The same paper also reported that Pakistan lost \$400 million under Coalition Support Fund (CSF) for 2008 because of new guidelines requiring "enhanced oversight and accountability."

News Story: Taliban's Bajaur Base Falls, Army Eyes Tirah, Orakzai -"Dawn" (03/03)

"Security forces have taken control of Bajaur's Damadola, known as the nerve-centre of Tehrik-i-Taliban Pakistan, and are now bracing themselves for an offensive in Orakzai Agency and Tirah valley of Khyber Agency, Frontier Corps Inspector General Maj-Gen Tariq Khan told a media team from Islamabad in Damadola on Tuesday. Inspector General Frontier Corps (IGFC) Major General Tariq Khan said the latest offensive launched in late January meant that militants in Bajaur were no longer able to cross over into Afghanistan to join the fight against the U.S. and NATO forces and would find it more difficult to stage attacks inside Pakistan."

News Story: U.S. To Deliver Laser-Guided Bomb Kits To Pakistan -"Daily Times" (03/03)

"The U.S. will deliver 1,000 laser-guided bomb kits to Islamabad this month and is considering additional arms sales to help the Pakistan Air Force crack down on insurgents in the Afghan border region. U.S. Air Force Secretary Michael Donley told reporters on Tuesday the arms sales came in response to a request made by the Pakistan Air Chief in December.... Pakistan is also expected to receive new F-16 fighters made by Lockheed Martin Corp this spring or summer, Donley said, noting that the fight strikes would give the Pakistan Air Force greatly expanded capabilities in its fight against "radical elements" in the border region."

News Story: Security Squad Not To Be Used Outside Missions: U.S. -"Dawn" (03/03)

"The U.S. Embassy distanced itself on Tuesday from a Washington plan to use the intended special protection squad for 'security and rescue missions' outside its diplomatic compounds in Karachi and Islamabad.... U.S. Embassy spokesman Rick Snelsire said on Tuesday there was no legal authority for use of such a force outside the premises of the Embassy or the Consulate. 'Contrary to what the original CBJ document says there are no plans to use these additional personnel anywhere, except on the compounds for internal security. In other words, they will not respond to security incidents off the compound,' he added."

News Story: Pakistan Loses \$400m To 'Enhanced Oversight' - "Dawn"

(03/03)

"Over \$400 million in reimbursement claims by Pakistan under Coalition Support Fund (CSF) for 2008 have been rejected by the United States because of new guidelines requiring 'enhanced oversight and accountability.' Total claims for 2008 were \$1.4 billion, but Pakistan got \$997 million in reimbursement, whereas the remaining claims were disallowed on grounds of 'inadequate substantiation, over-billing' and other objections, sources told 'Dawn.'"

News Story: SC Gives Govt. Final Deadline To Trace Missing Persons - "Daily Times" (03/03)

"The Supreme Court (SC) on Tuesday gave the government two weeks to furnish a detailed report regarding the whereabouts of the missing persons, and hinted it would issue orders on all the cases in the presence of senior officials of the Interior, Defence and Foreign Ministries. The court directed the government to submit a detailed report by March 18 on individual and collective petitions filed in the Supreme Court regarding the missing persons."

News Story: Foreign Aid Might End Up In Taliban Hands: NA Body -"Daily Times" (03/03)

"The National Assembly Standing Committee on Economic Affairs has expressed concern over the proper disbursement of foreign aid in Swat and Malakand. The NA committee, which met on Tuesday with Member National Assembly Malik Azmat Khan in the chair, expressed apprehensions that the aid from foreign non-governmental

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organizations (NGOs) might end up ih NACL bar Strate and be used against Pakistan."

A spokesman for the Pakistan International Airline called 'Dawn' to clarify its position on the delay caused in the release of 3,320 bullet-proof jackets that are stuck in the warehouse due to non-payment of warehouse charges. The spokesman said that warehouse charges on account of bullet-proof jackets had shot to Rs10 million and would continue to hike further if not cleared immediately."

