Dear Mr. Handeyside:

I refer to our letter dated December 6, 2019, regarding the release of certain Department of State material under the Freedom of Information Act (the "FOIA"), 5 U.S.C. § 552. The Department has reviewed 43 additional documents responsive to your request. We have determined that 2 documents may be released in full, 18 documents may be released in part, and 23 documents must be withheld in full. The processing of your request is ongoing.

An enclosure explains the FOIA exemptions and other grounds for withholding material. Where we have made excisions, the applicable FOIA exemptions are marked on each document. All non-exempt material that is reasonably segregable from the exempt material has been released and is enclosed. The documents that were withheld in full were withheld pursuant to Exemptions 3, 5, 6, and 7, 5 U.S.C. §§ 552(b)(3), (b)(5), (b)(6), and (b)(7)(E).

US Department of State Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor Solicitation Package/Statement of Work for An Advanced Data Management and Analysis Platform

Background:

The U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor leads the U.S. efforts to promote democracy, protect human rights and international religious freedom, and advance labor rights globally. Credible and timely human rights information and reporting is DRL's greatest asset in fulfilling this mission. However, DRL does not currently have any existing database or data management mechanism to store, share, or analyze human rights information, essential capabilities for a bureau whose mission is to effectively inform U.S. foreign policy with real time analysis of human rights conditions globally, including the identification of gross violations of human rights (GVHR) by security forces to comply with the Leahy law.

Purpose of Tasks:

DRL requires an information management system and database to allow for the collection, organization, and advanced analytics of unclassified, open source human rights information, including capabilities such as open source searching and data mining; real-time social media analysis; the collection and storage of multimedia files; the ability to tag and sort information by type, source, location, level of confidence, etc.; geographic visualization/mapping of data; the integration of geospatial imagery; trend analysis; and information sharing. These capabilities will support the implementation of the Leahy law as well as the advancement of security and human rights policy objectives more broadly.

DRL will also be partnering with the Bureau of Political-Military Affairs (PM) to provide these analytical capabilities for their unique informational requirements, and to enable better information sharing and collaboration among these and other partner bureaus.

Deliverables:

The vendor will deploy an advanced data management and analytics software to DRL and partners for a 12 month Option Year 1, and provide:

- Term software licenses for the duration of Option Year 1 and any subsequent Option Years;
- Engineering support, including installation, configuration of servers, system configuration, deployment of patches, and product upgrades;
- Implementation support, including integration of mutually agreed upon data, data modeling guidance, deployment and configuration of the software, and workflow development provided by engineers and product experts;
- Training, including in-person support for initial testing and deployment of each identified deliverable, and training documentation for deliverables as requested by operational POCs;
- Support and maintenance, software updates, technical support (both telephone and online), 24/7/365 support in the event of software failures, and publishing of

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- bug/defect fixes via patches and updates/upgrades in function and technology to maintain the operability, usability, and security of the software product;
- Privacy and civil liberties engineering assistance to evaluate and address privacy risks associated with the use of the system and any related data sources and user workflows, and in configuring and deploying appropriate risk mitigation strategies and technology features.

The Option Year 1 deliverables, to be further defined by DRL and the project team in a mutually agreed upon Project Plan at the outset of each outcome implementation, include:

Deliverables for Option Year 1:

Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor

The Period of Performance for Option Year One shall begin on 15 April 2016 and end on 14 April 2017.

For Option Year 1, the vendor will deploy an advanced data management and analytics software platform to DRL, and provide the following Option Year 1 deliverables reflecting mutually agreed upon outcomes and implementation schedule for the applicable period.

During the first six-month period, in addition to the work outlined below, the Contractor will also work with relevant employees at the Department of State to enable access to and integration of Leahy vetting database INVEST into the Palantir Gotham platform to facilitate the pursuit of the following objectives in the second six-month period, which shall begin on 15 October (pending access to the INVEST dataset). No later than October 1, 2016, The Department of State shall designate a staff member with organizational and technical expertise to facilitate the FISMA accreditation process and subsequent access to INVEST.

Outcome 1: Leahy Vetting

DRL's congressional mandate to vet recipients of U.S.-sponsored training and equipment is hampered by insufficient knowledge management and does not currently allow for search and discovery of links to past human rights abuses or proactive tracking of current human rights abuses.

