The National Threat Evaluation and Reporting (NTER) Master Trainer Program (MTP)enhances federal, state, local, tribal, and territorial homeland security partners capabilities to analyze and/vet tips and leads to assist in reducing the threat of targeted violence across the country. To obtain certification, Master Trainer candidates must successfully complete each component of the road map below. Once certified, Master Trainers will use NTER resources to teach behavioral threat assessment approaches to individuals in their areas of responsibility to contribute to the safety and security of their communities.

National Threat Evaluation and Reporting Master Trainer Program



The National Threat Evaluation and Reporting (NTER) Master Trainer Program (MTP) allows homeland security partners to assist their communities in adapting to an evolving threat landscape. Utilizing a train-the-trainer model, the NTER MTP certifies individuals in behavioral threat assessment techniques and best practices primarily through the Threat Evaluation and Reporting Course (TERC). Master Trainers are equipped to empower homeland security partners in their communities to identify and assess risk and warning signs, and manage potential threats of future, targeted violence regardless of motive.

The MTP is generating a network of Master Trainers to continue to teach threat assessment approaches to individuals throughout all levels of government who vet tips and leads and contribute to the safety and security of their communities.

Minimum Requirements

- Current employee of a federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial (F/SLTT) homeland security partner
- Minimum of two years in a field related to public sector security or workplace/insider threat
- Nominated by a current program member, an NTER representative, or a leader from your agency

Preferred Qualifications

- ✓ Supervisory or senior employee of an F/SLTT agency
- ✓ Professional or academic experience in targeted violence prevention or behavioral threat assessment
- ✓ Professional experience in the vetting of tips and leads
- ✓ Certified Instructor/Trainer

Approved Master Trainers receiveaccess to professional development in behavioral threat assessment and instruction techniques to include certification, technical support, and continuing education opportunities. These resources assist in training F/SIIT and private sector partners on building processes and conducting threat assessments on individuals who exhibit concerning behaviors.



(U) The National Threat Evaluation and Reporting (NTER) Program's Threat Evaluation and Reporting Course (TERC) trains federal, state, local, tribal, and territorial (F/SLTT) homeland security partners on applying behavioral threat assessment approaches, as it relates to tips and leads, to prevent targeted violence in their areas of responsibility. The TERC teaches students to utilize a four-step threat assessment model to identify, investigate, assess, and manage an individual who presents behaviors of concern.

The TERC ensures all participants are equipped with the necessary tools to empower others in their communities to identify and report potential threats. In addition, the TERC prepares threat assessment teams to minimize potential threats of targeted violence and to move concerning individuals off the pathway to violence and away from an attack.



The TERC is interactive and challenges participants to apply threat assessment methodology to real-world scenarios. The target audience for TERC is F/SLTT and private sector public safety partners involved in reviewing, assessing, and investigating potential threats of targeted violence.