News Story: Army, Militants Trade Barbs In North Waziristan - "The News" (03/03)

"Amid rumors of an impending military operation in the volatile North Waziristan region, the military and Taliban militants for the first time released strong-worded Urdu language leaflets, accusing each other of following the foreign agenda.... The tribesmen feared the government might start military action in the region as they said they had never observed the two sides using such harsh language against each other. They said a leaflet by the military titled 'Correct decision and first step towards right direction' was a clear indication of parting ways with the militants. The militants were also accused of accumulating resources from opium and hashish."

News Story: Pakistani Taliban Confirm Death Of Qari Zafar - "Dawn" (03/03)

"The Pakistani Taliban confirmed Tuesday that a senior commander wanted in the deadly 2006 bombing of the U.S. Consulate in Karachi was killed in a suspected American missile strike in northwestern Pakistan. Mohammed Qari Zafar's death, which was reported earlier by Pakistani intelligence officials, marks the latest success from Washington's covert CIA-run drone program in Pakistan."

News Story: Blast Claims Lives Of Two Students In Khuzdar - "Dawn" (03/03)

"Two students of Khuzdar Engineering University, Quetta were killed and nine others injured when a bomb exploded on the university premises on Tuesday night."

News Story: Bomb-Proof Police Station Set Up In Peshawar - "Dawn" (03/03)

"The first ever bomb-proof building of a police station in the Frontier Province was inaugurated by NWFP Chief Minister Ameer Haider Khan Hoti on the Khyber Road in Peshawar on Tuesday."

News Story: LeT Behind Attack, Says Afghan Govt. - "Dawn" (03/03)

"An Afghan intelligence official has blamed the Lashkar-e-Taiba for last week's car bomb and suicide attacks that killed 16 people in the heart of the capital, Kabul. "Considering the evidence since late 2008, it appears that the country may be finally turning the corner in the war against militancy. Military operations have by and large been successful in clearing and, at least initially, holding the areas in which they have been attempted. Enhanced cooperation with the Americans has led to many successes against top commanders in FATA via drone strikes (though there is still too little known about how many civilians have died in such strikes, while Pakistan's official denial of such cooperation continues to cloud the program).... Pakistan would neither get civilian MCLAASSAMEDGy like the one India was being favored with, nor a nuclear power plant, was not simply trying to please the Indian journalists to whom he was talking. This has been, there should be no doubt in Islamabad, the Americans' considered bipartisan policy in the light of their strategic objectives in the region, unabashedly pursued by the Republican Bush and faithfully adopted by the Democrat Obama.... Besides, this is not the first time the U.S. has plainly told Pakistan that it should not expect to be treated at par with India.... "The U.S. has informed Pakistan that it can neither sign a civil nuclear deal with it nor would Islamabad be able to get a nuclear power plant from Washington... This is not the first time that the U.S. has refused to provide nuclear technology to us.... Indian designs against our sovereignty are not hidden from anyone and it is also a fact that U.S. is supporting Indian designs by signing a civil nuclear deal with it and by stockpiling latest nuclear weapons in its backyard. "President Obama has called a Nuclear Security Summit in Washington in April (12-13) this year and more than 40 heads of state are expected to attend. This is follow-on from Obama's Prague speech of April 5 in which he outlined his arms control and nuclear nonproliferation objectives with nuclear terrorism topping the list. Editorial: Rebuilding of Our NATO Damaged Infrastructure, an editorial in the Islamabad-based rightist English daily "Pakistan Observer" (cir. 5,000) (03/03)

"Prime Minister Syed Yousuf Raza Gilani has said that the United States was ready to rebuild the roads damaged due to transit of goods for NATO forces in Afghanistan. Talking to media the Prime Minister said that he had raised the issue with U.S. CENTCOM Commander General David Petraeus during his recent visit and the latter expressed willingness to provide necessary support for the purpose.... With the deployment of more U.S. and NATO troops in Afghanistan, pressure on roads for additional supplies would increase. It is therefore time that the Government must pursue the issue of reconstruction of damaged roads and bridges with the United States at all forums so as to take up the task on a priority basis and restore the damaged roads. In case there is no firm commitment, Pakistan must tell U.S. in categorical terms to find alternative routes for supplies to Afghanistan."