The Contractor will implement Palantir Gotham to support Leahy Vetting in two phases:

Phase 1: During the first six-month phase of Option Year 1, beginning on 15 April, the Contractor will deploy and install Palantir Gotham, a data integration, search, and analysis platform to support proactive Leahy Vetting workflows and the mapping of foreign security force structures.

To support these outcomes in the first 6-month phase, the Contractor will conduct work which is not reliant on the INVEST data set, to include the following:

- Work with users in the Office of Security and Human Rights in support of Leahy Vetting to deploy, document, and model proactive vetting workflows and identify and integrate mutually agreed upon priority data sources in service of designated workflows.
- Offer training to vetters on properly utilizing Palantir Gotham for designated proactive vetting and security force mapping workflows, including but not limited to proactive research on human rights abuses by security forces in Kenya, Nigeria, Mexico, and Afghanistan, building on and expanding work completed during the base period.
- Enable users to proactively capture reports of human rights abuses perpetrated by likely recipients of future U.S. foreign assistance with configured data ingest tools:
 - Web-based forms for structured entry of instances of abuse and security force structures.
 - Web Clipper Chrome extension for capturing supporting webpage text and metadata.
 - o Front-end import of structured and unstructured data.
- Provide search and analysis of integrated data for proactive vetting workflows via Palantir Gotham capabilities, including the following (reference the attached supplement for full enumeration):
 - o Feeds to track entities and reports of interest.
 - Discovery of geospatial relationships between entities and incidents of interest.
- Configure report export templates to capture:
 - o Geo-referenced entities reportedly linked to human rights abuses.
 - Organizational charts of security units and government entities to delineate between reported entities.

Phase 2: In the second six-month phase, starting on 15 October, the Contractor will:

- Work with users in DRL functional and regional offices to gather data for analysis and mapping of country trends in human rights abuses, particularly abuses by security forces, in support of Leahy Vetting and security and human rights policy.
- Offer training to vetters and other DRL personnel on properly utilizing Palantir Gotham as a search and analysis platform to be used in policy and vetting research, planning security assistance priorities, our interactions with other bureaus and agencies, and in preparing our senior leadership for meetings and foreign travel.
- Enable DRL personnel to proactively research and map human rights violations by security forces within priority countries, including but not limited to: Kenya, Nigeria, Mexico, Honduras, Pakistan, Philippines, North Korea/DPRK, Belarus, Azerbaijan, and Afghanistan, including building on and expanding work completed during the base period. At a minimum, research and mapping should utilize the sources listed in Outcome 2 (coded conflict events databases; annual, country, and special reports; and foreign assistance information) in addition to other sources identified by DRL experts.

- Work with DRL officers to design and refine research.
- Work with DRL Leahy Vetters to complete projects initiated during Phase 1 of the baes year, focused on India, Afghanistan, and Kazakhstan. Continue to work with DRL and partners to track alleged incidents of civilian casualties and other conflict events in Syria, Iraq, and other potential expansion countries to be identified by DRL officers.

• If INVEST becomes available:,

- Work with users in the Office of Security and Human Rights in support of Leahy Vetting to model INVEST data, when authorized, and integrate it with vetting workflows.
- enable search and analysis of integrated data for Leahy Vetting workflows via Palantir Gotham capabilities (reference the attached supplement for full enumeration):
 - Provide a web-based analytics platform to derive and present key insights from the Leahy Vetting process, as identified in collaboration with target user groups.
 - Facilitate relationship discovery and the vetting of multiple units/individuals at one time using all integrated data, including historical INVEST data.
 - Boolean searches of all integrated data and documents, including structured and unstructured reporting.
 - Mapping of historical INVEST vetting data on units and individuals, and integrating this historical information into the vetting workflow for current and future searches.
 - Ability to customize and merge individual/unit names uploaded into INVEST to de-duplicate entries and reconcile name variations/aliases.
 - Configure report export templates to capture and visualize vetting decisions, analysis, and supporting documentation.
- o Enable multiple users to view, share, and collaborate on integrated vetting data and related workflows.
- Create Slate dashboards of aggregated Leahy vetting data and trends to include GVHR "hits" by unit, geographic location, and security assistance funding source, with export templates to share with larger audiences.

