The Monroe County Sheriff's Office has identified two (2) purpose areas for the expenditure of the Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant funds. The identified purpose areas are Law Enforcement programs and Prevention and Education programs.

The Project Title is: OPERATION SAFE MONROE COUNTY

Purpose area: Law Enforcement programs

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office has identified a need for an OPERATION SAFE MONROE COUNTY program in the neighborhoods and subdivisions of Monroe County and on the major interstates and highways in Monroe County. The Monroe County Sheriff's Office will use Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant funds for overtime to provide law enforcement patrols in the neighborhoods and subdivisions within Monroe County and on the major interstates and highways in Monroe County. Currently, the Monroe County Sheriff's Office does not have any overtime funds in its budget for these law enforcement patrols.

The OPERATION SAFE MONROE COUNTY program schedule will include operations all seven days of the week and at various hours.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office has identified a need for additional law enforcement equipment to assist personnel in the performance of their duties.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office will purchase Digital Cameras for its personnel working out of its District Substations to use during investigations including accidents and domestic violence incidents. Currently some of the Officers are working without cameras and have to request a camera at an incident requiring photographs that are necessary for criminal prosecution. Currently, the Monroe County Sheriff's Office does not have any funds in its budget for this equipment.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office will use the Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant funds to purchase Radars to be installed in the police vehicles for its Personnel

Many citizens contact the Sheriff's Office to complain about speeders in their neighborhoods. Currently, the Monroe County Sheriff's Office does not have any funds in its budget for this equipment.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office will purchase a mobile License Plate Reader System to be installed in a police vehicle for officers to use during law enforcement patrols in the neighborhoods and subdivisions of the county and on the major interstates and highways in Monroe County to read license plates. When the license plate matches a Hot List file officers will be alerted to the nature of the crime or infraction associated with the license plate. Currently, the Monroe County Sheriff's Office does not have any funds in its budget for this equipment.

Purpose area: Prevention and Education programs

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office has a community policing program that includes prevention and education programs including participating in the annual County Fair. Handouts will be purchased for distribution to the community during the County Fair and other community events. Also, as part of its community policing efforts the Monroe County Sheriff's Office will provide crime mapping information on its webpage for the public to be informed on crime in the community.

Project Objectives:

Create a safer Monroe County by reducing crime in the neighborhoods and subdivisions of Monroe County and sustaining that reduction.

Create a safer Monroe County by enforcing state and local drug laws in the neighborhoods and subdivisions of Monroe County and on the major interstates and highways in Monroe County and sustaining that reduction.

Create a safer Monroe County by enforcing state and local traffic laws in the neighborhoods and subdivisions of Monroe County and on the major interstates and highways in Monroe County and sustaining that reduction.

Trust Fund:

The County of Monroe and the Monroe County Sheriff's Office will establish a separate fund to track all drawdowns and grant expenditures separately from other federal funding

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Timeline:

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office will commence OPERATION SAFE MONROE COUNTY within thirty days after the final award documents have been approved and signed by all parties and the budget clearance memo has been received authorizing the expenditures of grant award funds.

The Overtime law enforcement patrols in the neighborhoods and subdivisions within Monroe County and on the major interstates and highways in Monroe County will be scheduled during the three year grant period.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office will commence the purchase process of the equipment within thirty days after the final award documents have been approved and signed by all parties and the budget clearance memo has been received authorizing the expenditures of grant award funds. The equipment will be ready for operational use within 90 days after the purchase orders are issued to the vendors.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office will provide crime mapping information on its webpage for the public to be informed on crime in the community within thirty days after the final award documents have been approved and signed by all parties and the budget clearance memo has been received authorizing the expenditures of grant award funds.

Performance Measures:

Performance measures include the following:

- 1) Change in arrests
- 2) Change in citations
- 3) Percent change in crime rates in a community by crime type
- 4) Number of hours paid for with JAG Funds
- 5) Amount of funds expended on equipment/supplies during the reporting period
- 6) Types of equipment/supplies purchased with JAG dollars during the reporting period.

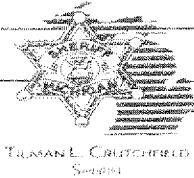
A Public Hearing was held on April 14, 2009 to provide an opportunity to comment to citizens and neighborhood or community organizations.