"It is unfortunate that matters have come to such a pass that the lackadaisical attitude displayed by Pakistani officialdom does not take anyone by surprise. But when this approach puts lives at risk then those guilty of inaction must be taken to task.... The jackets - worth more than \$2m and gifted by the U.S. government - have been sitting in a warehouse in Islamabad airport for the last two months.... The relevant federal and provincial government departments must speed up their efforts to have the jackets released and delivered. NWFP policemen are targeted on a regular basis, and it is lamentable that the authorities should not be delivering safety gear to them."

Editorial: Presence of Blackwater: Tell The Truth To The Nation, an editorial in the Peshawar-based Urdu-language daily "Mashriq" (cir. 55,000) (03/03)

"Despite the repeated denials from the government that Blackwater is not operating in Pakistan, credible media reports have revealed that one of the three American soldiers killed in Timegarah terrorist attack was a member of this infamous security agency and was involved in training the Frontier Corps personnel. But the question arises that if the U.S. army or private agencies are imparting training to our security forces why did the rulers shy away from telling the truth to the masses? Such secret deals serve no purpose other than creating mistrust between people and the government. We hope that the elected government will avoid further complicating this issue and tell the exact number of the Blackwater agents in Pakistan and the real objectives of their arrival in the country."

Editorial: Dr. Aafia's Birthday, an editorial in the second-largest, nationalist Urdu daily "Nawa-i-Waqt" (cir. 150,000) (03/03)

"Yesterday, the 38th birthday of innocent Dr. Aafia Siddiqi imprisoned in the U.S. was celebrated across the country. The purpose of the celebrations was to express solidarity with her. There have been demonstrations for Dr. Aafia's release across the world including Europe and the U.S. but have had no effect on the U.S. administration. Perhaps it is also not possible that the U.S. would release Aafia due to these demonstrations; but her release is not only possible, it is also certain if only the Pakistan government tries.... If the government tried in earnest, the U.S. which relies on Pakistan for the war on terror - cannot turn down the demand for Dr. Aafia's release."

Editorial: Miles To Go, an editorial in the populist, often sensational national English daily "The News" (cir. 55,000) (03/03)

"The Indian visit to Saudi Arabia is another marker along the road of an emerging regional superpower which needs to get the best from its relationships with other states in the region. The Saudis for their part see a harmonious relationship with India as both desirable and profitable, and for the time being are willing to live with the paradox of India restocking its arsenals by buying Israeli weaponry. Saudi Arabia is already established as the key broker with a range of Muslim states; but the Indians were keen to play down the idea that Saudi Arabia would be acting as a mediator in the various areas of conflict that lie between us. However it is nuanced or phrased, a different path is now being trod."

"Following the Reagan strategy against Russia to raise defence

Pakistan, with a regressing economy, cannot keep up with Indian defence outlays even on proportional basis. Therefore, Pakistan has no choice but to detract and pull India back through other means. Pakistan's strategy has not worked very well because, despite the Kashmir issue, India has grown steadily. Probably, Pakistan's military leadership is aware of its unsuccessful strategy and, therefore, trying to strengthen the state institutions to match Indian economic growth. However, it cannot let go of instruments developed to keep India distracted."

Opinion: Pakistan's New Left, an op-ed by Muhammad Ali Siddiqi in the Karachi-based center-left independent national English daily "Dawn" (cir. 55,000) (03/03)

"The formation last week of a new alliance of progressive parties in Islamabad must arouse interest in us all.... The issue now is: how does the new party - the Workers Party Pakistan (WPP) - create space for itself in the situation now obtaining in Pakistan? Is it going to revive the time-worn and hackneyed phrases which have outlived their utility or is it going to come out with something new and original that has a meaning for the people of Pakistan? Just as his 'New Left' in the post-Thatcher era secured Tony Blair three unprecedented terms as Labor Prime Minister, so too does the WPP have a chance now to craft a new 'ideology' suited to the changed national and international situation. Some pitfalls must be avoided, the first of them being the temptation to jump on the anti-American

bandwagon. Anti-Americanism is not going to get Pakistan's New Left anywhere. Denouncing America in a most impressive manner is being done quite adequately by the Islamist forces, which have the support of such men as Oxford graduate Imran Khan and a strategist like Islami Jamhoori Ittehad founder Hameed Gul."
