SUBJECT: PAKISTAN MEDIA REACTION: JULY 29, 2008

SUMMARY: President Bush's assurance to Prime Minister Gilani at the White House that the United States respects Pakistan sovereignty dominated front pages in all newspapers on Tuesday. The joint communiqu reaffirming the commitment of the United States and Pakistan to foster long-term strategic partnership also figured prominently. All newspapers ran front-page photographs of the meeting of the two leaders. Pegged to it were reports that a U.S. missile attack on South Waziristan killed six people, including an Al Qaeda weapons expert. The expression of concern by Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Committee Gen. Majid over repeated cross-border missile attacks during his meeting with acting U.S. CENTCOM chief Lt. Gen. Dempsey was also highlighted by all newspapers.

Most major dailies ran in-depth editages In Italian threats warning of more suicide attacks in Pakistan. The second-largest Urdu daily, "Nawa-i-Waqt," noted that the present government was pushing the country and its people toward lawlessness, terrorism, and suicide attacks by continuing with the military operation in the tribal areas. The English daily "The News" observed that it is obviously pointless to engage in dialogue with a man like Maulana Fazlullah, and that such people must be treated as the criminals they are and not permitted to hide behind the convenient mask of religious belief. Another English daily, "The Nation," noted that the militants in general and the Taliban in particular have become too provocative to be ignored by the government, which has been trying to hammer out a solution at the conference table. 16. "CIA Activities On Pakistani Soil And National Security," an editorial in the second-largest, center-right nationalist Urdu daily "Nawa-i-Waqt" (cir. 125,000) (07/29)

"According to a Los Angeles Times report, there are 200 CIA agents stationed in Pakistan and this is the second biggest CIA operation after Iraq.... General (retired) Pervez Musharraf was not bothered about American secret service personnel coming into Pakistan and harming our national interests. However, this democratically elected government does not have any compulsion to continue the past policy. Hence the government should direct the agents' departure from the country. We should look into the possibility of suicide attackers and terrorists having been trained by these CIA agents."

17. "Hazards Of Impatience," an editorial in the center-right national English daily "The Nation" (cir. 20,000) (07/29)

"PM Gilani faces a hard task explaining his government's policy on terrorism to an impatient Bush administration looking for quick fixes. The U.S. leadership needs to be told that reliance on brute force alone tends to strengthen militants and spread their influence. What the elected government is trying to do now is to control it through a multi-pronged policy that is endorsed by the coalition partners and enjoys wide public support."

"Another reservation the Pakistani nation has about the United States is that it does not let democracy prosper in the country, and that military rulers suit the United States. President Musharraf's retention as president even after the Tebras IFI EDections is also seen as continuation of U.S. policies.... Hence the United States should fulfill the promises it has made during the PM's trip to the U.S. Firstly, tension on the Pak-Afghan border should actually be removed; and secondly the U.S. should give solid support to Pakistan to fight terrorism."

- 20. "Terrorist Threats," an editorial in the centrist national English daily "The News" (cir. 55,000) (07/29)
- "Fazlullah is a man who has been known in the past to roam the Swat area on horseback, wielding a sword, as people handed over money and jewellery to him. Such acts of extortion are well-known in the area. The blackmailing of authorities too is not new. It is obviously pointless to engage in dialogue with such men. They must be treated as the criminals that they are and not permitted to hide behind the convenient mask of religious belief."
- 21. "Sabre-Rattling," an editorial in the center-right national English daily "The Nation" (cir. 20,000) (07/29)
- "The militants in general and the TTP in particular have become too provocative to be ignored by the government, which has been trying to hammer out a solution of the conflict at the conference table, something it remains committed to do but, unfortunately, the Taliban behavior inspires anything but confidence.... But the TTP should know that no govt. worth the name would get intimidated by such tactics."
- 22. "Suicide Attacks Threat By Tehrik-i-Taliban," an editorial in the second-largest, center-right nationalist Urdu daily "Nawa-i-Waqt" (cir. 125,000) (07/29)
- "TTP leader Maulana Fazlullah has threatened suicide attacks in the event of a military operation in Swat... The present elected rulers are also pushing the country and its people toward lawlessness, terrorism, and suicide attacks by continuing with the military operation in the tribal areas. It is also inappropriate for Maulana Fazal Ullah to adopt a threatening tone; he is admitting that he was involved in suicide attacks in the past."
- 23. "The Taliban Jitters," an editorial in the Lahore-based liberal English language daily "Daily Times" (cir. 10,000) (07/29)
- "Pakistan has the military capability to confront the menace but its army doesn't want to risk taking on the warlords when the elected politicians are not fully willing to endorse military action....

 The Taliban have been in total control of FATA for almost a decade. Peshawar will be the jewel in their crown. And if Peshawar goes, the rest of Pakistan would not be far away."

