SUBJECT: MEDIA SUMMARY: NOVEMBER 03[J] MODE ASSIFIED

SUMMARY: Remarks of various leaders of religious parties' alliance implicating U.S. in the Bajaur incident figure prominently in the Pakistani newspapers on Friday (paras 4-5). While the government glibly contested the veracity of the allegation (para 3), a number of newspapers also report government's intention to take the country's parliament into confidence on this incident, which killed over 80 people (para 2).

A commentator in the centrist national English daily "The News" writes: "I may be wrong but I cannot believe that the Pakistan Army would kill in cold blood so many of its own people which included young children." (para 12). In its editorial on the incident Urdu daily "Mashriq" pointed out that Bajaur incident has left no other option for the extremists than to carry on their activities with more dedication (para 14). 1. "Jaswant Says India Has To Live With US-Pakistan Ties" "Dawn" (cir. 55,000) (11/03)

"India will have to live with the fact that the US will continue to rely on Pakistan as a key ally in the war against terror, says India's former Minister for External Affairs Jaswant Singh. "The US has no option but to continue its policy towards Pakistan and therefore India would have to continue to pay a price," Mr. Singh told a meeting in Washington on Wednesday. Mr. Singh opposed Washington's efforts to act as an "external equalizer" in South Asia and urged the US to leave the region alone."

2. "Info On Bajaur To Be Made Public: PM" "The Nation" (cir. 20,000) (11/03)

"Prime Minister Shaukat Aziz on Thursday talking to newsmen said that the government is collecting more information regarding Bajaur operation and the same would be made public."

3. "Seminary Was Training Suicide Bombers: Sultan" "The News" (cir. 55,000) (11/03)

"Director General Inter Services Public Relations Major General Shaukat Sultan said the Madarassa in Bajaur was imparting suicide attack training and the Madarassa administration was warned before the operation to stop its activities. While talking to a private channel on Thursday, ISPR GD said prior to bombing the Madarassa its administration was warned to stop its activities but it did not pay

heed to the warnings and continued in articles of Figure training."

4. "Government Covering For US Military Action In Bajaur: APC" "Dawn" (cir. 55,000) (11/03)

"The Deputy Chief of the Jamaat-e-Islami, Professor Ghafoor Ahmed, said that the killing of 83 people in the recent bombing on a seminary in Bajaur was one of the saddest chapters in the history of Pakistan through which the rulers had appeared their masters in Washington."

5. "Army Carried Out Dummy Attack After US Air Strikes: MNA" "The Post" (cir. 5,000) (11/03)

"Ameer Jamaat-e-Islami, Bajaur Agency Haroonur Rashid on Thursday alleged that Pakistan Army only showcased a dummy military action on a seminary after American drone planes hit a Madarassa with missiles that killed over 83 innocent students including three teachers.

'Pak army flew helicopters at the outskirts of the area after 20

minutes of US air strikes and carried out a dummy bombardment creating an impression that the seminary was being used as training camp for terrorist activities, Haroonur Rashid told a news conference."

6. "Camera Crew Filming With US Army Injured" "The News" (cir. 55,000) (11/03)

"Two crew members of the National Geographic television channel who were injured in a landmine explosion targeting US troops in Afghanistan have been flown out to Germany and the US to receive advanced medical treatment."

7. "US 'Spy' Killed In Bajaur" "The News" (cir. 55,000) (11/03)

"A tribesman found dead in Bajaur Agency was suspected by militants to be a spy for the US military. Jan Mohammad, in his mid-40s, was allegedly killed by unknown militants on October 30, the day a seminary in Chingai village in Mamond area of Bajaur was hit by aerial strikes and 80 of its inmates were killed."

8. "State Department Talks Of A Lame Duck Bush" "The News" (cir. 55,000) (11/03)

"The State Department has joined many independent think tanks and polling organizations in discussing the chances of President George Bush becoming a lame-duck president after the November 7 polls, just five days away. The Washington File, an important component of the State Department web site, which records all government activity on a daily basis, interviewed several experts to discuss the election

prospects and quoted these experts by thanks of Italian becoming a lame duck president."

9. "US To Deploy Inspectors At Pakistani Ports" "Daily Times" (cir. 10,000) (11/03)

"The United States will soon deploy inspectors at Pakistani ports and airports to monitor passengers and cargo ships in a bid to prevent terrorist attacks on the country in future, a customs clearing agent on Thursday quoted senior Export Promotion Bureau (EPB) officials as saying during a briefing about new measures relating to shipments from Pakistan to the US."
