Summary: Coverage of the Nuclear Security Summit continued to dominate front pages of all newspapers on Tuesday morning. President Obama's remarks that the "U.S. has no sinister designs on Pakistan nuclear program," and that PM Gilani has "increased in his stature" received prominent display. All newspapers highlighted Prime Minister Gilani's assurance that "Pakistan nuclear assets are in fully secure," and that "had Osama Bin Laden hidden in the tribal areas bordering with Afghanistan, he would have been killed in the massive military operation by Pakistan." Likewise media also reported that "Pakistan seeks non-discriminatory access to civilian nuclear technology" and that President Obama has agreed to visit Pakistan in the near future. report that Pakistan is gearing to expand Architech of nuclear weapons-grade fuel and blocking talks on a treaty that would halt global production of nuclear material. "The News," observed in its editorial titled, "Nuclear knots," that "America would not have shifted position on a matter as fundamental as nuclear security unless it was satisfied that we were walking the walk and not just talking the talk." Commenting on the footage of a woman being flogged in Swat, "Pakistan Observer," noted that it was "an act engineered by a Non Governmental Organization (NGO) funded by a foreign country," and the "objective was to malign Pakistan, Islam and Taliban and a bid to build up public opinion against Taliban and for creating necessary justification for action against them." On the domestic front, both electronic and print media reported that at least seven people were killed when protesters demonstrating against renaming the NWFP as Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa clashed with police in Abbottabad.
