augment intelligence gathering and minimize risk to the traveling public.

The SPOT program is one of these enhancements to security at the nation's airports. SPOT began with pilot tests in 2003 and 2004, in which TSA trained and deployed uniformed Behavior Detection Officers (BDO's) to observe passengers in and around airport checkpoints for physical and physiological cues that they fear discovery and should be given additional screening. The SPOT program is modeled on other behavioral analysis programs that have been successfully employed by law enforcement and security personnel both in the United States and around the world, including the Israeli Behavior Observation Program, (i.e. making risk based decisions based on observable behavior), while adhering to required Fourth Amendment constitutional protections.

Since its inception, TSA's BDOs have identified illegal activities that have resulted in more than 1,800 arrests at transportation systems across the country – most notably spotting an individual who was discovered to have explosive components at the Orlando airport in 2008. SPOT is an extremely valuable part of TSA's layered security approach, and interest in the program is high. To date, over 13,000 law enforcement officers and

over 20 countries have been briefed on the program as part of TSA's effort to develop and enhance sustainable security practices and improve the overall level of security both at home and abroad.

TSA has initiated action to address GAO's recommendations and refine program training and procedures to ensure that behavior detection remains a vital layer of security as the program matures. Thank you for taking the time to share your thoughts and concerns with me. Hook forward to working with you on these and other homeland security issues.
