Welcome to the 2014 CVE/Community Engagement Conference hosted by the National Counterterrorism Center.

Day 1 will address Foreign Fighter Recruitment and Flow: Domestic and International Impacts and Strategies, and

Day 2 will address USG, Foreign Partner, and Community CVE Strategies. Throughout the conference participants will be asked to focus on innovative and creative solutions to the problems of foreign fighters as they relate to everything from community engagement and grass roots efforts to social media and other technological solutions.

This two-day conference will be held at the UNCLASSIFIED level. It will feature remarks from keynote speakers and a series of panel discussions with some of the nation's leading practitioners, commentators, and scholars from the CVE community.


