

What is a Visa?







Immigrant

A visa is a document that allows the bearer to travel to a U.S. port of entry and apply to DHS for admission.











Types of Visas

Nonimmigrant

- 20+ categories (A-V)
- Visa Waiver Program



Immigrant

- Immediate Relatives
- Family Preference- Quotas
- Employment-based
- Diversity Visa Lottery














The Visa Waiver Program 15.6 million travelers in 2005

Non-Immigrant Visas (NIVs)







FY-2006 total:

•NIV Workload: 7.7 million

•NIV Visas issued: 5.8 million

•Percentage issued: 80%











Non-Immigrant Visas (NIVs)

Many require USCIS petition approval 1st (Petition based nonimmigrant visas)

Examples

- Alien of Extaordinary ability (O)
- Fiancees (K)
- Intracompany transferee (L)
- Performing athletes artists or entertainers (P)
- Temporary workers (H)
 - Also require Dept of Labor certification













Non-Immigrant Visas (NIVs)

Others require proof of acceptance and authorization by an approved sponsor

- Student (F)
- Vocational/nonacademic student (M)
- Exchange Visitor (J)













Immigrant Visas (IVs)

• IMMEDIATE RELATIVES -

(Short wait)

- -US citizen spouse, child, parent
- -Orphan adopted/to be adopted
- DIVERSITY VISA LOTTERY

• FAMILY SPONSORED -

(Quotas-longer waits)

- -(Example: US citizen unmarried son)
- -Visa Bulletin place in the queue
- EMPLOYMENT-BASED

(Quotas)



FY 2006 Immigrant Visa (IV) Volume:

- Workload- 743,295
- Issued- 449,065
- Percentage Issued: 79%


As part of visa processing:

DHS introduced US-VISIT at ports of entry






Step 1 (overseas):






Visa Office: CA/VO/L/C

L/C (Legal/Coordination Division) is the Visa Office's liaison with other agencies and other State Department offices.


L/C provides a two-way conduit for information between intelligence agencies and posts by:

- Processing Security Advisory Opinions (SAOs) on visa applicants (3A and 3B only).
- Revoking the visas of visa holders about whom new derogatory information has surfaced.
- Applying other visa sanctions, such as 212(f)



Security Advisory Opinions (SAOs)

An SAO is a halt on a visa applicant, requiring the Consular Officer to contact Washington.














Visa Revocation Process



May subject of new intel potentially have a visa?

Prepare intel for L/C

May intel result in an INA ineligibility?

Post: attempt to notify applicant

DHS: take any appropriate actions











Visa Revocations vs. Refusals

- Revocation standard is INA section 221(i), which states that the Secretary of State may at any time, in his/her discretion, revoke a visa.
- Inadmissibility finding must be based in law INA section 212(a), or small variety of others (306, 212(f), Helms-Burton, etc).
- •Revocations are "quasi"/"prudential" (P3B) and have a lower standard than refusals/permanent inadmissibilities (3B)
- Important: A previous revocation does not guarantee that a person won't be issued a visa in the future!











Visa Office: What we can do for you

- Provide background on a visa revocation
- Accept intelligence and revoke someone's visa
- Help facilitate the travel of a "person of interest"
- Enter namecheck hits on people so that the next time the apply for a visa, their applications will need SAOs
- Remove a State Department hit on someone no longer under investigation











Visa Office: What we can't do for you

- Deport someone
- Direct a post overseas to issue a visa
- Ignore intel/reporting to facilitate visa issuance
- Retroactively revoke a visa to facilitate expedited removal by DHS
- Reject someone's application to extend stay, change/adjust status
