SUBJECT: PAKISTAN MEDIA REACTION: JUNE 11, 2010

Summary: The coverage of the Supreme Court's hearing of cases against the 18th Constitutional Amendment and the National Reconciliation Ordinance (NRO) review petition dominated headlines in all major newspapers on Friday morning. The second round of the U.S.-Pakistan Strategic Dialogue in Islamabad remained a dominant theme in both electronic and print news stories. Newspapers reported that the United States and Pakistan have agreed "to bridge the trust deficit." "The Nation," in a front-page article, claimed the "U.S. fails to address Pakistan's concern about India." Pakistan's Foreign Office Spokesman Abdul Basit's remarks that "the UN sanctions would not affect the \$7.6 billion Iran-Pakistan gas

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pipeline project" were carried in semical Assistance. The Amnesty International's latest report, which stated that "nearly four million Pakistanis live under Taliban rule in the tribal belt, where they suffer human rights abuses from both militants and the army," received extensive coverage. Reports that a Pakistani-American has been sentenced to 15 years in prison on charges of helping an Al Qaeda conduit while living in London in 2004 also received prominent coverage. A bomb blast in Karachi that killed a Pakistan Naval Policeman also made headlines. According to media reports, "Lashkar-e-Balochistan," a nationalist radical Baloch group, claimed responsibility for the explosion in Karachi. A suspected U.S. drone strike in North Waziristan that reportedly killed three people was also covered in all dailies.

All newspapers wrote editorial comments on the latest UN sanctions on Iran. In its editorial titled, "More sanctions," "Dawn" wrote "President Obama will lose the goodwill of many," and "the American move is being seen as having come as a result of pressure from the Israel lobby and the big arms manufacturers who want to see Iran defanged. " "Daily Times, " in its article "Sanctions on Iran," noted that "It was hoped that the Obama administration would approach the Iran issue differently than his predecessor and send out a message of reconciliation, rather than confrontation, to the world. The UN Security Council Resolution has belied all those hopes." "The Nation," in the editorial "Targeting Muslim Iran," observed that "In fact the U.S. approach towards Iran accentuates the anti-Muslim-state bias underlying U.S. and EU nuclear policies." The mass-circulated Urdu daily, "Jang," in its opinion piece titled "Pak-Iran Gas Pipeline Project May Also Be Affected," argued "The new sanctions imposed on Tehran will also affect the recently-signed Pak-Iran Gas Pipeline project. Under the new circumstances, no international donor agency will be ready to give loans to Pakistan to complete this project." End Summary.
