The evaluation is in! WORDE has the first evidence-based community-led CVE program in the country

The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) recently convened a panel of practitioners and researchers to share how law enforcement agencies are building community relationships to prevent radicalization and violent extremism with evidence-based programs. In this video, Dr. John Horgan, discusses some of the findings from the formative evaluation of WORDE's CVE programs. The two-year study, conducted by the University of Massachusetts-Lowell and the University of Nevada, Reno, assessed community-based participation in CVE programs, community awareness of risk factors of radicalization to violent extremism, and the community's natural inclinations in response to these factors. The evaluation found that WORDE's volunteer-service and multicultural programming had intended positive effects on 12 of 14 CVE-relevant outcomes - thus making the program the first evidence-based community-led CVE program in the country!

<u>The report</u> is available online and will be formally launched later this year, along with the instructor's manual that WORDE developed, "Developing a Community-Led Approach to Countering Violent Extremism."



Town Hall Meetings on Police and Community Relations

The Faith Community Working Group was among the conveners of two town hall meetings, focusing on public safety issues. The first town hall was held at the Silver Spring CiNPP (Did 19907)

-

and attracted over 500 people. The second town hall at the Black Rock Theater drew 300-350 people with many civic leaders and public officials in attendance including members of the Montgomery County Board of Education, NAACP, MCPD, Fire and Rescue Service, the Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, the Office of Human Rights, Black Ministers Conference, the Faith Community Working Group, the Montgomery County Interfaith Community Liaison and leaders from Eastern and Western faith traditions.



The audience praised Montgomery County on how well-prepared the county is to address the kind of violence that has divided communities in Baton Rouge, St. Anthony, and Dallas. Participants noted that it was informative and sobering to hear heart-wrenching stories from within our community of people who have been affected by violence. Responses were made largely by MCPD Chief Manger and followed by panelists, Linda Plummer and Rev. Kaseman.

It's clear that much work lies ahead of us in identifying a common ground and working together on the sources of violence. Within the faith community we are building on a foundation of supportive relationships with MC elected officials; working partnerships with Police, Fire and Rescue Services, Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security and the Department of Health and Human Services; and increasing solidarity one with another. You may expect to hear about next steps soon.





Disrupting ISIS recruitment online

As ISIS loses territory and suffers military defeats, the terrorist organization continues to expand its presence online, using the internet to recruit new members and disseminate its messages. Although governments have previously done the most to counter ISIS propaganda, private sector actors are increasingly aiding in this effort based on their industry expertise. A new and promising approach seeks to disrupt online recruiting efforts through targeted advertising.

Join us on September 7 to discuss the new tools and strategies private industry has developed for curating and disseminating anti-extremist content online. Yasmin Green, head of research and development at Jigsaw, will present the results of a pilot program they developed with Moonshot CVE, Quantum Communications, and the Gen Next Foundation. Under Secretary of State for Public Diplomacy and Affairs Richard Stengel will join the panel to offer the U.S. government's perspective on the role of the private sector in countering extremist propaganda.

William McCants, senior fellow and director of the Project on U.S. Relations with the Islamic World at Brookings, will provide introductory remarks and moderate the discussion. Following the discussion, the panelists will take audience questions.
