

Al-Qa'ida-inspired extremists do not fit a predictable profile























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What Factors May Be Involved?

Personal-level Factors Include: psychological, demographic backgrounds, and personal history

Group-level Factors Include: social networks (including family and peer groups) and group dynamics

Community-level Factors Include: alienation and marginalization

Sociopolitical-level Factors Include: collective grievances, foreign policy, and external events

Ideological-level Factors Include: appeal of justifying narrative, charismatic ideologues Ideological

There is no single factor that leads to radicalization

Community

A person could have <u>some</u> or <u>all</u> these factors and not become yiolent

The Al-Qa'ida-Inspired Narrative

Al-Qa'ida divides the world into two incompatible camps

Those that strictly follow al-Qa'ida's ideology

- "Muslims are only part of a global community"
- "The U.S. has brought ruin and disgrace to Islam"
- "Muslims are the target of U.S. aggression"

"U.S. is at war with Islam"

Defeat the "us versus them" narrative

- Al-Qa'ida argues that a person cannot be a good Muslim and live in a secular democracy
- Some online voices make the same argument
- The everyday lives of Americans disprove this "us versus them" narrative

Defeat the "us versus them" narrative

Created in response to recent Newsweek article "Muslim Rage & The Last Gasp of Islamic Hate" published on September 17

Humor-based Internet campaign showing that violence is not the norm

Soon after the publication, the hashtag had almost 100,000 tweets per day



When there's no prayer room in a mall #muslimrage



Finding out marshmallows aren't halal then questioning every rice krispy treat you ever ate, #muslimrage

Issues Identified with Training

The state of the s

Training needs to be academically and professionally rigorous.

Training needs to accurately describe the threat our country faces.

Media attention pointed out that a small amount of training has included inaccurate information on the threat and religious and cultural issues.

"Training for Federal, State, tribal, and local government and law enforcement officials on community resilience, CVE, and cultural competency will improve, and that training will meet rigorous professional standards."

- White House Strategy

Training was Reviewed and Revised

- Four major agencies have undertaken comprehensive reviews (DHS, DOJ, DOD, and FBI).
- Hundreds of thousands of documents have been reviewed.
- Training materials that did not meet minimum standards have been removed or improved, and courses that were not up to standards have been suspended.
- New standards ensuring professional rigor have been issued.
- New training courses that call upon the best minds in the field have been developed.



New Training Guidelines

Training....

...must adhere to constitutional principles and be consistent with USG values

...should be expert and well-regarded and trainers must be well-qualified experts in the subject area

...must have accurate, focused, and audience-specific materials and objectives

...should reflect current understanding of threats and opportunities

Quazi Mohammad Rezwanul Ahsan Nafis

- Location: New York City, NY
- Arrest Date: 17 October 2012
- Travelled to the United States to conduct a terrorist attack
- Planned to attack the Federal Reserve Bank of New York



Yonathan Melaku

- Location: Alexandria, VA
- Arrest Date: 23 June 2011
- Former US Marine Reservist
- Sentenced to 25 years for firing shots at the National Museum of the Marine Corps and then at USMC and Coast Guard recruiting centers in Northern Virginia





Randy Wilson | Mohammad Abdul Rahman Abdukhdair

- Location: Mobile, AL
- Arrest Date: 11 December 2012
- Met each other online
- Attempted to travel overseas to join a terrorist group



Raees Alam Qazi | Sherheryar Alam Qazi

- Location: Oakland Park, FL
- Arrest Date: 30 November 2012
- Scouted high-traffic locations in NYC
- Found with bomb-making materials in their home





Sohiel Omar Kabir | Ralph Deleon | Miguel Alejandro Santana Vidriales | Arifeen David Gojali

- Location: Riverside, CA
- Arrest Date: 19 November 2012
- Attempted to travel to Afghanistan to kill US soldiers
- Kabir lived in Afghanistan and communicated with the group through the Internet





Adel Daoud

- Location: Chicago, IL
- Arrest Date: 15 September 2012
- Used the Internet to connect to like -minded individuals
- Drafted a list of 29 locations in Chicago to attack, including bars, malls, and tourist attractions
- Wanted to set off a car bomb



Amine El Khalifi

- Location: Alexandria, VA
- Arrest Date: 17 February 2012
- Conducted surveillance on a number of targets
- Wanted to be a suicide bomber at the US Capitol