Outcome 2: Institutional Knowledge Management

Throughout Option Year 1, the Contractor will create an enduring Knowledge Management workflow for DRL that encompasses both user-maintained repositories and new data integrations to ensure the retention of organizational expertise that compounds over time. The Contractor will prioritize the following:

- Enable analysis of integrated data via Palantir Gotham capabilities.
- Offer training to staff on properly utilizing Palantir Gotham, including searching across all relevant, integrated data sets and analyzing documents, events, and entities
- Work with target users to identify and integrate mutually agreed upon priority data sets, in addition to:
 - o Coded conflict events data from the following data sources:

- Integrated Crisis and Early Warning System (ICEWS)
- Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED)
- Political Instability Task Force (PITF)
- START Global Terrorism Database (START)
- Annual, Country, and Special Reports from 2005 current, from the following Human Rights Organizations:
 - Amnesty International
 - Human Rights Watch
 - International Federation of Human Rights
 - UN Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights
 - International Crisis Group
 - Department of State
- Foreign assistance information from 2005 current, from the following data sources:
 - Foreignassistance.gov
 - DoD-DoS Joint Reports to Congress on Foreign Military Training
- Configure Forwarded Email Capture tool for user-driven data ingestion to facilitate future search and discovery.
- Capture user-maintained knowledge repositories through training and implementation of data ingest tools:
 - o Web-based forms for structured data entry
 - o Web Clipper Chrome extension for capturing webpage text and metadata
 - o Front-end import of structured and unstructured data
- Provide a suite of reporting and export capabilities, including:
 - Spreadsheets
 - o Interactive, configurable maps
 - Templated report exports modeled specifically for each use case, as appropriate
 - Configured web-based analytic interface to support high-profile reports, as appropriate
- Configure, as appropriate, dashboards for the visualization and exploration of aggregate data on select topics, including civilian casualties and conflict events data in Yemen and Syria, building on and expanding work completed during the base period.

Outcomes 3: Pilot Projects

As mutually agreed to by the parties, the Contractor may deliver one or more new pilot projects ("Pilots") in support of priority workflows that impact the Department of State. Pilots shall be at no additional cost for the extent of the Pilot period of performance, which will be defined for each pilot. Thereafter, the Government may elect to negotiate the inclusion of one or more successful Pilots as additional, funded deliverables under the effective Task Order. For each Pilot, the parties will agree to specific user groups, training, workflow(s), and discrete tasks. Each Pilot will be assigned a senior mission-side Business Owner and Technical Owner to oversee effective implementation.

Option Years:

The Rough Order of Magnitude (ROM) provides a schematic of potential outcomes for Option Years. Upon the exercise of an Option Year, the vendor and the State Department will draft a revised Statement of Work reflecting a mutually agreed upon proposal of outcomes and implementation schedule for the applicable period.

Evaluation Factors for Award:

The evaluation factors determining vendors qualified for consideration include:

Data Integration

Data integration capabilities for data of any size or format that support the provision of a single, secure point of access. Data integration functionality must include:

- Data-agnostic data integration, including structured, unstructured, and semistructured data integration capabilities
- Automated testing and verification of integrated data to ensure that data is flowing accurately and continuously into the software
- Automatic data processing that leaves the original data source unchanged, providing data stewards with control over their data and legacy systems
- Full indexing of unstructured data, such as documents and emails
- Structured information within the unstructured data (e.g., geographic coordinates) can be automatically extracted
- Integration of unique data sources, including web services, media (e.g., video, images, and audio), reference data (e.g., postal codes or time frameworks), and geospatial data
- Ingestion of large, static data repositories regardless of structure and scaling to tens of millions of records
- Federated search mechanisms for searching against external sources that cannot be directly ingested
- Data synchronization mechanisms to stay in sync with changing data sources and push the changes to the main repository
- Graphical interfaces for importing and structuring of small data sources, such as an Excel spreadsheet or .pdf file, through the front-end user interface with "drag and drop" functionality

Dynamic Data Modeling

Adaptable data modeling must include:

- A dynamic and generic universal data model that is object-oriented, e.g., consisting of objects (entities, events, documents, and media), their properties, and the relationships between them
- A fully adaptable data model that can accommodate additional data sources or new workflows, even after the initial data model has been defined and deployed, with the flexibility to add new data sets as needed
- A universal data model that can be configured to represent all information, such as databases, spreadsheets, text documents, XML, phone data, media, images, video, etc.

