American Civil Liberties Union Foundation Automatic License Plate Readers Freedom of Information Act Request FOIA Case Number: 2012-0448

This is in response to your request under the Freedom of Information Act received in this office August 3, 2012.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) does not procure or acquire Automatic License Plate Readers (ALPR) or data provided by ALPR technology. Also, FHWA does not develop, issue, or promote specifications for ALPR technologies or data. The State and local operating and enforcement agencies are responsible for all specifications, procurement, and operation of technologies such as ALPR. Therefore, we have no information relative to your questions numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 11.

Regarding questions numbered 1 and 10, while the procurement or acquisition of ALPR technology by State agencies may be eligible for FHWA funding reimbursement under appropriate Federal-aid programs authorized by legislation, there is no specific funding for ALPR or related technologies and no financial records are maintained by FHWA that provide that detailed level of information.

In response to question number 2, enclosed is a package of material provided by an ALPR vendor (Federal Signal) in 2009.

Pursuant to the regulations of DOT, 49 C.F.R 7.21, you have the right to appeal this response to Ms. Sarah J. Shores, FHWA Associate Administrator for Administration. The mailing address is:
