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Shared Services Vetting Board Briefing

Visa Security Coordination Center:

The National Security Investigations Division (NSID) Visa Security Coordination Center (VSCC) manages or participates in daily activities pertaining to the Visa Security Program (VSP) including the Pre-Adjudication Threat Recognition Intelligence Operations Team (PATRIOT), the MANTIS Security Advisory Opinion (SAO) vetting process, the ICE/HSI Watchlisting Cell, the Interagency Counterterrorism Team (IACT) secure vetting platform, and the VSP Social Media Pilot Program.

VSCC Statistics:

- The VSCC directly supports the HSI International Operations (IO) offices that execute the international mission of the VSP. VSP operations are currently conducted at by visaissuing posts in by contribution with domestic screening and vetting operations conducted within the National Capital Region (NCR). Two additional posts are expected to open in 2018.
- In FY 2017, the PATRIOT team screened over 2 million visa applications and recommended the refusal of over 8,500 visa applications. Among the recommended refusals, over 2,300 had some nexus to terrorism identified, a 7% increase from FY2016. Of all applications screened, over 8,900 had a nexus to terrorism, a 16% increase from FY2016.
- VSP made 821 nominations/enhancements to the terrorist watch list in FY2017.
- In FY2017, the MANTIS team vetted 121,634 applications from all visa issuing posts around the world. The MANTIS team currently screens approximately 300 to 700 applicants and 75 to 100 businesses on a daily basis. In FY17, the MANTIS team developed information and intelligence that resulted in 256 leads sent to ICE-HSI Field Offices.
- In FY2017, the Visa Security Coordination Center (VSCC) used GOSTTM to screen and vet more than 189,834 total applicants:

Key Initiatives:

Visa Fee and Expansion:

- VSP is seeking to expand the program's domestic and international footprint, operations, and value by pursuing a visa fee funded budgetary structure, to supplant congressional appropriations. A shift to fee-funding would enable growth above current rates and allowing for more effective and long-term planning. The proposed fee funding would enable HSI to expand the capabilities of its screening, vetting, analytical, and investigative operations.
- To attain fee funding, ICE is required to promulgate a federal rule through the Administrative Procedure Act's rule making process. The VSCC is spearheading the drafting of a Notice of Public Rule Making (NPRM) document, and is moving towards initial publication of a rule in the Federal Register in calendar year 2019.



National Targeting Center (NTC) & National Vetting Center (NVC) Engagement:

- The VSCC has assigned additional personnel to the National Targeting Center (NTC) in order to more robustly integrate HSI's and CBP's visa screening efforts.
- VSCC personnel are also engaged with CBP and other interagency partners in the implementation of the National Vetting Center (NVC).
- NSID has assigned additional personnel to the National Targeting Center (NTC) in order to more robustly integrate HSI's and CBP's visa screening efforts. Throughout 2018, in coordination with CBP, the following activities are expected to occur:
 - Movement of the majority of PATRIOT analysts, Program Managers, and Intelligence Research Specialists (IRSs) to the NTC.
 - Organization of the PATRIOT team into a minimum of four regions, each led by an NSID Program Manager / CBP Watch Commander, and comprised of HSI and CBP analysts and officers.
 - Teams will be jointly led by an HSI NSID Section Chief and CBP Chief Watch Commander that will oversee all PATRIOT operations.
 - Assignment of an NSID Program Manager to the NTC-based Counter-Networks Division (CND).
- NSID personnel are also engaged with CBP and other interagency partners in the implementation of the National Vetting Center (NVC).

Social Media Pilot Program:

- NSID's CTCEU & VSCC programs jointly execute the Social Media Pilot Program in furtherance of the overstay-lifecycle initiative. The premise of the initiative is to track non-immigrants from the time they file a visa application with the Department of State, to the time they enter the United States, and through the time when they either depart the United States, or until such time as they become an overstay or otherwise fail to comply with their terms of admission. This pilot program targets potential overstay violators from particular visa issuance Posts located in countries of concern and is currently being piloted at five (5) locations (Referenced in Statistics on Page 1).
- This pilot program specifically assists the VSCC/VSP in its efforts to identify the online activity, potentially derogatory information, and public safety concerns of visa applicants. It leverages social media, open source information, and analytic capabilities as a tool to provide enhanced knowledge about applicants' social media postings and online presence not found in U.S. Government holdings. Social media screening gives the U.S. Government better visibility regarding an applicant's possible engagement in criminal activity, terrorist acts or associations, and administrative immigration violations.

Visa Lifecycle Vetting Initiative (VLVI) Contract Efforts:

 Currently, NSID contract support services for both the VSCC and CTCEU are expiring in August, 2018. As NSID, along with other DHS stakeholders, performs the majority of visa vetting activities within DHS, a determination had been made by NSID and HSI leadership to combine the aforementioned contract services into a new, overarching contract that will assist with streamlining and centralizing the current screening and vetting processes.

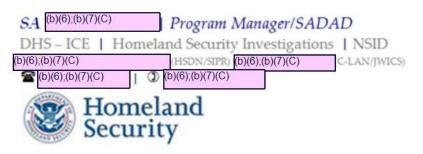

Visa Security Program Visa Fee

To further U.S. national security objectives related to Department of Homeland Security (DHS) authorities granted in the Homeland Security Act of 2002, the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI)-led Visa Security Program (VSP) is pursuing a comprehensive operational and programmatic expansion plan that would expand visa security screening and vetting operations to more visa issuing posts overseas, and thus increase the U.S. government's ability to identify, exploit, and disrupt transnational terrorist and criminal networks seeking to harm the U.S. at the earliest part of the visa lifecycle. To support this effort, VSP is proposing a visa applicant user fee, which would supplant congressional appropriations, and fund the current and future operations of VSP, and potentially other border security related priorities for the Administration and for DHS.

Rationale for Visa Fee Proposal:

- Since the establishment of the VSP, Congressionally appropriated funding has enabled the program to fulfill the minimum statutory requirement of continued expansion of the VSP to high-risk posts each year. However, to execute an increased rate of expansion beyond the current average rate of two-three new VSP posts per year, the program will require substantial yearly funding increases. These funds are needed both to open new international VSP posts, and to ensure the requisite corresponding growth of international and domestic operations in the National Capital Region (NCR) that directly support the overseas element of VSP.
- Historically, increased yearly appropriations for VSP have not been consistent, and have not been substantial enough to support a growth rate beyond a two-three post average. Similarly, inconsistent appropriations have restricted the ability of HSI to effectively forecast its long-term future VSP growth. Because the process of identifying and opening a VSP post requires significant lead time and often requires funds to be expended well before a post is opened, the program needs the assurance that the required budget will be available many years ahead of time, a level of visibility the VSP has not traditionally had.
- Based on a fee-study conducted by the VSP, HSI assesses that a shift from congressional funding to a fee-funded budgetary structure would address these issues. Fee-funding would result in the collection of funds well in excess of the congressionally appropriated funds the VSP has historically received. This would in turn enable growth to more than two-three posts per year and enhance budget visibility to allow for more effective and long-term planning for the future of the program.
- While VSP could execute its expansion plan without fee-funding, this would require significant increases from historic Congressional funding commitments. There is precedent for other DHS entities as well as the Department of State (State) in charging visa applicants for services, including those related to national security priorities. Funding VSP expansion through fees would eliminate the burden to the taxpayer and ultimately charge the user of screening and vetting services, the visa applicant.
- Additionally, HSI believes that growth via fee-funding would not only allow for a physical expansion of the program to more posts, but would also enable HSI to expand the overall capabilities and value that the VSP provides. Specifically, through an increase in its screening and vetting operations domestically and presence in more diplomatic posts abroad, VSP gains



an enhanced ability to identify potential national security and/or public safety threats; disrupt the travel of suspect individuals; and launch investigations (in conjunction with appropriate U.S. and foreign partners) into transnational criminal and/or terrorist affiliated networks operating in the U.S. and abroad.

Current Status of Visa Fee Initiative:

- To attain fee funding, ICE is required to promulgate a federal rule through the Administrative Procedure Act's rule making process. The VSP is spearheading the drafting of a Notice of Public Rule Making (NPRM) document, and is moving towards initial publication of a rule in the Federal Register at some point in 2019.
- The draft NPRM document proposes to establish a fee to be charged to non-immigrant visa (NIV) applicants, excluding those classes that are not assessed a fee by State. Based on the fee study conducted, VSP has determined that the proposed fee would ensure revenues sufficient to recover the full cost of VSP activities domestically and abroad, eliminating the need for congressionally appropriated funding.
- Currently, VSP operations are conducted in [b)(7) countries, at [b)(1) of the total 223 visa-issuing posts around the world. Since the program's inception, VSP has grown at an average rate of two-three posts per year. If fee-funding is attained, VSP estimates that it could sustain a significantly accelerated international growth rate (up to 8 posts per year), in addition to a corresponding growth of the VSP screening and vetting apparatus domestically.

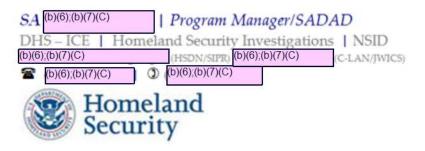

To support this effort, VSP is proposing a visa applicant user fee, which would supplant congressional appropriations, and fund the current and future operations of VSP, and potentially other border security related priorities for the Administration and for DHS.

Rationale for Visa Fee Proposal:

- Since the establishment of the VSP, Congressionally appropriated funding has enabled the program to fulfill the minimum statutory requirement of continued expansion of the VSP to high-risk posts each year. However, to execute an increased rate of expansion beyond the current average rate of two-three new VSP posts per year, the program will require substantial yearly funding increases. These funds are needed both to open new international VSP posts, and to ensure the requisite corresponding growth of international and domestic operations in the National Capital Region (NCR) that directly support the overseas element of VSP.
- Historically, increased yearly appropriations for VSP have not been consistent, and have not been substantial enough to support a growth rate beyond a two-three post average. Similarly, inconsistent appropriations have restricted the ability of HSI to effectively forecast its long-term future VSP growth. Because the process of identifying and opening a VSP post requires significant lead time and often requires funds to be expended well before a post is opened, the program needs the assurance that the required budget will be available many years ahead of time, a level of visibility the VSP has not traditionally had.
- Based on a fee-study conducted by the VSP, HSI assesses that a shift from congressional funding to a fee-funded budgetary structure would address these issues. Fee-funding would result in the collection of funds well in excess of the congressionally appropriated funds the VSP has historically received. This would in turn enable growth to more than two-three posts per year and enhance budget visibility to allow for more effective and long-term planning for the future of the program.
- While VSP could execute its expansion plan without fee-funding, this would require significant increases from historic Congressional funding commitments. There is precedent



for other DHS entities as well as the Department of State (State) in charging visa applicants for services, including those related to national security priorities. Funding VSP expansion through fees would eliminate the burden to the taxpayer and ultimately charge the user of screening and vetting services, the visa applicant.

• Additionally, HSI believes that growth via fee-funding would not only allow for a physical expansion of the program to more posts, but would also enable HSI to expand the overall capabilities and value that the VSP provides. Specifically, through an increase in its screening and vetting operations domestically and presence in more diplomatic posts abroad, VSP gains an enhanced ability to identify potential national security and/or public safety threats; disrupt the travel of suspect individuals; and launch investigations (in conjunction with appropriate U.S. and foreign partners) into transnational criminal and/or terrorist affiliated networks operating in the U.S. and abroad.

Current Status of Visa Fee Initiative:

- To attain fee funding, ICE is required to promulgate a federal rule through the Administrative Procedure Act's rule making process. The VSP is spearheading the drafting of a Notice of Public Rule Making (NPRM) document, and is moving towards initial publication of a rule in the Federal Register at some point in 2019.
- The draft NPRM document proposes to establish a fee to be charged to non-immigrant visa (NIV) applicants, excluding those classes that are not assessed a fee by State. Based on the fee study conducted, VSP has determined that the proposed fee would ensure revenues sufficient to recover the full cost of VSP activities domestically and abroad, eliminating the need for congressionally appropriated funding.
- Currently, VSP operations are conducted in (b)(7)/(VE) countries, at (b)(7)/(VE) of the total 223 visa-issuing posts around the world. Since the program's inception, VSP has grown at an average rate of two-three posts per year. If fee-funding is attained, VSP estimates that it could sustain a significantly accelerated international growth rate (up to 8 posts per year), in addition to a corresponding growth of the VSP screening and vetting apparatus domestically.



U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Response to Budget Briefing Issue Papers Request (T18001) February 13, 2018

Background

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), National Security Investigations Division's (NSID) is responsible for two facets of screening and vetting for visa applicants as follows:

- The Visa Security Program (VSP) maximizes the visa screening and vetting process as a counterterrorism tool to identify, exploit and disrupt transnational terrorist and criminal networks seeking to harm the United States. In order to execute this mandate, the Visa Security Coordination Center (VSCC) utilizes various screening and vetting mechanisms, primarily comprised of the Pre-Adjudication Threat Recognition Intelligence Operations Team (PATRIOT), the MANTIS Security Advisor Opinion (SAO) process, the ICE-HSI Watchlisting Cell, the Kingfisher Expansion Program (KFE) SAO process, and the Social Media Pilot Program.
- Counterterrorism and Criminal Exploitation Unit (CTCEU) combats national security vulnerabilities and prevents terrorists and other criminals from exploiting the nation's immigration system. The pursuit of these violators provides significant support to the "disrupt and deter" counterterrorism strategy of the United States. CTCEU accomplishes its mission by reviewing the immigration status of known and suspected terrorists, by combating criminal exploitations of the Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP), and by leveraging HSI's expertise with partnering agencies in identifying national security threats.

Challenge:

Currently, NSID contract support services for both the VSCC and CTCEU are expiring in August, 2018. As NSID, along with other DHS stakeholders, performs the majority of visa vetting activities within DHS, a determination had been made by NSID and HSI leadership to combine the aforementioned contract services into a new, overarching contract that will assist with streamlining and centralizing the current screening and vetting process. NSID, in conjunction with the Office of Acquisitions (OAQ), determined that a single-award Blanket Purchase Agreement (BPA) would be the best acquisition vehicle for the Visa Lifecycle Vetting Initiative Contract.



Benefits & Current State:

The orders under the proposed BPA are so integrally related that only a single vendor would be able to efficiently and effectively provide the VLVI support services. The initial task order will be awarded for both CTCEU and VSCC/VSP support as services between the two offices sometimes overlap. In such instances, a single contractor following a single set of operating procedures is necessary to ensure a proper and effective workflow is initiated. For example, both VSP's Social Media Pilot Program and CTCEU's Open Source Team (OST) are endeavors designed to identify the online activity, potentially derogatory information, and public safety concerns of applicants from the time of visa application and, if applicable, through visa issuance and entry into the United States. The program leverages social media, open source information, and analytic capabilities as a tool to provide enhanced knowledge about applicants' social media postings and online presence not found in U.S. Government holdings. Social media screening gives the United States government better visibility regarding an applicant's possible engagement in criminal activity, terrorist acts or associations, and administrative immigration violations. Subsequent task orders will be issued separately for each office or for combined support depending on the need. Due to the overlap between the two offices, having standardized processes, cross training, and removal of proprietary barriers to allow for increased and more fluid communications is vital to support the critical screening and vetting operations.

The expansion of CTCEU and VSP tasks, which were not outlined in the original Performance Work Statements (PWS), included many VSP tasks that were added but never funded, and CTCEU initiatives that were funded from surge money. The addition of these tasks, which have now become part of daily operations for VSP and CTCEU, will result in an increase in the cost over the current contract in place. For VSP, these tasks include the MANTIS Security Advisor Opinion (SAO) process, the ICE-HSI Watchlisting Cell, the Kingfisher Expansion Program (KFE) SAO process and the Social Media Pilot Program. For CTCEU, these tasks include staffing Open Source Teams, Training Teams, CTCEU Report production, Domestic Mantis, and ADIS Backlog resolution. These tasks are no longer being performed on an ad-hoc basis or outside of normal duty hours and have become essential to the day-to-day operations and must be included in the Firm Fixed Price (FFP) over the course of the VLVI contract.

If the estimated cost of the VLVI contract is not funded, there will be a significant impact on NSID's capabilities to screen and vet immigrants and nonimmigrants attempting to exploit the U.S. immigration system.

The VSCC and CTCEU are completing the final documentation necessary to facilitate the VLVI Request for Proposal (RFP) process. Upon final review and approval, OAQ will submit the RFP to vendors for their response and bid. We anticipate possible technical evaluations of the vendor proposals in April, 2018, taking place in Dallas, TX.



U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Response to Budget Briefing Issue Papers Request (T18001) February 13, 2018

Visa Security Program Expansion

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), through its Visa Security Program (VSP), assigns special agents to diplomatic posts worldwide to conduct law enforcement visa security activities and provides training to Department of State (DOS) Consular Affairs (CA) officers regarding threats, trends, and other topics affecting visa adjudication.

- The VSP is authorized by Section 428 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 and implemented by a 2003 Memorandum of Understanding between the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security.
- HSI special agents deployed overseas utilize available investigative resources to identify, exploit and disrupt the travel of suspect individuals and applicants.
- VSP operations are supported through screening and vetting of visa applicants through the Pre-Adjudicated Threat Recognition and Intelligence Operations Team (PATRIOT), an interagency endeavor with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP).
- VSP operations are currently conducted at 33 visa-issuing posts in 26 countries with domestic screening and vetting operations conducted within the National Capital Region (NCR).

The VSP is a bifurcated program with operations shared between the HSI National Security Investigations Division (NSID) and HSI International Operations (IO). Details relating to VSP's expansion in Fiscal Years (FY) 2017 and 2018 have been provided to NSID by IO and are summarized below:

- In October 2017, the President listed expansion of the Visa Security Program (VSP) to all high risk posts as part of the administration's Immigration priorities. Further, Congress mandates ICE to continue to program and budget for continued expansion of the VSP to high-threat locations.
- ICE is committed to an aggressive expansion of the VSP through the deployment of HSI special agents to strategically important visa-issuing posts. However, current expansion is limited by funding, resources, and space.
- In FY2017, ICE received an \$18M adjustment to VSP's base appropriations to fund program expansion.
 - As a result, in FY 2017, HSI expanded VSP operations to (b)(7)(E)

 - In FY 2018, HSI is expanding operations tq^{(b)(7)(E)}



VSP is exploring additional expansion in FY 2018 and 2019 to (b)(7)(E)

However, expansion to these posts is subject to the availability of funds.

- To date in FY2018, HSI's VSP budget remains at the FY 2017 enacted levels, which does not fund expansion to additional posts. Regarding the potential for remote vetting operations, there are unique scenarios where remote screening and vetting can be implemented and sustainable. However, due to the limitations of remote vetting, expansion of operations with a dedicated HSI special agent at post remains VSP's primary expansion model in order to meet VSP's operational objectives and mandates.
- To support a more robust and consistent expansion plan, VSP is proposing a visa applicant user fee, which would supplant congressional appropriations, and fund future operations of the VSP. A separate issue paper on this subject has been provided as part of this tasking.

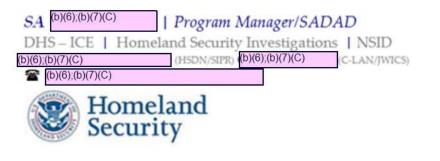

Current State (Where are we now?)