Data Entry and Curation

- Once ingested, unstructured text from documents such as .doc or .pdf files can be structured by "tagging" information to identify profiles, events, and their relationships
- Data residing in the system can be quickly and intuitively bulk-edited by users to make on-the-fly changes to data modeling decisions

Search & Discovery

Search capabilities for searching all integrated data at rapid speed. Search capabilities must include:

- Searches that query the entire repository of integrated data
- Searches are security-aware and limit the results to only the information the individual user is authorized to access
- Text-based searches including keyword, Boolean, wildcard, metaphone, and faceted searches
- Structured searches including semantic searches, temporal searches, and searches by specified fields or specific objects
- Related searches for locating all related entities, such as linked entities or entities that share a common property like phone number or last name
- Geospatial searches including radius, route, and polygon searches
- Combined searches that blend different kinds of searches into a single query
- Persistent searches that provide real-time alerting through algorithmic searching. Users enter a single search query or "watch" a specific object and receive real-time alerts whenever content that meets their criteria is added or changed
- Federated searches for simultaneously searching across multiple external data stores
- A search API for searching external data sources and a REST API to allow external sources to search against the main repository

Advanced Analytics

Embedded and integrated analysis tools for multi-faceted analysis. Analysis tools must include:

- A graph interface to visualize and analyze relationships and networks, including link, relational, and social network analysis. Entities can be connected by events, relationships, and derived connections
- A comprehensive dossier of information for a specific entity that aggregates data from all integrated sources. A "notes" component of the dossier should allow users to annotate and share work
- An interface for in-depth filtering according to a specific set of rules to analyze arbitrary datasets (e.g., search results or an entire dataset) from the top down
- A dynamic geospatial interface to understand the data through time and space and including radius, route, and polygon search functionality
 - The geospatial interface supports custom tile sets, map layer formats, and geospatial overlays, including SHP and KMZ files, that can be refreshed as new information is integrated
 - The geospatial interface provides embedded tools for temporal and frequency analysis and heatmap capabilities

- A histogram to display the frequency of objects and properties for pattern recognition
- A timeline to view objects over time for temporal analysis
- A tool to identify and visualize the flow of objects, such as payments
- A tool to drill down on a group of objects according to specific criteria
- A tabular interface for sorting and exporting relevant information as a spreadsheet (each row represents an object and each column represents a property across objects)

Ease of Use

Applications and helpers are accessible through intuitive interfaces for easy movement between tools. Interfaces must include:

- Intuitive buttons, radio buttons, and dropdown menus
- Drag-and-drop functionality between all applications (i.e., an object on the graph may be dragged into the geospatial interface)
- Incorporation of all common Windows shortcut keys
- Configurable limitations on input fields to protect against user error

Knowledge Management

Integrated knowledge management capabilities that track the pedigree, lineage, and history of all integrated data, specific features must include:

- A dynamic database for global knowledge management and complete, up-to-date awareness on how data is used, accessed, and changed over time
- Tracking of the full history of every object and all associated metadata, including properties like time of creation, contributing user, and data source
- A comprehensive and configurable audit log for granular information on every read, write, and other user interaction. The audit log stores comprehensive metadata (e.g., source, creator, creation date, modifier, modification date, viewer, view data, search history, analytical action history)
- Configurable data cleansing tools include validators (e.g., string, alphanumeric, numeric, enumeration, custom); approxes, parsers, and makers; analyst-driven data and entity resolution rules; unmerge capabilities for previously resolved data; and index parameters
- Complete information sourcing (tethered sourcing)
- Maintenance of a canonical enterprise version of data so multiple analysts can use the same data simultaneously
- Capture and retention of analytic history to allow users to recreate their thought process and analysis methods and explore and evaluate different hypotheses

Security & Access Controls

Compliance with ICD 501 and the following security features:

- Access controls to secure each and every piece of information individually in addition to traditional blanket permissions across entire data sources
- Specific degrees of access assignable to individual users and including a number of permissions (ownership, write, read, discovery, and no access)

- Role-based access controls are assignable to individual users or group of users that are stored in lists
- Access and role-based access controls that can be assigned by administrators and updated at any time
- Multi-source authentication (enterprise LDAP, PKI, ActiveDirectory, etc.) as well as Single Sign-On (SSO) capabilities

Enterprise-Wide Collaboration

Enterprise-wide collaboration tools that enable sharing while securing data must include:

- A version control model for broad collaboration and individual control of data
- Virtual "sandboxes" for investigation where users can explore data without affecting the canonical record, including a "publish" feature to share results with the enterprise when desired and without duplication

Background:

The U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor leads the U.S. efforts to promote democracy, protect human rights and international religious freedom, and advance labor rights globally. Credible and timely human rights information and reporting is DRL's greatest asset in fulfilling this mission. However, DRL does not currently have any existing database or data management mechanism to store, share, or analyze human rights information, essential capabilities for a bureau whose mission is to effectively inform U.S. foreign policy with real time analysis of human rights conditions globally, including the identification of gross violations of human rights (GVHR) by security forces to comply with the Leahy law.

