Countering Violent Extremist Summit Overview

Day 1: CVE Leadership Forum

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 detailed conversation about requirements for successful implementation. Of note, the
 National Security Council has lauded the DHS Office for Strategic Engagement, which
 was piloted with the Los Angeles Community, as the model for empowering local
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 customizable programming to meet local needs.
- Discussion mostly resulted in the conclusion that a "whole of community," and non-securitized partnerships with government is key to success, and resources to help build these public/private partnerships was essential.
- Other critical elements include greater resources for non-governmental organizations and community programing, as well as civil rights and grievance adjudication.

Google Reception

- Preceding the Summit, Secretary Johnson was invited to present opening remarks at a Google reception for stakeholders from the 3 cities, members of Congress, non-governmental organizations, Federal partners, and industry committed to changing terrorist narrative as part of countering violent extremism
- The Secretary and A/S Durkovich also joined Google's Vice president of Public Policy and Government Relations Susan Molinari for a brief pre-meeting before the Summit to discuss an ongoing partnership.
- This event served as platform to for DHS to continue spearheading the USG effort to positively leverage social media and technology platforms and expertise as part of the CV E mission.
- NPPD leveraged this opportunity to initiate the convening credible local voices (i.e. Muflehun), philanthropic organizations (i.e. Peace and Security Funders Group), and industry (i.e. Twitter). NPPD is developing a strategic plan on Countering Terrorist Narrative to formalize coordinated inter- and intra-agency efforts.

Day 2: CVE Summit

• Reoccurring themes included the need for a "whole of government" and a "whole of community" approach, as well as need for additional resources, training, and capacity

- building opportunities. Strategically and competitively countering terrorist narratives by empowering credible, local voices was a strong theme throughout the Summit.
- Los Angles, Boston, and Minneapolis were provided an opportunity to provide a high-level overview of their CVE frameworks. Los Angeles presentation included a video production available at:
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- Additional panels included
 - Remarks from Mayors and public officials from Paris, Belgium and Morocco on their CVE efforts and challenges.
 - An academic perspective of empirical analysis and gaps in the study of CVE, provided by the Executive Director of the National Consortium for the Study of Terrorism and Responses to Terrorism (START)
 - o Two panels discussing the role of Non-Governmental Organizations and the private sector on changing the narrative and the use of social media
- President Obama's closing remarks were well received by stakeholders in the audience, as they directly spoke to a number of American-Muslim concerns, such as:
 - Acknowledgement that the America is not at war with Islam, but rather the people who perverted Islam – and the American-Muslim community needs to enhance efforts to support this distinction
 - Reinforcing that profiling because of faith and community engagement cannot be a means of covert surveillance
 - Recognizing the need to address the political and economic grievances that terrorists exploit and use to fuel violent extremism activity, while understanding that poverty alone is not lead to terrorism.

The Islamic Society of North America (ISNA) President, Azhar Azeez, with whom NPPD/IP has a standing relationship, issued a response commending the President for his remarks and reiterated the belief that American-Muslims make up a very small percentage of domestic violent extremists and long wolf terrorists in the United States

- The following comment made by Minneapolis Congressman, Keith Ellison, resonated very heavily with community members and was trending on social media: "Razan, Yusor and Deah the three victims were living, walking, breathing examples of countering violent extremism until their lives were taken away... Let us not slip into a mistaken idea that terrorism is somehow a Muslim idea.