Sami Osmakac


- Location: Tampa, FL
- Arrest Date: 9 January 2012
- Wanted to set off a series of car bombs near bars and clubs





Craig Baxam

- Location: Laurel, MD
- Arrest Date: 6 January 2012
- Former Army soldier
- Flew to Kenya and tried to cross the border into Somalia to join al-Shabaab



Jose Pimentel

- Location: New York, NY
- Arrest Date: 20 November 2011
- Attempted to create a bomb in his apartment using instructions found online
- Maintained a website that hosted violent extremist materials, including bomb-making instructions



Rezwan Ferdous

- Location: Ashland, MA
- Arrest Date: 27 September 2011
- Wanted to use remote-controlled airplanes to attack the Pentagon and US Capitol



Naser Jason Abdo

- Location: Killeen, TX
- Arrest Date: 28 July 2011
- Scouted nearby restaurants serving US soldiers to set off a bomb
- Possessed a .40 caliber handgun, ammunition, and bomb-making instructions



Mohammed Hassan Khalid

- Location: Ellicott City, MD
- Arrest Date: 20 October 2011
- Honors student in high school
- Full scholarship to Johns Hopkins University
- Active on extremist online forums, raised money for terrorist organizations

Abu Khalid Latif | Walli Mujahidh

- Location: Seattle, WA
- Arrest Date: 23 June 2011
- Planned to attack a military enlistment processing center in Seattle with small arms and grenades






Jamshid Muhtorov | Bakhtiyor Jumaev

- Location: Denver, CO
- Arrest Date:
 - January 23, 2012 (Muhtorov)
 - March 15, 2012 (Jumaev)
- Planned to travel overseas to join the Islamic Jihad Union, a designated terrorist organization



Agron Hasbajrami

- Location: New York, NY
- Arrest Date: 9 September 2012
- Planned to travel to Pakistan to join a terrorist group
- Exchanged emails with contacts in Pakistan to set up trip
- Sent funds to support terrorism



Ulugbek Kodirov

- Location: Pelham, AL
- Arrest Date: 26 July 2011
- Threatened to kill the US President using illegal weapons
- Visited extremist websites, attempted to make contact to foreign terrorist organizations



Waad Ramadan Alwan | Mohanad Shareef Hammadi

- Location: Bowling Green, KY
- Former insurgent in Iraq
 (fingerprints found on IED that targeted US soldiers)
- Attempted to ship money and weapons to al-Qa'ida in Iraq





Matthew Llaneza

- Location: Oakland, CA
- Attempted to set off what he believed to be a car-bomb outside a bank
- Wanted to join the Taliban



Case Studies: Emerson Begolly

- Active administrator for an extremist forum
- Advocated the use of firearms, explosives, and propane tanks against targets like police stations, post offices, Jewish schools, daycare centers, military facilities, train lines, bridges, cell phone towers, and water plants



Case Studies: Omar Hammami

- Sophomore high school president in Alabama
- Indicted for material support to al-Shabaab
- Featured in a number of al-Shabaab online videos encouraging others to join him






Case Studies: Zachary Chesser

- Attended George Mason University before dropping out
- Posted threatening videos on YouTube, created his own website advocating for al-Shabaab, maintained extremist Twitter feed
- Arrested for material support to al-Shabaab





Case Studies: Major Nidal Hasan

- Joined U.S. Army in 1996
- Communicated with Anwar al-Awlaki online
- On November 5, 2009, allegedly attacked the Fort Hood military base, killing 13 DoD employees and wounding 32 others

Case Studies: Ramy Zamzam





- Was studying dentistry at Howard University in Washington, DC
- Left his home in Virginia with four friends to allegedly join the Taliban

Interrogation Report

These five foreigners were held by the Police on December 9, 2009. They were all college students. They had deep interest in the religion and they were of the opinion that a Jihad must be waged against the infidels for the atrocities committed by them against Muslims around the world. Among them Ahmed Abdullah Minni used to regularly visit the internet page of YouTube. He used to the praise the videos which showed attacks on the US Army and Installations. This became a regular feature and Minni, a registered user of YouTube, regularly praised such attacks, Soon after, Minni was contacted by a person named "Saifullah". The two

Case Studies: al-Shabaab Recruitment

Between September 2007 and October 2009, approximately 20 young men left the Minneapolis area to fight for Al Shabaab, an Al-Qa'ida affiliated group in Somalia.