Purpose of Tasks:

DRL requires an information management system and database to allow for the collection, organization, and advanced analytics of unclassified, open source human rights information, including capabilities such as open source searching and data mining; real-time social media analysis; the collection and storage of multimedia files; the ability to tag and sort information by type, source, location, level of confidence, etc.; geographic visualization/mapping of data; the integration of geospatial imagery; trend analysis; and information sharing. These capabilities will support the implementation of the Leahy law as well as the advancement of security and human rights policy objectives more broadly.

DRL will also be partnering with the Bureau of Political-Military Affairs (PM) to provide these analytical capabilities for their unique informational requirements, and to enable better information sharing and collaboration among these and other partner bureaus.

Deliverables:

The vendor will deploy an advanced data management and analytics software to DRL and partners for a 12 month Option Year 1, and provide:

- Term software licenses for the duration of Option Year 1 and any subsequent Option Years;
- Engineering support, including installation, configuration of servers, system configuration, deployment of patches, and product upgrades;

Deliverables for Option Year 1:

Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor

The Period of Performance for Option Year One shall begin on 15 April 2016 and end on 14 April 2017.

For Option Year 1, the vendor will deploy an advanced data management and analytics software platform to DRL, and provide the following Option Year 1 deliverables reflecting mutually agreed upon outcomes and implementation schedule for the applicable period.

During the first six-month period, in addition to the work outlined below, the Contractor will also work with relevant employees at the Department of State to enable access to and integration of Leahy vetting database INVEST into the Palantir Gotham platform to facilitate the pursuit of the following objectives in the second six-month period, which shall begin on 15 October (or, if sooner, upon access to the INVEST dataset).

Outcome 1: Leahy Vetting

DRL's congressional mandate to vet recipients of U.S. sponsored training and equipment under the Leahy Law is hampered by lack of a comprehensive repository of institutional knowledge, and does not currently allow for complex search and discovery of links between units and abuse events or proactive tracking gross violations of human rights by security forces.

The Contractor will implement Palantir Gotham to support Leahy Vetting in two phases:

Phase 1: During the first six-month phase of Option Year 1, beginning on 15 April, the Contractor will deploy and install Palantir Gotham, a data integration, search, and analysis platform to support proactive Leahy Vetting workflows and the mapping of foreign security force structures.

To support these outcomes in the first 6-month phase, the Contractor will conduct work which is not reliant on the INVEST data set, to include the following:

Work with users in the Office of Security and Human Rights in support of Leahy
 Vetting to deploy, document, and model proactive vetting workflows and identify

- and integrate mutually agreed upon priority data sources in service of designated workflows.

- Configure Forwarded Email Capture tool for user-driven data ingestion to facilitate future search and discovery.
- Capture user-maintained knowledge repositories through training and implementation of data ingest tools:
 - Web-based forms for structured data entry
 - Web Clipper Chrome extension for capturing webpage text and metadata
 - o Front-end import of structured and unstructured data
- Provide a suite of reporting and export capabilities, including:

- Spreadsheets
- o Interactive, configurable maps
- Templated report exports modeled specifically for each use case, as appropriate
- Configured web-based analytic interface to support high-profile reports, as appropriate

Embedded and integrated analysis tools for multi-faceted analysis. Analysis tools must include:

- A graph interface to visualize and analyze relationships and networks, including link, relational, and social network analysis. Entities can be connected by events, relationships, and derived connections
- A comprehensive dossier of information for a specific entity that aggregates data from all integrated sources. A "notes" component of the dossier should allow users to annotate and share work
- An interface for in-depth filtering according to a specific set of rules to analyze arbitrary datasets (e.g., search results or an entire dataset) from the top down

1. Root Causes of Terrorism - Siberell

Mr. Siberell, can you talk to us about what you believe to be some of the root causes of terrorism? What are the underlying factors causing people to join ISIS or Al-Qaeda and opting to carry out violence in these groups' names? What is the State Department doing to specifically address the root causes of terrorism?