- The HSI NSID VSCC manages a priority program for ICE that plays a critical role in the U.S. government's efforts to vet and screen visa applicants; identify those that constitute potential national security and/or public safety threats; disrupt the travel of suspect individuals; and launch investigations into criminal and/or terrorist affiliated networks operating in the U.S. and abroad.
- VSCC is comprised of a Unit Chief, two (2) Section Chiefs, nine (9) Program Managers (3 additional pending), five (5) Intelligence Research Specialists (IRSs), 1 Management and Program Analyst, and 29 contract analysts that are responsible for carrying out part of the VSP screening, vetting, analytical, and investigative support mission mandated by the Homeland Security Act of 2002.

- Ultimately, NSID envisions a VSP management structure in which NSID manages the entirety of HQs element of the VSP, including the administration of the portions of the VSP budget that align with the programmatic responsibilities of the VSCC.
- Currently, VSCC anticipates that a fee-funded budgetary structure would be implemented beginning in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021. Until that occurs (FY18-FY21), VSCC will require funding to execute and expand its current screening, vetting, analytical, and investigative support mission in the NCR, and to facilitate its continued growth as a primary player in DHS's visa security vetting and investigative mandate.

<u>Personnel</u>: During FYs 18-20, NSID would acquire (insert number) existing and/or vacant IO VSP-funded positions/IPNs needed to manage VSCC's mission and operations.

<u>Duties</u>: By the time VSP implements a fee-funded budgetary structure in FY21, the following HQ leadership and program management functions of the VSP would become the responsibility of NSID:

 - Prior contract Performance Work Statements did not include critical tasks that are now part of standard VSP operations, such MANTIS, PATRIOT, SCIF Project, Watchlisting, and Social Media vetting.
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Personnel:

- NSID requires additional personnel to effectively facilitate continued program expansion.
- IPNs required: 3 vacant IPNs from IO
 - 1. IPN1: Budget & Contract Management/Acquisition
 - 2. IPN2: Program Manager Fee Expansion Management
 - 3. IPN3: Program Manager Training and IRS Pilot Programs
- Roles & Responsibilities:

- 1. The Budget & Contract Management IPN
 - Primarily responsible for managing the VLVI contract and any future contracts to be assumed by the VSCC.
- 2. The Fee Expansion Management IPN
 - Primarily responsible for managing functions associated with anticipated transition to a fee-funded VSP
- 3. The Training and IRS Pilot Programs IPN
 - Primarily responsible for initiating the development of two pilot programs that VSCC proposes to conduct with IO VSP
 - i. VSCC Training Pilot Program
 - This pilot centers on a two training programs spearheaded by VSCC.
 - VSP Deployment Enhancement Training: The first would be directed towards VSP special agents rotating outbound, and formalizing the currently adhoc interactions that some VSP agents have with VSCC analysts and IRSs that cover their posts prior to deployment. The goal of the training would be to provide the outbound VSP special agents with postspecific threat and trend briefings, that would either integrate into VSIC or serve as an add-on to the current VSIC training course.
 - Consular Affairs Training Program: The second would be directed towards Consular Officers at VSP posts. The goal of this training would be to utilize VSCC resources (PMs, analysts, and IRSs) with subject matter expertise in a particular region to work alongside VSP special agents deployed abroad to conduct quarterly training to Consular Officers at VSP posts. This would help assure adherence to the statutorily required consular training mission of the VSP and address concerns on lack of training cited in GAO and OIG reports.
 - ii. VSCC IRS/Analytical cell
 - This pilot centers on the development of an IRS cell that would operate alongside contract analysts and PMs to identify trends and threats
 - This position would also work alongside IO to increase VSCC's role in VSP post site selection and threat assessments.

Other potential sources of funds from IO:

- HQs TDY (FY17 \$144,000)
- HQs TCS (FY17 \$37,483)
- HQs Training (FY17 \$273,738)
- HQs PCD? (FY17 \$34,470)

Impact on IO:

- VSCC has suggested the reallocation of a portion of appropriated funding from IO-Visa Security Program to NSID-VSCC. VSCC anticipates that this would facilitate a more effective and streamlined approach to the management and leadership of the entirety of the program, with a minimal impact on IO activities and operations.
- NSID proposal enhances ability of IO to accomplish the following:
 - Footprint overseas increased
 - o Minimal impact on operating budget for overseas posts
 - o Demonstrate added value of program to COM, State, interagency
 - Address GAO and IG findings
 - Continued flexibility to allow VSP agents to support attaché office as a whole and other investigations

- Estimated costs: First year \$29 million; Full value of contract \$199 million

Way forward:

- Fund VSP portion of VLVI contract for FY19 through acquisition of contract portion of IO-VSP operating budget.
- Funding requirements should be projected utilizing an anticipated overseas expansion to 2 posts per year in FY18, FY19, and FY20, prior to fee collection occurring.
- Currently, the IGCE for the VLVI contract accounts for a cadre of 40 analysts for the base year (FY19) and 47 analysts for the first year (FY20). To cut costs or to prevent a significant increase in funding

needed for the FYs leading up to fee funding, these numbers can potentially be reduced to roughly mirror the number of VSP posts (again, utilizing the 2 post per year expansion baseline), therefore necessitating approximately 35 analysts in FY18, 37 analysts in FY19, and 39 analysts in FY20.

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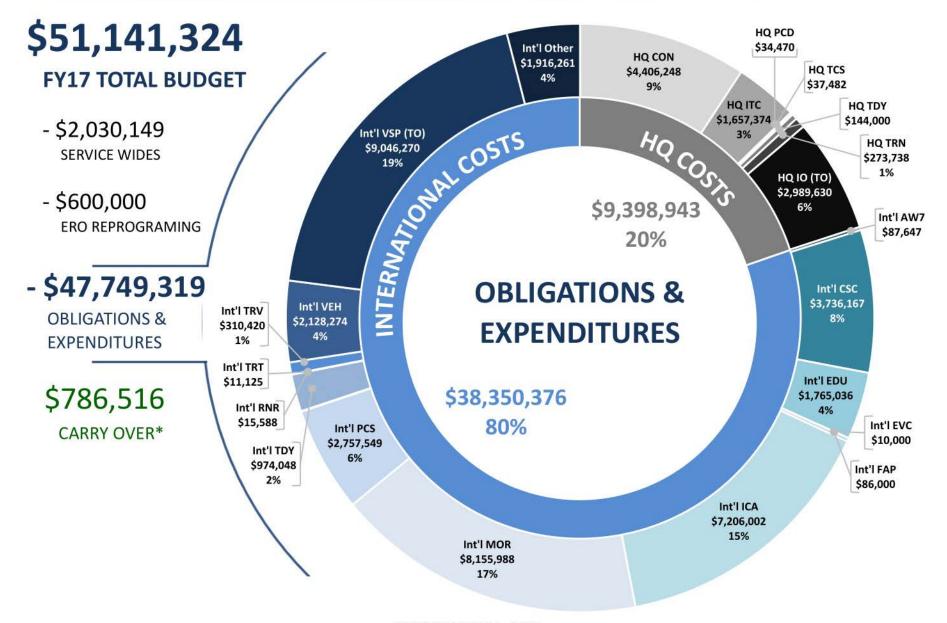

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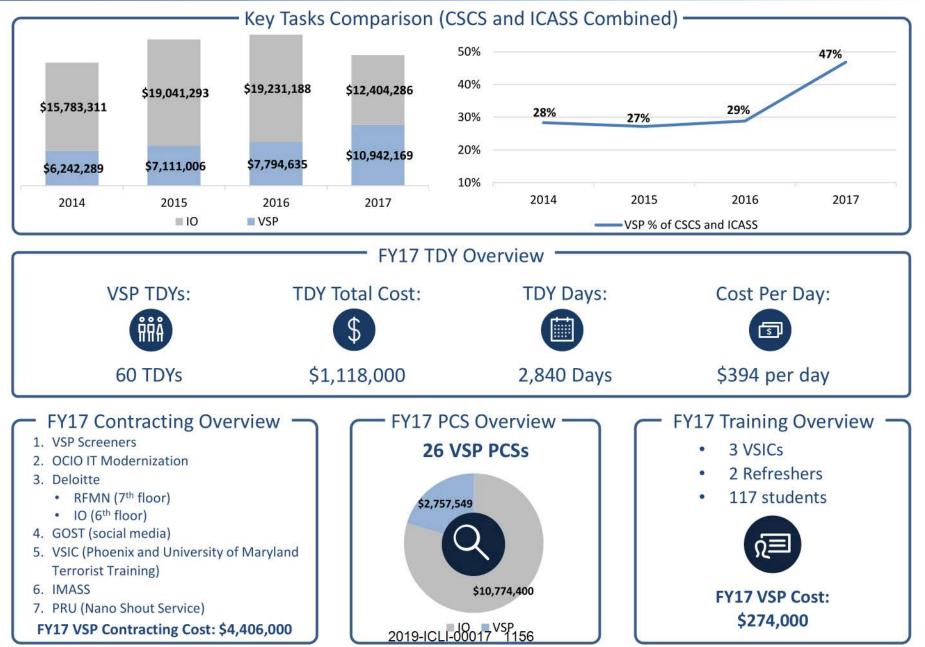

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- In furtherance of the national security mission of the U.S. government and of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)-led Visa Security Program (VSP) leverages resources in the National Capital Region (NCR) and at diplomatic posts overseas to vet and screen visa applicants; identify those that constitute potential national security and/or public safety threats; disrupt the travel of suspect individuals; and launch investigations into criminal and/or terrorist affiliated networks operating in the U.S. and abroad.
- To further U.S. national security objectives related to DHS authorities granted in the Homeland Security Act of 2002, VSP is pursuing a comprehensive operational and programmatic expansion plan that would expand visa security screening and vetting operations to more visa issuing posts overseas, and thus increase the U.S. government's ability to identify, exploit, and disrupt transnational terrorist and criminal networks seeking to harm the U.S. at the earliest part of the visa lifecycle.
- To support this effort, VSP is proposing a visa applicant user fee, which would supplant congressional appropriations, and fund the current and future operations of VSP, and potentially other border security related priorities for the Administration and for DHS. A conversion of funding for VSP from appropriated funds to fee funding is advantageous for a number of reasons:

Increased Funding Needed to Support Increased Growth Rate

- The historic VSP expansion rate has been limited by the amount of Federal appropriations provided. To execute an increased rate of expansion, VSP will require yearly funding increases to open new international posts as well as support existing international and domestic operations. Rates of historic appropriated funding increases would not support the proposed increase in post expansion rates.
- Currently, VSP operations are conducted in 26 countries, (b)(7)(E) visa-issuing posts around the world. If fee funding is attained, the VSP would have a projected footprint (b)(7)(posts by 2030, a growth rate of approximately(b) new posts per year, a marked increase from its current average of three posts per year.

