[Redacted] Colleagues -

To support analytical efforts under the CTPF process, CSO has drafted a report on the dynamics of violent extremism in Mali. We hope this will help set the stage for the next phase of discussions, including which key factors/dynamics we want to address programmatically with the FY16 funds or through other diplomatic avenues.

We consulted a number of sources in preparing this report, including getting inputs from many of you. The overall analytical approach is outlined in the methodology section, which represents a joint effort by CSO's CVE and AF teams. This report is meant to be an initial scan of the landscape and the resulting implications; it is not definitive. We are happy to take any feedback or comments, either written or when we next meet to discuss this analysis and general next steps on the CTPF process in Mali.

**U.S.-Algeria Non-Paper:**  
**Countering Violent Extremism Cooperation**

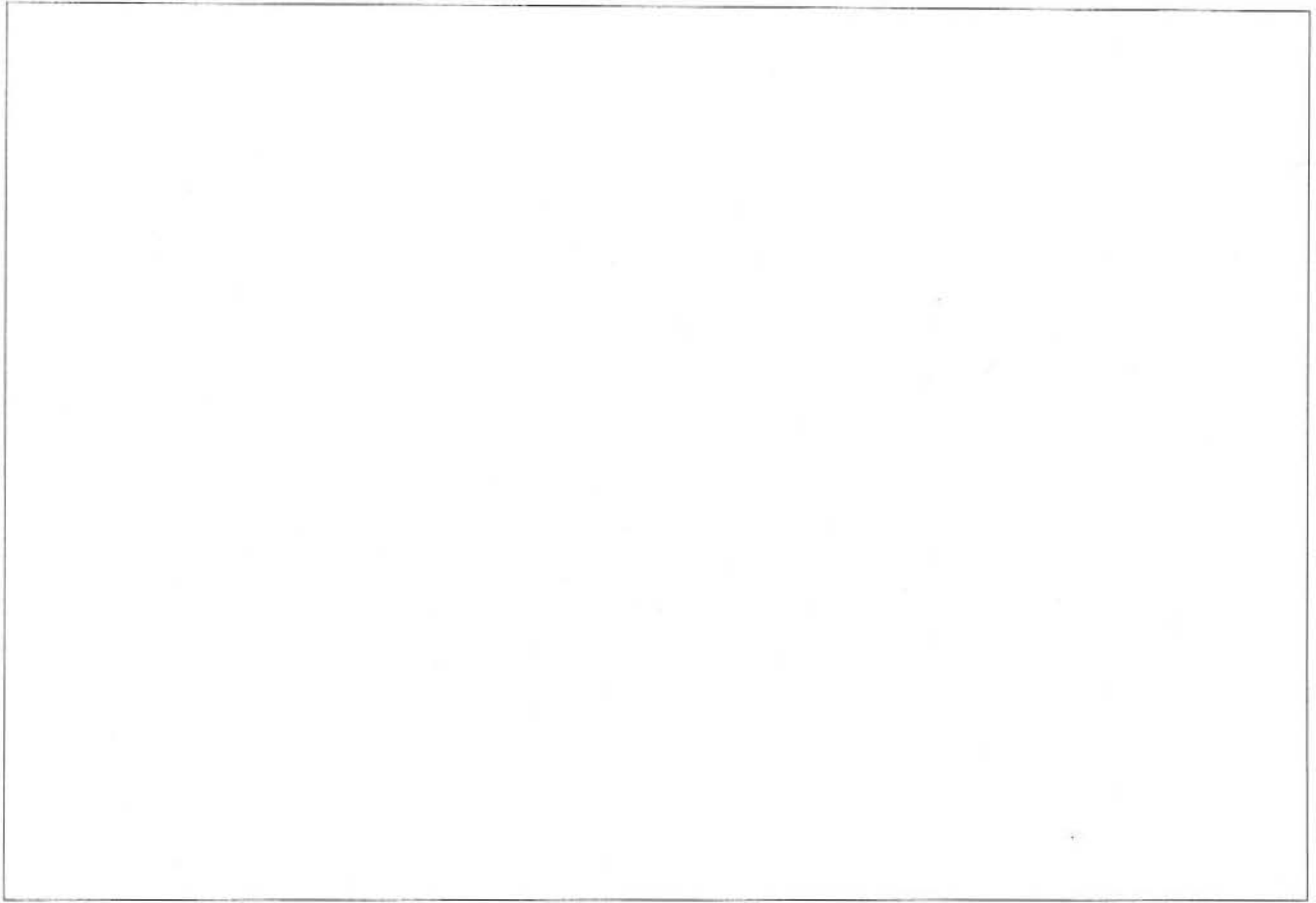
**Context:** Much of the international community's countering violent extremism (CVE) efforts over the last several years have focused on building a consensus around broadly shared approaches to countering the radicalization and recruitment that feed terrorism. The United States, Algeria and other countries have made significant multilateral contributions to elevating CVE. The United States and Turkey launched the Global Counterterrorism Forum (GCTF) in September 2012; Algeria and Canada took on co-chairing the GCTF's Sahel Region Capacity-Building Working Group (SWG). In July 2015, Algeria organized a regional CVE Summit where it showcased its long-standing domestic approaches to de-radicalization. In September 2015, GCTF minister's endorsed a new initiative to address the full life cycle of radicalization to violence, which will produce new conceptual tools to fill niches in the Forum's relevant good practices.

**Opportunity:** In September 2015, after its CVE regional Summit, Algeria compiled and shared a report entitled "Algeria and Deradicalization: An Experience to Share." That report very usefully details the range of Algeria's domestic CVE approaches. Algeria and the United States share several areas of CVE work as common priorities – including working with families, civil society and community leaders, as well as communication/media and rehabilitation/reintegration. At UNGA, Algeria proposed workshops - organized with Canada within the framework of the SWG - on the roles of: (1) democracy in countering terrorism; (2) the internet and social networks in the fight against cyber-criminality and terrorism; and (3) penal justice in the fight against terrorism in the Sahel region.
