SUBJECT: SUBJECT: PAKISTAN MEDIA REACTION: December 16, 2008

SUMMARY: Prime Minister Gilani's statement that "Pakistan was ready to handle security threats" dominated headlines in all newspapers on Tuesday. All newspapers also gave front page coverage to Senator Kerry's engagements in New Delhi and his meeting with Pakistani officials. Newspapers highlighted that "Senator Kerry put fresh pressure on Pakistan saying its powerful spy agency must be brought under control." Newspapers gave prominent coverage to a U.S. news channel report quoting U.S. military officials statement that "India was ready for air strike on Pakistan" after the Mumbai attacks. Reports on U.S. missile attack in Miramshah "killing two militants" figured prominently. The signing of a "military cooperation pact between China and Pakistan" received wide coverage. Reports and photographs of Ambassador Patterson's meeting with former Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif received prominent display. Newspapers quoted.

Ambassador Patterson as saying that UNE UASS WEST Concerned over tension between Pakistan and India but it would play its role to defuse tension between the two countries."

Most major dailies continued to run editorials on the growing tensions between Pakistan and India. The national English daily, "Dawn," noted that "another Indo-Pakistan war will destabilize South Asia. This is exactly what the terrorists opposed to the now suspended normalization process want." English daily, "The News," said that "there are obvious concerns to world powers, given the nuclear status of both Pakistan and India. In recent months, the U.S. and the UK seem to be playing a good guy, bad guy' role." The leading Urdu daily, "Jang" noted that "seeing the serious charges leveled by India, the U.S., Britain and most of the western circles, we will have to rethink why no country in the world is ready to believe Pakistan's position and why everyone is blindly supporting India." 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13. "Maintaining Sanity," an editorial in the Karachi-based center-left independent national English daily "Dawn" (cir. 55,000) (12/16)

"Another Indo-Pakistan war will destabilize South Asia. This is exactly what the terrorists opposed to the now suspended normalization process want. The British prime minister asserted what the media - and not just in India - tends to forget: Pakistan was one of the worst victims of terrorism having suffered 50 suicide attacks last year. Mr. Brown's was the second high-profile visit by a western diplomat in recent days, and he echoed the sentiments Condoleezza Rice had expressed during her visit to Islamabad and New Delhi. Both believed that the Mumbai terrorists had links with elements in this country, but both also made it clear that Pakistan had pledged to continue to combat terrorism. Islamabad has committed 100,000 troops to the operation against the Taliban, and it would be a pity if the hawks in India were allowed to create a situation that would distract Islamabad from its anti-terrorist operations in Fata."

14. "Unity Against Terror," an editorial in the centrist national English daily "The News" (cir. 55,000) (12/16)

"The international pressure Pakistan has come under since the terrorists struck Mumbai continues to grow. These are obvious concerns to world powers, given the nuclear status of both Pakistan and India. In recent months, it has also been noted that the US and the UK, in that tactic much favored by interrogators everywhere, seem to be playing a 'good guy, bad guy' role. Generally, Washington takes the tougher line, London a more conciliatory one. This time too, Brown has spoken of the need to forge an international front against terror and offered a new pact for this purpose between Pakistan and Britain. The offer makes sense. Given that the increasingly radicalized Muslims based in the UK seem to have established direct links with extremist organizations in Pakistan, such a partnership could bring dividends for both nations."

15. "Pakistan Defends Airspace Violation," an editorial in the Islamabad-based rightist English daily "Pakistan Observer" (cir. 5,000) (12/16)

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"Though President Zardari denied that he was pursuing a policy of appeasement but it is a fact that the apologetic posture adopted by our leadership is encouraging India to indulge in more provocative acts that amount to humiliating the country. Already the situation is very serious with British Prime Minister Gordon Brown hurling threats on Pakistan and that too inside the premises of Aiwan-e-Sadr, forgetting the norms a visitor or guest is expected to observe. Brown was angry because of killing of three British nationals in Mumbai but easily overlooked the fact that Pakistan has lost thousands of its people in the so-called war on terror and in efforts to provide shield to American and British occupation troops in Afghanistan. And in return he is very proudly offering a hefty amount of 6 million pounds - what a shame! It is absolutely clear that the United States, United Kingdom and India have formed a triangle to strangulate Pakistan and the answer lies in national unity and not in burying our heads in the sand."

"Whether or not the world community is pressuring us, we must clean up our own house and eliminate the terrorists. While the operation against the militant groups must be a sustained process, we must also ask the world community to fulfill its responsibility by ensuring the early repatriation of 2.5 million Afghan refugees in Pakistan. Coalition forces in Afghanistan must create conditions for their settlement as equal citizens in their homeland. This is necessary because refugee settlements provide the best sanctuary for

the militants. This is a failure of the interpolation community which accuses Pakistan of harboring the terrorists."

18. "Prosecuting Pakistan's "terrorists," an editorial in the Lahore-based liberal English language daily "Daily Times" (cir. 10.000) (12/16)

"Pakistan's request for justifiable evidence to India gets lost in the understandable fury of the media and the Indian common man who is influenced by the media. The politicians are also not too willing to pay heed to Pakistan's request possibly because of the coming elections in India. But if Pakistan has to move, it must do so under its laws. There is no martial law in Pakistan and the constitution is fully in operation."

"Externally, if the civilian government in Pakistan is perceived as weaker than the military, the hawks in India will reap the benefit. "The sanctions have been clamped down on Jamaat-ud-Dawa (JUD) which has been included in a list of entities subject to an assets freeze, travel ban and arms embargo. The UNSC committee members have endorsed the Indian standpoint according to which JuD is a new front for the Laskhar-e-Taliba (LeT) which allegedly masterminded the November 26 Mumbai siege that killed more a number of people. The question, of course, is not that the decrying or defying the sanctions. Pakistan has rather acted swiftly to implement the sanctions and detained a number of JuD activists. What is more Pakistan's Ambassador to the UN, Abdullah Hussain Haroon, had told the Security Council even a day before the sanctions that his country would take action against the JuD, including freezing its assets, if it was designated a terrorist organization by the UN."

"In a remarkably lucid 45-minute interview with journalist Tom Brokaw on the popular news program, Meet the Press, president-elect Obama covered a number of areas where MCL ASSINGLED tion would get deeply involved the moment it was sworn into office. South Asia is one of them. President Bush looked at the countries of this region from the perspective of two of his concerns. His preoccupation with terrorism had him focus on Pakistan. And his concern about rising China was the main reason for his efforts to develop a close relationship with India. Obama promises a different kind of engagement with South Asia. Islamabad would do well to prepare itself for the new dialogue with Washington."