> Long-term Budget Visibility Required to Plan Expansion

- The process of identifying and opening a VSP post requires significant lead time and often requires funds to be expended well before a post is opened. To execute international post expansion to an average rate of (b)(7)(E) posts per year, VSP will require not only the funding amount needed to support expanded operations, but will also need the assurance that the required budget will be available many years ahead of time.
- Historically, VSP has not had the appropriate level of budget visibility needed to make expansion commitments several years ahead of time, fee funding would allow for this budget visibility.

> Fee-funding Shifts Funding Burden Away from U.S. Taxpayer

 VSP could execute its expansion plan without fee funding, but this would require significant increases from historic congressional funding commitments. There is precedent for other DHS entities as well as DOS in charging visa applicants for services, including those related to national security priorities.

• Funding VSP expansion through fees would eliminate the burden to the taxpayer and ultimately charge the user of screening and vetting services, the visa applicant.

BACKGROUND:

- The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) proposes to establish a fee to be charged by the Visa Security Program (VSP) to non-immigrant visa (NIV) applicants. DHS proposes to set the fee at \$18.75, applicable to all NIV applications, excluding those visa classes that are not assessed a fee by the Department of State (DOS). DHS has determined that setting the fee at \$18.75 will ensure fee revenue is sufficient to recover the full cost of VSP activities. Collections of the proposed fee will enable the VSP to be funded solely through fee revenue and eliminate the need for congressionally-appropriated funding.
- VSP currently operates (b)(7)(international posts. To further U.S. national security objectives related to DHS authorities granted in the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (Pub. L 107-296, §428), VSP intends to expand operations to a total (b)(7)(international posts at an average rate of (b)(7)(E) posts per year.
- Selection of expansion posts is based on an established site selection process that considers a range of qualitative and quantitative information, including current intelligence and findings from extensive consultations with DOS, the Law Enforcement (LE) community, and intelligence organizations. This site selection process includes three steps:
 - 1. A data driven risk-based post evaluation.
 - 2. An analysis of current threat reporting and intelligence.
 - 3. An assessment of each post's expansion capabilities.
- This site selection process is conducted annually and largely assesses risk of terrorist travel to the United States. However, based on administration and DHS priorities, it also considers other national security threats posed by transnational criminal organizations. Based on this site selection process, DHS leadership has approved the goal of expanding operations to [h](7] total international posts. This expansion goal is estimated to be achieved by 2031.
 - Rationale for VSP Fee Proposal
 - VSP is funded through Federal appropriations, which have been sufficient to expand operations by an average of approximately(b)(7)(E) international posts per year while also funding existing operations (both international and domestic VSP operations). VSP intends to increase the rate of expansion to an average of(b)(7)(E) posts per year. To execute this increased rate of expansion, VSP will require yearly funding increases to open new international posts as well as support existing international and domestic operations.
 - The historic VSP expansion rate has been limited by the amount of Federal appropriations provided. Transitioning to fee funding will provide VSP with a reliable source of revenue that will be sufficient to fund planned expansion.

Table 1 (To be entered) provides historic VSP funding amounts and forecasted expansion costs.

Cost Basis for Fee

a. Overview

VSP conducted a fee study that considered all of the costs required to sustain current VSP operations and achieve its operations expansion goal. VSP intends to expand operations to a total of 130 posts at an average rate of eight (8) posts per year. This expansion goal is estimated to be achieved in 2031 so VSP forecasted operating costs for eleven (11) years beginning in FY21 (which is the estimated timeframe for enactment of the proposed rule and fee).

VSP operating costs consist of International Operations and Domestic HQ components. Table 2 provides cost estimates for the VSP during the expansion timeframe.

b. Operating Cost Forecasting Methodologies

i. Forecasting Operating Costs with Standardized HSI Cost Figures

The HSI Budget Formulation and Strategic Planning Unit provided VSP with standardized cost forecasting figures that are the source of record for HSI cost forecasting. These cost figures provide forecasting estimates for all operating costs associated with staffing an HSI employee including: standard benefits, overseas allowances (by DOS standards) for cost of living adjustments (COLA), foreign post differential and danger pay, International Cooperative Administrative Support Services (ICASS), Capital Security Cost Sharing (CSCS), computer/laptop purchase/licenses, ICE service-wide costs (ICE overhead costs including HR, IT, telecommunications, professional development, working capital fund etc.), domestic backfill costs (hiring/training), International Operations contracts, operational travel, furniture pool, vehicles (soft or hard), fleet operations and maintenance, overseas IT contracts, Permanent Change of Station (PCS) moves, R&R travel, and tour renewal travel. These cost figures are delineated by region, occupational series, and pay grade.

ii. Forecasting Operating Costs Not Contained in Standardized HSI Cost Figures

To forecast costs that are specific to VSP and not included in standardized HSI cost forecasts, VSP used the best available information and appropriate forecasting methodology. These methodologies are explained in subsequent sections.

c. International Operating Costs

i. International Operating Costs based Standardized HSI Cost Figures

a. International Special Agents

ICE assigns special agents with expertise in immigration law and counterterrorism to U.S. diplomatic posts overseas to perform visa security activities. To calculate the operating costs for international special agents, VSP used the following steps:

- 1. Identify expansion posts for a given year.
- 2. Forecast the visa application volume at each post that will operate in that year.
- 3. Calculate the expected screening and vetting workload for special agents at each post based on forecasted screening hit rates.
- 4. Calculate the total number of special agent working hours required to cover screening and vetting workload.
- 5. Calculate the number of special agents to cover required working hours.
- 6. Calculate the cost of the required number of special agents at each post.

In calculating the cost of international special agents, VSP limited the number of special agents at any post to a total of (b)(7)(E) based on known space limitations at most posts. Additionally, VSP assumes a minimum of (b)(7)(E) special agents at any post regardless of visa application volume, based on standard international law enforcement staffing practices. Table 3 provides the cost estimates for international special agents during the expansion timeframe.

b. Foreign Service National Investigators (FSN-I)

VSP employs FSN-I to assist international special agents and facilitate visa security activities. VSP used average FSN-I salaries and bonuses by region to calculate the operating costs for FSN-I. ii. International Operating Costs Not Contained Standardized HSI Cost Figures

The standardized cost forecasting figures provided by the HSI Budget Formulation and Strategic Planning Unit account for the majority of VSP cost forecasts. However, VSP incurs costs that are not accounted for in the HSI standard. To forecast these costs, VSP used a forecasting methodology specific to one (1) international cost area: International Post Information Technology (IT) Bandwidth Upgrades.

a. International Post IT Bandwidth Upgrades

IT upgrades at international posts are often needed to supply the bandwidth required to conduct VSP operations. To forecast costs of upgrading a new posts and sustaining infrastructure at existing posts, VSP acquired the historical costs of upgrading international HSI posts from representatives of the ICE Office of the Chief Information Officer (OCIO). VSP calculated an average cost for upgrading a new post (\$51,819) and sustaining existing post bandwidth (\$38,460). ii. Domestic HQ Operating Costs Not Contained in Standardized HSI Cost Figures

The standardized cost forecasting figures provided by the HSI Budget Formulation and Strategic Planning Unit account for the majority of VSP cost forecasts. However, VSP incurs costs that are not accounted for in the HSI standard. To forecast these costs, VSP used forecasting methodologies specific to six (6) domestic HQ cost areas: domestic analyst costs, contract costs, office expansion costs, social media initiative costs, enhanced training costs, and fee collection costs.

a. Domestic Analysts

Screening and vetting activities are performed by domestic analysts to assist special agents at international posts. VSP uses both contractor analysts and Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officers to screen and vet visa applications associated with the PATRIOT process as well as the Security Advisory Opinion (SAO) request process. VSP forecasted the

required number of analysts based on projected visa screening and vetting volume applied to historical screening and vetting productivity metrics and Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) quotas. Domestic analysts cost forecasts are based on budget figures provided to the Senate Appropriations Committee in November 2015.

b. Contract Costs

VSP hires contractors to support operations in areas such as IT development, training, and other advisory services. Costs for contractor resources were held as a constant percentage of total HQ costs (based on FY15 budget). Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP contract costs.

c. Office Expansion Costs

VSP will require additional office space as the program expands. To forecast the cost of acquiring additional office space, VSP worked with representatives from the General Services Administration (GSA) to estimate the cost of acquiring an additional floor in the current NSID HQ facility. Included in this estimate was the build-out of Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility (SCIF) facilities as well as traditional office space. These estimates were used as a benchmark to calculate the cost of developing office space to house all domestic personnel in each year of the expansion timeframe. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP office expansion costs.

d. Social Media Initiative Costs

VSP forecasted costs associated with the expansion of its social media initiative by first using pilot program costs as a benchmark and then applying those benchmark costs to all new VSP posts. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP social media initiative costs.

e. Enhanced Training Costs

VSP supplies training and conducts regional conferences that are specific to VSP personnel and are not included in standard HSI training forecasting figures. VSP used FY 2016 cost estimates for training and conferences as a baseline for future costs. Baseline costs were then increased proportional to VSP international personnel growth. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP training costs.

f. Fee Collection Costs

VSP will be required to build and maintain IT infrastructure and to establish other support operations to facilitate the logistics of collecting the proposed fee. VSP estimated the cost of fee collections IT and personnel using existing fee collection costs incurred by the Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP) as a benchmark. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP fee collection costs.