2. Countering Violent Extremism - Mayorkas

Last fall, Secretary Johnson testified before our committee that the top threat to our homeland came from ISIS-inspired attacks perpetrated by self-radicalized individuals here in the United States. You reiterated that statement in your testimony.

The Fiscal Year 16 Omnibus Appropriations bill provided DHS with approximately \$10 million dollars for grants to counter violent extremism that is to be used over the next two fiscal years. \$10 million is not a lot of money, especially considering it's for stopping the top threat to our homeland. How is DHS going to ensure that it has ample resources to effectively deal with this threat and how can Congress help?

3. "Doxing" - Mayorkas

Secretary Mayorkas—in your testimony, you referenced a method by which homegrown extremists support ISIS's mission through online hacking. I think you called it "doxing". Can you explain to us in more detail how this works and how the Department can help counter this threat?

4. Visa Waiver Program and Fingerprints – Mayorkas

Secretary Mayorkas, we have discussed in the past that the name of the Visa Waiver Program is potentially a misnomer. The name suggests that we are waiving security, which is not the case. The name itself has caused a lot of concern, and probably needs to be changed. In fact, the program allows us to forge stronger security partnerships with participating countries than we might otherwise have.

Another concern that I have heard voiced is the idea that the Visa Waiver program allows people to visit the United States without ever having had their finger prints collected. Is that true? Aren't we collecting the fingerprints of every foreign traveler at the U.S. port of entry?

5. Foreign Fighter Surge Teams – Siberell

Mr. Siberell, according to reports, the United States deployed a "foreign-fighter surge team" to Belgium before the Brussels terror attack to try to improve the ability of the Belgian government to effectively track terrorists. As I understand, this team is continuing to work with the Belgian authorities even after the attack.

Can you describe for us the kinds of improvements this foreign-fighter surge team is helping the Belgians to implement? Additionally, is there a possibility for these teams to be deployed to other countries in Europe?

6. Pre-Checkpoint Security and Soft Targets -- Mayorkas

During the Brussels terror attacks, bombs killed people not on the airplane, not at the security checkpoint, but in front of several ticket counters. In every airport I've been in, the ticket counter is not part of a secured area. It's a public place.

Last month along with a number of my colleagues, I co-sponsored an amendment to the Senate FAA reauthorization bill that would increase the number of bomb-sniffing canines teams TSA is authorized to create, and explicitly allow grant funding to be used to improve security of "soft targets." I believe it passed 91 to 5. But it was only a first step.

How would we increase the security of traditionally unsecured areas of the airport and how would we do so in a way that does not further encumber the wait times of air travelers?

What steps has DHS taken toward this goal?

7. Screening of Airport Workers (both witnesses)

Secretary Mayorkas and Mr. Siberell: In the wake of the disappearance of the EgyptAir flight last week, reports surfaced that dozens of airport workers at the Charles De Gaulle airport in France had lost their security clearances over the past year for links to terrorist groups or evidence that the workers had engaged in extremist activities.

How do we help foreign airports protect against insider threats? Are DHS and the State Department actively engaged in training foreign security services on ways to counter insider threats at their airports?

8. American Foreign Fighters (both witnesses)

Last week, FBI Director Comey indicated that the rate at which Americans were leaving to join the ranks of ISIS and Al-Qaeda was dropping precipitously over the last nine months. What is the cause for this drop? How much is the result of the combined efforts of DHS and the State Department to help stop American foreign fighter travel?

9. Social Media – Mayorkas

Secretary Mayorkas, we have heard from the federal law enforcement community that there is confusion over how and when federal law enforcement units can search and scrutinize publically available social media communications.

Does DHS have a uniform policy laying out how its law enforcement officers can search social media to help prevent against terrorist attacks?

10. Preclearance Operations

Secretary Mayorkas, another tool we have to increase our border security is preclearance programs, which allows CBP officers to conduct customs and immigration screening at certain international airports, before they set foot on a plane to the United States. This Committee recently helped pass legislation to expand DHS's authority to set up these preclearance programs overseas. They are a convenience for many travelers but also another layer of homeland security.

- Can you discuss whether you think preclearance helps mitigate the risk of ISIS sympathizers or other threats from entering the United States?
- Has Congress now given you adequate tools to advance these preclearance operations programs?