24. "Drone Attack," an editorial in the centrist national English daily "The News" (cir. 55,000) (07/29)

"Yet there appear to be no reports of Pakistani aircraft intercepting or engaging and destroying any of the RPVs that daily intrude upon us. The inescapable conclusion is that nobody ordered them to do so, and the equally inescapable conclusion is that somebody in the Pakistani government decided to turn a blind eye, and decided perhaps that they would allow the drones to operate and strike at will."

25. "An Ominous Mission," an editorial in the center-right national English daily "The Nation" (cir. 20,000) (07/29)

"Operations that the American airplanes have launched on several occasions to hit the so-called terrorist hideouts but, in fact, resulted in killing innocent people, have already created intense ill will among the local population. This will constitute another provocation to the tribesmen to take revenge. The vicious cycle cannot be broken with the presence of CIA operatives in the country nor by indiscriminate attacks."

26. "War On Terror & Census," an op-ed by Nasser Yousaf in the Karachi-based center-left independent national English daily "Dawn" (cir. 55,000) (07/29)

"The present situation is not a temporary phenomenon and calls for a long-term strategy to deal with the fallout of the war. The enemy will keep reappearing after every drubbing it receives....

According to some estimates there are over 10,000 foreigners actively engaged in militancy. How could such a large number evade the prying eyes of the pursuing agencies if the pursuit is earnest? The areas adjoining the line (Durand Line) are no longer manageable even with the help of state-of-the-art satellite surveillance. "Nearly everyone among the masses hates America these days; particularly the Muslim states are annoyed with this country very much. But the question is whether it is possible for us to confront a superpower with sheer public gatherings, protest demonstrations, empty slogans, emotional rhetoric, or abusing it in public. The Americans have a very long history of struggle to win independence and self-rule, and entrusting autonomy to their states (federating

28. "Role Of ISI In National Defense And Integrity," an editorial in the popular rightist Urdu-language daily "Ausaf" (cir. 10,000) (07/29)

"ISI is a big challenge. Pakistan's enemies, particularly India and Israel, are sick of this intelligence agency. Now it is being said that the United States also wants to curtail ISI's role, and to put it under the Ministry of Interior. Perhaps that is why some people opined that this step was taken at the U.S. behest, but the Pakistan Army reacted very sharply. Nevertheless, it is imperative to discuss the alleged political role of ISI, but the Parliament is the most appropriate forum for this debate."

29. "Failure Of Intelligence," an editorial in the Karachi-based center-left independent national English daily "Dawn" (cir. 55,000) (07/29)

"There is no doubt about the need to bring it (ISI) under civilian control urgently; however, clandestine, surprise moves of the kind attempted by the government on Saturday only backfire and further undermine the government's authority. The humiliating back-pedaling of the government has also cemented its reputation for lurching from crisis to crisis, many of them self-made... Missteps and errors are to be expected, especially from a political class that has never been allowed to be comfortable in power. Yet such grave and elementary errors of judgment suggest that the government is not learning from the mistakes of the past. This does not bode well for the transition to democracy."

30. "ISI: There Are Still Some Unanswered Questions," an editorial in the Islamabad-based rightist English daily "Pakistan Observer" (cir. 5,000) (07/29)

"The highly controversial decision of the Government, which has now been reversed, to place ISI under the control of the Interior Ministry evoked universal condemnation and as evident from the reaction reported by media, it shocked every section of the society.... Had the decision been taken at the behest of someone outside the Government? Why necessary homework was not done before announcing a major decision? What is all the more important is the timing of the move as it coincides with the visit of Prime Minister Gilani to the United States and his meeting with President Bush at the Oval Office. 31. "Oh God, What Is This Circus?," an editorial in the center-right Urdu daily "Pakistan" (cir. 10,000) (07/29)

"The issuance of [ISI-IB] notification and its withdrawal show that there is more than one power center and there are governments within the government. What necessitated the issuance of the order exactly at the time when the Prime Minister was to embark on an official U.S. visit, and what was the objective of the order? According to one speculation, this attempt to change the internal functioning of the ISI was a result of U.S. pressure."

32. "Controversial Notification On ISI: Army Spokesman Clarified The Situation," an editorial in the liberal Urdu daily "Express" (cir. 25,000) (07/29)

"The government has made a grave mistake, but withdrawal of the notification should not be considered a defeat. There has been severe criticism of the government's step at home and it does not seem to be ending...."

33. "Afia Siddiqui, Prisoner Number 650" an editorial in the second-largest, center-right nationalist Urdu daily "Nawa-i-Waqt" (cir. 125,000) (07/29)

"Afia Siddiqui was abducted four and a half years ago while she was traveling in a train from Karachi. Her crime was the same as thousands of other Muslims who handed over to the U.S. custody and President Musharraf talked of getting billions of dollars in return. Majority of them are rotting in the U.S.-controlled notorious torture camp at Guantanamo Bay. Before the nation takes to the streets with the issue, the government should play it fullest role for the release of Afia Siddiqui."