BACKGROUND:

- The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) proposes to establish a fee to be charged by the Visa Security Program (VSP) to non-immigrant visa (NIV) applicants. DHS proposes to set the fee at \$18.75, applicable to all NIV applications, excluding those visa classes that are not assessed a fee by the Department of State (DOS). DHS has determined that setting the fee at \$18.75 will ensure fee revenue is sufficient to recover the full cost of VSP activities. Collections of the proposed fee will enable the VSP to be funded solely through fee revenue and eliminate the need for congressionally-appropriated funding.
- VSP currently operates in ^(b)/_{T/F} international posts. To further U.S. national security objectives related to DHS authorities granted in the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (Pub. L 107-296, §428), VSP intends to expand operations to a total of ^(b)/_E international posts at an average rate of ^(b)/_(C) posts per year.
- Selection of expansion posts is based on an established site selection process that considers a range of qualitative and quantitative information, including current intelligence and findings from extensive consultations with DOS, the Law Enforcement (LE) community, and intelligence organizations. This site selection process includes three steps:
 - 1. A data driven risk-based post evaluation.
 - 2. An analysis of current threat reporting and intelligence.
 - 3. An assessment of each post's expansion capabilities.
- This site selection process is conducted annually and largely assesses risk of terrorist travel to the United States. However, based on administration and DHS priorities, it also considers other national security threats posed by transnational criminal organizations. Based on this site selection process, DHS leadership has approved the goal of expanding operations to 130 total international posts. This expansion goal is estimated to be achieved by 2031.
 - Rationale for VSP Fee Proposal
 - VSP is funded through Federal appropriations, which have been sufficient to expand operations by an average of approximately (b)(7)(E) international posts per year while also funding existing operations (both international and domestic VSP operations). VSP intends to increase the rate of expansion to an average of (b)(7)(E) posts per year. To execute this increased rate of expansion, VSP will require yearly funding increases to open new international posts as well as support existing international and domestic operations.
 - The historic VSP expansion rate has been limited by the amount of Federal appropriations provided. Transitioning to fee funding will provide VSP with a reliable source of revenue that will be sufficient to fund planned expansion. Table 1 (To be entered) provides historic VSP funding amounts and forecasted expansion costs.

Cost Basis for Fee

a. Overview

VSP conducted a fee study that considered all of the costs required to sustain current VSP operations and achieve its operations expansion goal. VSP intends to expand operations to a total of (b)(7) posts at an average rate of (b)(7)(E) posts per year. This expansion goal is estimated to be achieved in 2031 so VSP forecasted operating costs for eleven (11) years beginning in FY21 (which is the estimated timeframe for enactment of the proposed rule and fee).

VSP operating costs consist of International Operations and Domestic HQ components. Table 2 provides cost estimates for the VSP during the expansion timeframe.

b. Operating Cost Forecasting Methodologies

i. Forecasting Operating Costs with Standardized HSI Cost Figures

To forecast costs that are specific to VSP and not included in standardized HSI cost forecasts, VSP used the best available information and appropriate forecasting methodology. These methodologies are explained in subsequent sections.

- 3. Calculate the expected screening and vetting workload for special agents at each post based on forecasted screening hit rates.
- 4. Calculate the total number of special agent working hours required to cover screening and vetting workload.
- 5. Calculate the number of special agents to cover required working hours.
- 6. Calculate the cost of the required number of special agents at each post.

b. Contract Costs

VSP hires contractors to support operations in areas such as IT development, training, and other advisory services. Costs for contractor resources were held as a constant percentage of total HQ costs (based on FY15 budget). Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP contract costs.

c. Office Expansion Costs

VSP will require additional office space as the program expands. To forecast the cost of acquiring additional office space, VSP worked with representatives from the General Services Administration (GSA) to estimate the cost of acquiring an additional floor in the current NSID HQ facility. Included in this estimate was the build-out of Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility (SCIF) facilities as well as traditional office space. These estimates were used as a benchmark to calculate the cost of developing office space to house all domestic personnel in each year of the expansion timeframe. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP office expansion costs.

d. Social Media Initiative Costs

VSP forecasted costs associated with the expansion of its social media initiative by first using pilot program costs as a benchmark and then applying those benchmark costs to all new VSP posts. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP social media initiative costs.

e. Enhanced Training Costs

VSP supplies training and conducts regional conferences that are specific to VSP personnel and are not included in standard HSI training forecasting figures. VSP used FY 2016 cost estimates for training and conferences as a baseline for future costs. Baseline costs were then increased proportional to VSP international personnel growth. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP training costs.

f. Fee Collection Costs

VSP will be required to build and maintain IT infrastructure and to establish other support operations to facilitate the logistics of collecting the proposed fee. VSP estimated the cost of fee collections IT and personnel using existing fee collection costs incurred by the Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP) as a benchmark. Table 10 provides the cost estimates for VSP fee collection costs.

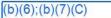

Counter-Proliferation Investigations Export Control

Overview

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Counter-Proliferation Investigations (CPI) Program, housed under Homeland Security Investigation's (HSI) National Security Investigations Division, has been heavily involved in export enforcement for the past three decades. One of HSI's highest priorities is to prevent illicit procurement networks, terrorist groups and hostile nations from illegally obtaining U.S. military products, sensitive dual-use technology, weapons of mass destruction, or chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear materials. CPI oversees a broad range of investigative activities related to such violations. It enforces U.S. laws involving the export of military items and controlled dual-use goods as well as exports to sanctioned or embargoed countries.

Through an industry and academic outreach program called Project Shield America, HSI special agents conduct presentations for U.S. manufacturers and exporters of arms and sensitive technology. The program provides an overview of export laws and also solicits the private industry's assistance in preventing illegal foreign acquisition of their products. Since the program's inception in late 2001, HSI special agents have conducted more than 21,000 industry outreach presentations.

Export Enforcement Coordination Center

The Export Enforcement Coordination Center serves as the primary forum within the federal government for executive departments and agencies to coordinate and enhance their export control enforcement efforts. The center maximizes information sharing consistent with national security and applicable laws. This helps partner agencies detect, prevent, disrupt, investigate and prosecute violations of U.S. export control laws.

Border Enforcement Analytics Program

The Border Enforcement Analytics Program (BEAP) within CPI uses innovative Big Data technology to examine millions of rows of data to identify targets that are of interest to CPI investigators. In collaboration with Northeastern University, the program has introduced data scientists to the tools and formed a partnership that has already identified multiple investigative leads in a short period.

BEAP leverages the ICE Big Data Environment (BDE) in order to perform computations and create reports for investigators. The BDE leverages analytic tools that give the end user direct access to the power of the Hadoop File System's (HDFS) computation capability, with limited need for assistance from information technology development teams. The system provides complete analytics, from simple data to complex predictive analytics. Whereas many systems that leverage Hadoop simply filter data in order to find anomalous transactions, BEAP users can model data that best fits their needs, apply multi-tier filters against this optimum data set, and compare multiple data sets against each other in order to find overlapping data elements to present in either a report or visual graphic format. The combination of data scientists and direct



access to the computational capabilities of HDFS and MapReduce has proven very effective for CPI. From an analytical standpoint, BEAP serves the following analytical areas:

- <u>Investigative Lead Generation and Direct Case Support</u>: BEAP allows investigators and analysts to generate leads for, and otherwise support, investigations of export violations within the jurisdiction of HSI. By using the BDE to analyze trade data, BEAP investigators and analysts are able to identify anomalous transactions and activities that may be indicative of export violations and warrant investigation. Experienced HSI investigators independently confirm and further investigate these anomalies.
- <u>Statistical/Trend Analysis</u>: BEAP leverages the BDE to provide export enforcementrelated statistical reporting capabilities, derived from trade data that investigators access. These statistical functions discern, describe and document trends within the datasets associated with proliferation, licensing and other export enforcement trends. This is in order to inform ICE decision makers on issues such as resource allocation and enforcement priorities. Additionally, statistics derived from foreign countries' import trade datasets are a key indicator for the U.S. government. As far as export reporting is concerned, exports are often compared to import rates in reports provided to Congress. BEAP has also done work on import trade projections and statistical analysis relevant to HSI's Intellectual Property investigators.



Human Rights Violators and War Crimes Unit

The Human Rights Violator and War Crimes Center Overview

The Human Rights Violator and War Crimes Center (HRVWCC) is the only government entity focused completely on atrocities and war crimes. HRVWCC, which the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) initiated in 2008, leverages the knowledge and expertise of a select group of special agents, lawyers, intelligence specialists and historians who direct ICE's broader enforcement efforts against these offenders.

Regional Support Teams

HRVWCC operates four Regional Support Teams (RST) that identify, locate, investigate, prosecute and assist in removing human rights violators, torturers and war criminals from the United States. RSTs, which are considered the backbone of HRVWCC, are oriented based on target regions covering Latin America, Africa, Europe/Balkans, and Asia/Middle East. Each RST consists of Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) special agents, intelligence research specialists, attorneys, historians and representatives from other U.S. government agencies. RSTs provide programmatic oversight to HSI field offices investigating human rights violators, leveraging relevant agency expertise to support investigation and litigation activities within their designated region.

HRVWCC Components

HRVWCC is comprised of the following components:

• The Human Rights Violators and War Crimes Unit (HRVWCU)

HSI created HRVWCU to manage the agency's activities in human rights violator investigations. Preceded by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, HSI has more than 30 years of experience in successfully investigating human rights violations. HRVWCU oversees human rights violations investigations to prevent the United States from becoming a safe haven to individuals who commit war crimes, genocide, torture and other human rights abuses.

- The Human Rights Law Section (HRLS) The Office of the Principal Legal Advisor created HRLS in 2003 to support ICE's mission of identifying, investigating and removing human rights violators from the United States.
- FBI International Human Rights Unit (IHRU) In September 2012, IHRU joined HRVWCC and is co-located with HRVWCU at HSI's National Security Investigations Division (NSID) office.
- U.S. Department of State, Diplomatic Security Service (DSS) DSS joined HRVWCC in May 2015 and provides an Intelligence Research Specialist to liaise with HRVWCC components.
- U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) USCIS joined HRVWCC in July 2015 and works with HRVWCU to screen applicants applying for immigration benefits who are suspected of involvement in human rights violations.

