SUBJECT: PAKISTAN MEDIA REACTION: MAY 17-19, 2008

SUMMARY: Reports and photographs of President Bush and Prime Minister Gilani meeting at Sharm El-Sheikh (Egypt) dominated front pages in all newspapers on Monday. All newspapers quoted President Bush saying that "Kashmir issue is ripe for solution." Also highlighted were reports that the "U.S. president assured to offer another economic package to Pakistan to help fight poverty." Afgham President Hamid Karzai's statement made during his meeting with Prime Minister Gilani that "the newly elected Pakistan government would put up a joint fight against terrorists and extremists in the region" also received prominent coverage. Also front-paged were reports that a "suicide attack on a military-run bakery in Mardan killed 12 including four soldiers." Reports on the alleged desecration of Holy Quran by an American soldier in Iraq and

subsequent apologies by U.S. milital Molman State were also highlighted in all newspapers. All newspapers also ran a "Washington Post" story quoting a Pakistani Presidential spokesman as saying that "President Musharraf may quit when situation stabilizes."

Some major dailies ran editorials on the Pak-U.S. relations in the light of Ambassador Patterson's recent meeting with Prime Minister Gilani. Other newspapers commented on the recovery of kidnapped Pakistani Ambassador to Afghanistan. The English daily, "Dawn," noted that "it has long been known that much of the aid offered by western countries never reaches the people who need it the most. Just as American taxpayers have a right to know how their dollars are spent overseas, the Pakistani public expects the government to routinely provide a detailed breakdown of all expenses met through foreign aid." Another English newspaper, "Daily Times," observed that "after 60 years of a hostile mindset against the U.S., India has proceeded smoothly in mending and expanding its relations with the U.S. Each nation consults its advantage while formulating foreign policy. Pakistan too must continue to do that." The Urdu daily, "Jang," wrote: "The new government must make it clear to Washington that Pakistan has gained less, and lost much in its blind pursuit of the U.S.-led war on terror. Moreover, if the U.S. doesn't respect Pakistan's independence and sovereignty, Pakistan should part its way with the U.S. immediately." Another Urdu daily, "Islam," noted that "the Government has definitely come across some unusual ground realities during its efforts to broker release of Ambassador Tariq Azizuddin from militants. Now, it must work out its national security policy in the light of those ground realities and try to settle other issues as well through peaceful means." End Summary.
