Domain is the territory and issues for which a field office exercises responsibility. Domain is also known as Area of Responsibility (AOR).

Domain Awareness is the strategic understanding of national security and criminal threats and vulnerabilities, the FBI's positioning to collect against these, and knowledge gaps related to a specific domain.

Domain Management is the process by which a Field Office continually improves its Domain Awareness by effectively deploying resources and centralizing, leveraging, and maximizing its Domain Intelligence [redacted]

What do we already know about our domain? – This addresses the Field Office’s level of current Domain Awareness and is answered through [redacted]

What do we need to know about our domain? - This addresses the Field Office’s efforts toward evaluating known threats and vulnerabilities in it Domain, as well as evaluating its capacity to fulfill collection requirements and identify knowledge gaps.

What don’t we know about our domain? - This addresses the Field Office’s understanding the knowledge gaps between what the office knows about its Domain and establishing what it has yet to discover about the Domain.

What are we going to about it? - The Field Office’s planning and preparations for engaging the Domain Management process. This involves alignment of resources to address known threats, vulnerabilities, and intelligence gaps, and the prioritization of collections, operations, and source development.

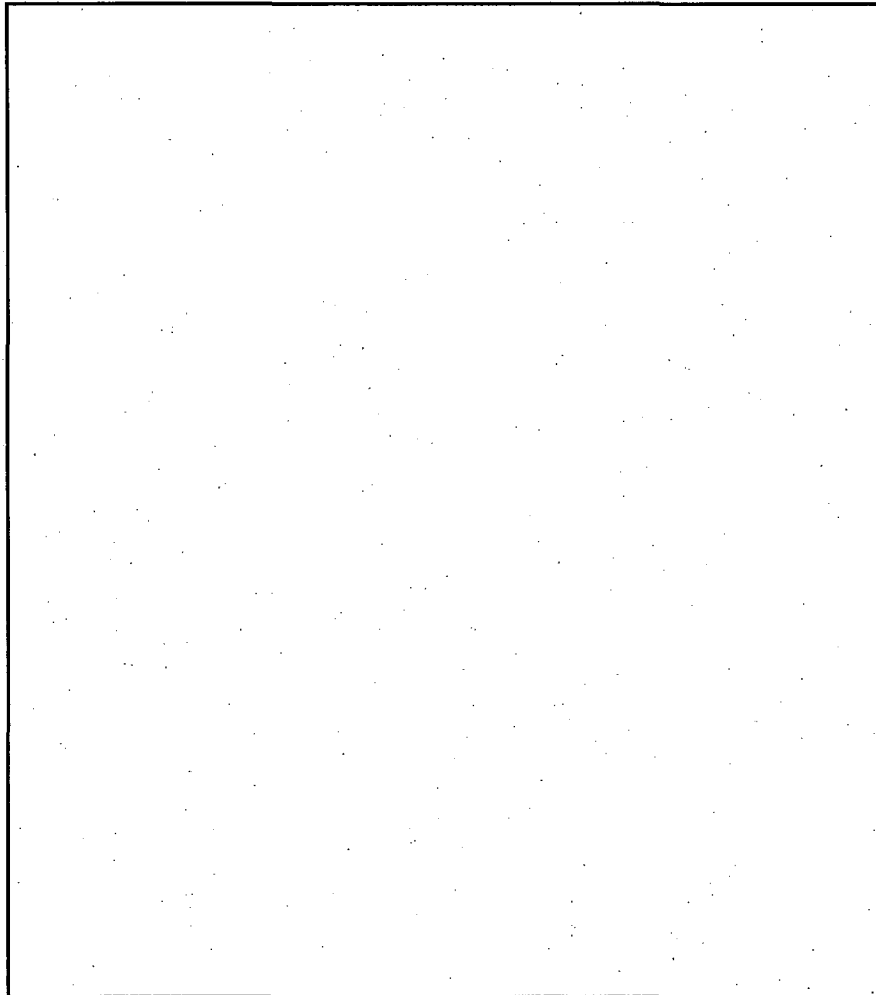

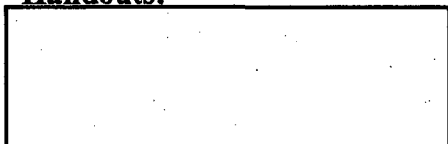