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• U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Consular Affairs (CA)

CA joined HRVWCC in August 2016 and provides one full time foreign service officer to work with components in the development of atrocity-related intelligence reports and screening of suspected human rights violators subject to grounds of inadmissibility.

 U.S. Department of Defense, U.S. Army Criminal Investigations Division, Terrorism and Criminal Investigations Unit (TCIU) The investigative arm of the Office of Military Commission which is responsible for investigating war crimes committed overseas by enemy combatants. This includes the attacks on the USS Cole, the 9/11 attacks, and the debriefing of detainees in Guantanamo Bay.

• Central Intelligence Agency, War Crimes and Genocide Unit - Coming soon.

The Human Rights Target Tracking Team (HRT3)

HRT3 is a proactive HSI-led intelligence initiative within HRVVCC that identifies and prevents the entry of foreign human rights violators in coordination with the FBI, the U.S. Department of State and U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP). HRT3 has identified over 70,000 potential human rights violators from across the globe and stopped 201 human rights violators from entering the United States.

Strategic Goals

- HRVWCU will develop partnerships with government and non-government agencies involved in the servicing and re-location of the diaspora Syrian refugee population in an effort to identify known or suspected human rights violators prior to their approval for U.S. resettlement. Where HRVWCU identifies Syrian human rights violators already in the United States, every effort will be made to investigate and prosecute those violators under U.S. law.
- HRVWCU will continue to develop Operation War Crimes Hunter, a social media-based initiative to scrub the internet for evidence of human rights violations and war crimes. Images collected and placed in this database exist to disrupt the ability of human rights violators to obtain visas and other immigration benefits for the United States. Working with other governmental partners, HRVWCU shares these photos and images for cross-referencing against other governmental biometric databases, including the Department of State Consular Consolidated Database, CBP's Automated Tracking System and other databases held by the intelligence community.
- HRVWCU's Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) pilot program anticipates a nationwide campaign to educate stakeholders and identify facilitators who assist in the travel of at-risk girls to countries where FGM is conducted.



The Visa Life Cycle

Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) programs work to ensure visa security before nonimmigrant arrival and upon entry into the United States. This is accomplished through HSI's National Security Integration Center (NSIC) and the Counterterrorism and Criminal Exploitation Unit (CTCEU).

The National Security Integration Center Overview

NSIC focuses on federal and interagency partner coordination in order to protect the homeland. NSIC consists of the Visa Security Section and two National Security Investigations Division (NSID) National Security Liaisons.

The Visa Security Section screens and vets visa applications as mandated by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE's) Visa Security Program (VSP) by use of the Pre-Adjudicated Threat Recognition Intelligence Operations Team (PATRIOT). HSI's VSP also deploys special agents to high-risk international visa issuance posts to identify and disrupt potential threats to the United States. VSP efforts support the Department of State consular officers in the visa application process.

PATRIOT

The PATRIOT system automates the initial screening of non-immigrant visa application information against the U.S. Department of Homeland Security holdings and in coordination with partner agencies. PATRIOT is a joint counterterrorism effort between HSI and U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP). PATRIOT screens and vets visa applicants from 30 visa issuing posts in 25 different countries. The program focuses primarily on counterterrorism, and the use of cutting-edge software to uncover unknown links between visa data and subjects of interest.

PATRIOT provides derogatory information to NSID analysts and CBP officers assigned to the PATRIOT group through a daily "hot list" in CBP's Unified Passenger System. The PATRIOT group conducts vetting activities early in the visa application life cycle, before the Department of State personnel review a visa application. This screening occurs days or weeks before the Department of State even begins to review or consider the application. This gives HSI special agents critical lead-time to develop new investigations, advance ongoing operations and coordinate with consular officers to fill any information gaps through interviews of the applicants.

The Mantis Program

In addition to screening individuals, the NSIC uses the Mantis Program to:

- Stem the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and missile delivery systems,
- Restrain the development of destabilizing conventional military capabilities,
- Prevent the transfer of arms and sensitive dual-use items to terrorist states, and
- Maintain U.S. advantages in certain militarily critical technologies.

The Mantis Team ensures investigative leads are communicated with the appropriate stakeholders outside of ICE, including the Federal Bureau of Investigations, the Drug Enforcement



Administration, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, Intelligence Community, etc.

National Security Liaisons

NSIC maintains National Security Liaison special agents who promote efficient coordination and cooperation between HSI, and various federal agencies and departments, in furtherance of ICE's mission.

CTCEU Overview

Once nonimmigrants are in the United States, CTCEU combats national security vulnerabilities and prevents terrorists and other criminals from exploiting the nation's immigration system. CTCEU is the first and only national program dedicated to the enforcement of nonimmigrant visa violations. It proactively researches, identifies, and tracks hundreds of thousands of visa overstays and foreign student visa violators who exhibit specific risk factors. This work is based on intelligence reporting, in-depth criminal research and analysis of dynamic social networks to ultimately identify those who may pose a threat to national security or public safety.

CTCEU Open Source/Social Media Exploitation Efforts

In September 2014, CTCEU established the Open Source Team (OST). OST is the first program within ICE to leverage open source/social media exploitation. OST captures and analyzes unclassified information available through open sources such as media, blogs, public hearings, conferences, academic websites and social media websites. OST analysts then review and assess publicly available information including radio, television, press, geospatial sources, internet sites and specialized publications. OST extracts pertinent and derogatory information regarding targets including criminals, fugitives, nonimmigrant violators, and targeted national security threats and their location. This results in investigative leads that provide additional support to HSI field offices, furthering the mission to protect the integrity of the immigration system and combat exploitation of immigration policy.

CTCEU Pilot Programs

CTCEU's Overstay Life Cycle and Domestic Mantis pilot programs enhance overstay enforcement efforts, through the ongoing investigation and enforcement of visa overstays.

Overstay Life Cycle

CTCEU Overstay Life Cycle initiative tracks nonimmigrants from the time they file their visa application to the time they depart from the United States, or until they become an overstay or otherwise fail to comply with their terms of admission. The Overstay Life Cycle initiative enhances national security by providing continuous vetting of nonimmigrants that may pose a higher probability of national security concerns through their subsequent departure and/or overstay.

Domestic Mantis Program

CTCEU Domestic Mantis Program identifies nonimmigrant students who enter the United States to study a non-sensitive field of study, and subsequently change their field of study to a sensitive area.



The program aims to protect national security by preventing the export of goods, technology or sensitive information through activities such as graduate-level studies, teaching, conducting research, participating in exchange programs, receiving training or employment or engaging in commercial transactions.



National Security Unit Counterterrorism Section

Homeland Security Investigations' (HSI's) National Security Unit's (NSU's) Counterterrorism Section (CTS) oversees HSI special agents assigned to Joint Terrorism Task Forces (JTTFs) and uses the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE's) unique authorities in counterterrorism investigations to shut down terrorist networks.

HSI is the largest federal contributor, dedicating over 200 HSI special agents to the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI)-led JTTFs throughout the country. Established in the wake of the 9/11 attacks, the National Joint Terrorism Task Force (NJTTF) is a multi-agency task force that currently consists of approximately 40 law enforcement, intelligence and military agencies comprised of nearly 80 representatives, and is collocated at the National Counterterrorism Center. The NJTTF is part of the Domestic Terrorism Operations Section within the FBI's Counterterrorism Division. The role of the NJTTF is to enhance communication, coordination and cooperation between federal, state and local government agencies representing the intelligence, law enforcement, defense, diplomatic, public safety, transportation and homeland security communities by:

- 1. Providing a point of fusion for sharing of terrorism threats and intelligence;
- 2. Providing operational support to the FBI Counterterrorism Division, Intelligence Community and Law Enforcement; and
- 3. Providing program management, oversight and support for local JTTFs throughout the United States. An HSI Special Agent serves as one of two permanent NJTTF Deputy Unit Chiefs and serves as the senior U.S. Department of Homeland Security representative to the division. HSI has held this position since 2002.

At present, CTS is completely engaged and embedded with local JTTFs. CTS is staffed with ten special agents, two intelligence research specialists and six management program analysts. It is the single point of service and coordinating section for all JTTF International Terrorism Investigations.

For the 104 JTTFs nationwide, this has been the most prolific year for disruptions since its inception 30 years ago. In fiscal year 2016, over 209 individuals were arrested for various terrorism-related criminal charges, as well as administrative immigration violations as the result of JTTF investigations. HSI was involved in 151 of the 209 disruptions (a total of 72 percent). In addition, 82 of the 209 arrests were administrative and could not have occurred without HSI authorities. During fiscal year 2016, with FBI surveillance assets fully stretched, a number of HSI Special Agent in Charge offices provided surge surveillance support to the local JTTFs by providing non-JTTF Special Agents to augment and supplement surveillance teams to accommodate 24/7 coverage of significant Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant subjects.

JTTF Response to Terrorist Attacks

HSI Special Agents played a pivotal role in the investigation following the December 2015 mass shooting by terrorists in San Bernardino, California. As in previous U.S.-based attacks, the CTS immediately volunteered to become a 24/7 operation and provided comprehensive support to the



only HSI Special Agent assigned to the JTTF in that area. The CTS completed numerous background checks and intelligence reports that were vital to the investigation that followed the shooting.

HSI Special Agents also supported the investigation following the terrorist attack on a nightclub in Orlando, Florida in June 2016. The FBI deployed a "jump" team to the Orlando area, which included an HSI Special Agent who assisted with the investigation on scene and relayed vital information back to CTS.

During the most recent bombings in New Jersey and New York City, CTS remained involved in the on-going investigation. HSI Special Agents assigned to Newark, New Jersey and New York City were supported by CTS, who partnered with the local JTTF in producing dozens of subject reports, conducting interviews, follow-up on leads.

