Pursuant to the above-captioned civil action, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), conducted a litigation review of potentially responsive records in compliance with the Joint Status Report dated April 23, 2013. As a result of that review, enclosed please find nineteen pages.

Portions not released are being withheld pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552, and/or the Privacy Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552a. Please refer to the list enclosed with this letter that identifies the authority for withholding the deleted material, which is indicated by a mark appearing in the block next to the exemption. An additional enclosure with this letter explains these exemptions in more detail. The documents are being forwarded to you with this letter.

DEA's FOIA regulations are contained in the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 28, Part 16, as amended. They are published in the Federal Register and are available for inspection by members of the public.

For your information, Congress excluded three discrete categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA. See 5 U.S.C. § 552(c) (2006 & Supp. IV 2010). This is a standard notification that is given to all our requesters and should not be taken as an indication that excluded records do, or do not, exist.







The DEA has built a National License Plate Reader system that has a database that is fed by many devices spread over multiple jurisdictions across the continental US. The system is for the benefit of all law enforcement and is accessible, via different channels, by all of law enforcement. The system can be used strategically to support investigations. It can also be used tactically to generate real-time notifications of the detection of suspect plates. The system is well suited to aid law enforcement in countering drug, money, and weapons trafficking by facilitating the interdiction of vehicles used as conveyances to and from border areas (or any other region that has LPR devices that participate in our program). Moreover, it is intended to help with investigations, prosecutions, and interdictions across a broad spectrum of extraditable offenses.
