John Farmer Jr. suggests that the American Civil Liberties Union's concerns about the Suspicious Activity Reporting (SAR) programs as a potential threat to civil libertles are inconsistent with my praise of last year's improvements to the Information Sharing Environment (ISE) guidelines. They are not.

The A.C.L.U. has been voicing concern about SAR programs to lawmakers and government agencies and advocating for stronger civil liberties protections for years. Moreover, while the improvements to the ISE guidelines were welcome, they apply only to that particular program; it remains far from clear whether other SAR programs, like the F.B.I.'s eGuardian system, will follow those standards. One good SAR policy is only a first step and solves only part of the problem.

While there is little evidence SAR programs find terrorists, there is plenty of evidence that they are being used to violate the rights of innocent people engaged in innocuous activities like photographing national landmarks and engaging in protected speech.

Collecting information about innocent Americans will not make us safer. Law enforcement already has the authority it needs to fight crime and terrorism without sacrificing the rights of those it seeks to protect.