Operation Gallant Phoenix

NSU maintains a Liaison Officer at the Joint Interagency Task Force - National Capital Region (JIATF-NCR) responsible for HSI's support of Operation Gallant Phoenix (OGP), which is a multinational task force led by U.S. Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) established to identify foreign fighter networks. OGP forward deployed elements are stationed at the Joint Training Center-Jordan and consist of representatives from 14 coalition partners focused on identifying, tracking and targeting foreign terrorist fighter networks. Since inception, the OGP Law Enforcement Team, comprised of personnel from HSI, U.S. Customs and Border Protection, and the FBI, has provided robust access to law enforcement databases and investigative information that resulted in the identification or enhanced fidelity of individuals suspected of nefarious ties to terrorist groups within the Continental United States and outside the Continental United States. The U.S. Department of Defense and coalition partner information has been passed for partner law enforcement action to HSI international attaché offices and U.S. case leads through HSI domestic field offices. HSI's efforts at OGP have also directly resulted in nominations/enhancements to Terrorist Screening Databases. As indicated by comments from the Commanding General of USSOCOM, HSI's groundbreaking involvement with the OGP team (involving unique law enforcement authorities, financial capabilities and international law enforcement network) continues to enhance the security for the U.S. homeland and our allies.



Student and Exchange Visitor Program Compliance and Oversight

Overview

The Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP) maintains information on foreign students and exchange visitors in the United States. SEVP uses the Student and Exchange Visitor Information System (SEVIS), a web-based solution, to track and monitor approximately 9,000 schools and more than one million active nonimmigrant students, exchange visitors and their dependents who are approved to participate in the United States education system. SEVP works to ensure that those who seek to harm our nation are excluded from entering, while legitimate students, researchers and exchange visitors are welcomed and understand how to maintain legal status.

SEVIS data is a valuable resource for law enforcement that supports investigations and identifies links to potential criminal activity. This data, used by domestic or international agencies, may not only indicate schools in violation of immigration laws, but also lead to investigations involving money laundering, crime rings, terrorist networks, gangs and human smuggling. Thus, SEVIS data offers an enormous opportunity to find links to a variety of criminal offenses.

The Student and Exchange Visitor Program Analysis and Operations Center (SAOC) monitors SEVP-certified schools and nonimmigrant students for administrative compliance with applicable federal statutes, and SEVP regulatory record keeping and reporting requirements. SAOC also coordinates with and provides critical information to the Counterterrorism and Criminal Exploitation Unit (CTCEU) and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Special Agent in Charge (SAC) offices, as they conduct all criminal investigations related to school and nonimmigrant student compliance.

In April 2016, HSI assigned three special agents and an additional special agent section chief to SAOC to assist with criminal and administrative investigations concerning SEVP-certified schools and nonimmigrant student fraud. The special agents conducted extensive outreach and briefing efforts to SEVP personnel and HSI SAC offices nationwide with the goal of sharing their capabilities and experiences, as well as strengthening the agent and SAOC adjudicator relationship. As of October 2016, there are currently two TDY agents still serving in SAOC and a special agent serving as the CTCEU liaison.

While detailed to assist the SAOC, the special agents have conducted outreach to 15 of the 28 SAC offices nationwide. As part of their efforts, they were able to review a backlog of 30 cases with pending criminal holds and contacted all HSI field agents to determine their case status. As a result, the special agents have determined that 14 of the 30 criminal cases may be closed, resulting in a 47 percent clearance rate. These special agents have updated evidence handling to mirror those processes in place at HSI field offices and added additional legal language to all SEVP documents to include 18USC §1001 warning/attestation.

This effort frees up resources to focus efforts on more resource intensive investigations. It is anticipated that special agents, in tandem with SAOC adjudicators, will conduct additional

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outreach presentations for various law enforcement and intelligence agencies (including the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Central Intelligence Agency) to inform them of SEVP's mission and SAOC's investigative functions and capabilities.

In addition to the HSI special agents, SAOC has worked with its government partners in law enforcement and national security on the following initiatives:

- SEVP, in partnership with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), launched an admissibility indicator (AI) in response to gaps and vulnerabilities identified in SEVIS. The AI prevents the readmission of persons ineligible for entry by providing CBP officers with a method to validate a nonimmigrant student's status. This method can indicate whether secondary inspection and further record review is warranted. Since the launch of AI, CBP, in partnership with SEVP, has successfully deployed pre-inspection sites at all air and sea ports of entry.
- SEVP exercised its authority to terminate initial and active student SEVIS records of nonimmigrant students enrolled at the University of Northern New Jersey. In direct support of this HSI undercover operation, SAOC assisted HSI Newark agents by providing extensive SEVIS record support, making any changes to student records requested by field agents and coordinating site visit inspections of an apparent network of 11 schools in New York, New Jersey and Florida from intelligence gathered from the operation.

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Shared Services for Vetting Board Recommendation

National Security Investigations Division Social Media Programs

In September 2014, the HSI National Security Investigations Division (NSID), through the Counterterrorism and Criminal Exploitation Unit (CTCEU), established the Open Source Team (OST) as the first Program within ICE to leverage open source/social media exploitation to expand upon the CTCEU's established abilities to utilize government and law enforcement databases in the investigation of national security and public safety concerns that exploit vulnerabilities in the U.S. immigration system.

In an effort to enhance HSI's initiative on safeguarding against terrorism and ensuring the security of the Homeland, CTCEU coordinated its Open Source/Social Media Exploitation capabilities with the NSID Visa Security Program's (VSP) PATRIOT screening and vetting operations and social media exploitation to develop and implement a Social Media pilot program in furtherance of an the Overstay Life-Cycle Initiative. The premise of this initiative is to track non-immigrants from the time they file a visa application with the Department of State, to the time they enter the United States, and through the time when they either depart the United States, or until such time as they become an overstay or otherwise fail to comply with their terms of admission. The Social Media pilot program was initiated on August 1, 2016 for NSID VSP.

• The Visa Security Coordination Center (VSCC) participates in the "DHS Social Media Working Group", which is an inter-agency initiative aimed at the coordination of DHS social media screening efforts pertaining to three (3) shared areas of interest: Shared Metrics, Best Practices and Common Talking Points. This working group meets once per month and is led by the DHS Office of Policy. Participants include Customs and Border Protection (CBP), Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Transportation Security Administration (TSA), U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), and the Office of Science and Technology (S&T).

Background: DHS has been at the forefront among Federal agencies in developing the capability to incorporate social media data in its screening and vetting processes. CBP, ICE, TSA and USCIS have been developing, testing, and operationalizing the use of social media in various pilots and programs. The Office of Science and Technology (S&T) has been developing tools and processes towards realizing DHS's long term objective of deploying screening capabilities related to social media. Through this work, DHS has advanced its understanding of the challenges in screening non-government maintained databases, including the dynamic nature and magnitude of social media information.

• The Visa Security Coordination Center (VSCC) participates in the Visa Lifecycle Vetting Initiative "which is an HSI/NSID led effort. This working group meets once per week. NSID, with other DHS stakeholders, performs the majority of visa vetting activities within DHS. In an effort to transform its current vetting programs, NSID has initiated the process to obtain contractor services to establish an overarching vetting contract that will assist with streamlining and centralizing the current manual vetting process.

Background: U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), National Security Investigations Division's (NSID) is responsible for two facets of screening and vetting for nonimmigrants. The Visa Security Program (VSP) operations are supported through the Pre-Adjudication Threat Recognition Intelligence Operations Team (PATRIOT) for the screening and vetting of visa applicants. The Counterterrorism and Criminal Exploitation Unit (CTCEU) combats national security vulnerabilities and prevents terrorists and other criminals from exploiting the nation's immigration system. 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Visa Life Cycle

Summary:

By issuing executive orders as well as mandating common vetting practices, the President has prioritized protecting the nation from travelers who seek to exploit our travel and immigration processes to incite terror, advance the interests of foreign countries with adverse interests, or engage in criminal behavior for their own personal gain.

Since 2003, in response to the 9/11 terror attacks, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has conducted a comprehensive visa screening and vetting program through the Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Visa Security Program (VSP). This program is often referred to as the gold standard in visa screening and vetting; however, it currently only covers 32 of the 223 visa-issuing posts worldwide. We propose aggressively expanding VSP operations as part of an overall Department of Homeland Security (DHS) effort to move to common vetting covering the entire visa lifecycle – VSP would serve as the front-end of this visa screening, vetting, and monitoring process.

VSP is currently in the process of establishing a fee to fund this proposed expansion and will require DHS-level support to expedite the Federal rulemaking process and work with partner agencies to implement the fee.

Fee Study Overview:

The VSP is currently funded through annual appropriations, which impacts the program's ability to comply with congressional calls to expand operations globally. To help facilitate the mandated expansion, ICE engaged a consulting tem in September 2015 to conduct a study that would explore an alternative source of funding by implementing a user fee to be included in the visa application process. The implementation of a VSP-fee would not only sustain base operations (current and future), but also provide adequate funding for domestic and international expansion initiatives. The fee study research identified and confirmed ICE's legal authority to levy user fees, and retain and expend user fee revenue from visa applications. In addition, the study developed a plan to initiate and operationalize a user fee that will support the full operating costs of the VSP. To date the VSP Fee Study has:

- Provided the economic and legal rationale for a VSP migration from a federallyappropriated funding model to a user fee-based funding model;
- Developed workforce and cost models to support a fee recommendation;
- · Recommended user fee amount and structure
- · Recommended fee implementation options; and
- · Initiated the federal rule-making process

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Fee Study Results:

The VSP Fee Study concluded with a recommendation to partially expand VSP to an additional 100 international posts over a four-year timeframe. As part of this expansion, ICE would deploy HSI special agents, trained and dedicated to the VSP, to the identified expansion posts. This expansion would require an estimated user fee of \$20.00 per visa application. This fee would support the establishment of VSP operations at additional posts and the deployment of additional personnel as well as facilities, equipment and training costs, and support enhancements of domestic personnel in support of expanded VSP screening and vetting operations.

On March 12, 2017 a memo was released through ICE Director Homan's office regarding VSP's request to convert from appropriated funding to a fee-funded program. This memo approves and mandates ICE to pursue and support the conversion of the VSP to a fee-funded program, and to pursue expansion of VSP to an additional 100 international posts. Concurrently (on March 12, 2017), a Letter of Intent was sent from Deputy Director Ragsdale to the Department of State (DoS) Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary (DAS) Karin King. The Letter of Intent informs DoS of ICE's intent to pursue the expansion strategy mandated by Director Homan and requests DoS's cooperation to include the VSP user fee in DoS visa application fees (aka Machine Readable Visa (MRV) fees).

Subsequently, NSID leadership and the VSP Fee Study team met with representatives from DoS Consular Affairs, Policy Office, and Fee Management Office to discuss the possibilities and logistics for embedding the VSP user fee in DoS MRV fees. The embedding of a VSP user fee was met with some resistance by DoS, stating that the additional \$20 may deter enough visa applicants to cause DoS to raise their own fees. Additionally, DoS had doubts that the Economy Act, which allows government agencies to contract services to one another, was a viable option to allow DoS to collect and remit VSP user fees for/to DHS, because DoS was not requesting these services from VSP, rather they are mandated to carry out this mission by the Homeland Security Act.

Shortly after the meeting with DoS, ICE received a response to the Letter of Intent from DoS DAS King, stating that DoS believes the legal authorities cited in the VSP Fee Study would not allow for the embedding of the VSP fee in MRV fees. DoS suggested that VSP pursue directly charging the fee to visa applicants in a similar way the Student Exchange and Visitor Program (SEVP) charges F, M, and J visa applicants for I-901 processing fees. Directly charging the fee will require VSP to establish its own collection mechanisms, but would still require cooperation from DoS to enforce and validate that VSP fees were paid before issuing a visa. The VSP Fee Study has now shifted its strategy to pursue direct charging of the VSP fee.

For ICE/VSP to collect, retain, and expend funding derived from user fees a federal rule is required, regardless of the collection mechanism. VSP began the rule-making process, engaging with ICE Policy office and writing the draft rule in December, 2016. The rule-making process is currently underway; however the rule is still in draft status due to the shift in direction to directly charge the fee to visa applicants. Additionally, a final fee amount must be included in the rule

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before it can progress to official submission. Several decisions need to be made with regard to various operating models and expansion timeframes before a final fee amount can be calculated.

New operating models for VSP have been proposed, including turning on screening and vetting (remote screening) at all visa-issuing posts. In this operating scenario a full cadre for domestic analysts and additional domestic special agents are required. Expanding to 100 additional posts in a four-year timeframe may not be practical or feasible. Per HSI International Operations input, an eight-year timeframe is much more realistic and practical. There is also the possibility that operating models may be dictated to the VSP through congressional legislation. There are currently two proposed bills (Hurd Bill and Border Bill) both would require expansion to no fewer than 50 additional posts and an additional 50 to be remote screened. These shifts in operating models and expansion plans will affect the final fee and require decisions from ICE leadership.

Once the operating model and expansion scenario decisions are made the rule can be finalized and submitted to the official federal rule-making process. The rule-making process is lengthy and the VSP Fee Rule would require prioritization from the highest levels of ICE and DHS. Furthermore, an advocate or "champion" is needed to help drive the rule through the rule-making process.

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Extreme Vetting-Visa Security Program-PATRIOT

Overview

The ICE Visa Security Program (VSP) is authorized by Section 428 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 and implemented by a 2003 Memorandum of Understanding between the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security. International Operations for the VSP assigns Special Agents to diplomatic posts worldwide to conduct law enforcement and visa security activities and to provide training and law enforcement expertise to Department of State (DOS) Consular Affairs (CA) offices regarding threats, trends and other topics affecting the visa adjudication process. VSP operations are currently conducted at 30 visa-issuing posts in 25 countries. Homeland Security Investigations VSP operations are supported through the Pre-Adjudication Threat Recognition and Intelligence Operations Team (PATRIOT), with domestic screening and vetting operations conducted within the National Capital Region. PATRIOT identifies national security, public safety, fraud, immigration, and other visa eligibility concerns at the earliest point of an individual's visa application life-cycle.

ICE/HSI proposes an initiative to meet executive mandates concerning future VSP Extreme Vetting capabilities, a comprehensive operational and programmatic expansion of PATRIOT to all 225 non-immigrant visa issuance posts worldwide:

Requirements

- Domestic PATRIOT expansion to accommodate planned visa security program growth to all 225 visa-issuing posts.
- Increased exploitation of information through a vigorous information sharing initiative with interagency and intra-agency stakeholders.
- Comprehensive utilization of innovative big-data programs to enhance current vetting procedures and processes.
- Research and development of web-crawler/social media programs to enhance vetting capabilities
- Develop interagency agreements and policy standards for screening, vetting and information sharing
- Develop international agreements and policy standards for screening, vetting and information sharing

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The Visa Lifecycle Pilot Program, part of NSID's social media expansion, continuously vets individuals who have been approved for a non-immigrant visa from select DOS visa issuing posts. Working in coordination with HSI's VSP, the Counterterrorism and Criminal Exploitation Unit (CTCEU) will receive information from VSP on these visa applicants pulled from PATRIOT and the DOS Consular Consolidated Database (CCD). The CTCEU will ingest this data into LeadTrac and continuously monitor these non-immigrant visa holders through the use of an automated social media vetting platform and high-side vetting throughout the lifecycle of the visa's validity.

If the CTCEU uncovers derogatory information about a visa applicant, CTCEU analysts will manually work-up the lead. If it is determined that the individual has not yet entered the United States, the CTCEU will place a subject record in TECS/ICM to identify the individual for other government partners such as CBP, watchlist the individual if appropriate, notify the appropriate ICE Attaché Office, and notify DOS of the derogatory information so that DOS may revoke the visa if deemed appropriate. If the individual has entered the United States, CTCEU analysts will initiate a collateral investigative request which will be forwarded to the appropriate HSI field office for further investigation. The investigation at the field level will be coordinated through the Joint Terrorism Task Force (JTTF).



U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Response to Budget Briefing Issue Papers Request (T18001) February 13, 2018

Background

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), National Security Investigations Division's (NSID) is responsible for two facets of screening and vetting for visa applicants as follows:

- The Visa Security Program (VSP) maximizes the visa screening and vetting process as a counterterrorism tool to identify, exploit and disrupt transnational terrorist and criminal networks seeking to harm the United States. In order to execute this mandate, the Visa Security Coordination Center (VSCC) utilizes various screening and vetting mechanisms, primarily comprised of the Pre-Adjudication Threat Recognition Intelligence Operations Team (PATRIOT), the MANTIS Security Advisor Opinion (SAO) process, the ICE-HSI Watchlisting Cell, the Kingfisher Expansion Program (KFE) SAO process, and the Social Media Pilot Program.
- Counterterrorism and Criminal Exploitation Unit (CTCEU) combats national security vulnerabilities and prevents terrorists and other criminals from exploiting the nation's immigration system. The pursuit of these violators provides significant support to the "disrupt and deter" counterterrorism strategy of the United States. CTCEU accomplishes its mission by reviewing the immigration status of known and suspected terrorists, by combating criminal exploitations of the Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP), and by leveraging HSI's expertise with partnering agencies in identifying national security threats.

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Benefits & Current State:

The orders under the proposed BPA are so integrally related that only a single vendor would be able to efficiently and effectively provide the VLVI support services. The initial task order will be awarded for both CTCEU and VSCC/VSP support as services between the two offices sometimes overlap. In such instances, a single contractor following a single set of operating procedures is necessary to ensure a proper and effective workflow is initiated. For example, both VSP's Social Media Pilot Program and CTCEU's Open Source Team (OST) are endeavors designed to identify the online activity, potentially derogatory information, and public safety concerns of applicants from the time of visa application and, if applicable, through visa issuance and entry into the United States. The program leverages social media, open source information, and analytic capabilities as a tool to provide enhanced knowledge about applicants' social media postings and online presence not found in U.S. Government holdings. Social media screening gives the United States government better visibility regarding an applicant's possible engagement in criminal activity, terrorist acts or associations, and administrative immigration violations. Subsequent task orders will be issued separately for each office or for combined support depending on the need. Due to the overlap between the two offices, having standardized processes, cross training, and removal of proprietary barriers to allow for increased and more fluid communications is vital to support the critical screening and vetting operations.

The expansion of CTCEU and VSP tasks, which were not outlined in the original Performance Work Statements (PWS), included many VSP tasks that were added but never funded, and CTCEU initiatives that were funded from surge money. The addition of these tasks, which have now become part of daily operations for VSP and CTCEU, will result in an increase in the cost over the current contract in place. For VSP, these tasks include the MANTIS Security Advisor Opinion (SAO) process, the ICE-HSI Watchlisting Cell, the Kingfisher Expansion Program (KFE) SAO process and the Social Media Pilot Program. For CTCEU, these tasks include staffing Open Source Teams, Training Teams, CTCEU Report production, Domestic Mantis, and ADIS Backlog resolution. These tasks are no longer being performed on an ad-hoc basis or outside of normal duty hours and have become essential to the day-to-day operations and must be included in the Firm Fixed Price (FFP) over the course of the VLVI contract.

If the estimated cost of the VLVI contract is not funded, there will be a significant impact on NSID's capabilities to screen and vet immigrants and nonimmigrants attempting to exploit the U.S. immigration system.

The VSCC and CTCEU are completing the final documentation necessary to facilitate the VLVI Request for Proposal (RFP) process. Upon final review and approval, OAQ will submit the RFP to vendors for their response and bid. We anticipate possible technical evaluations of the vendor proposals in April, 2018, taking place in Dallas, TX.
