DOs and DON'Ts Pitfalls

- 1. Never "trust" a criminal.
- 1. There are no secrets, everything will come out in its worst possible light.
- 3. In attempting to secure cooperation, do not give away the farm when a daisy will do.
- 4. Never give away a big fish to get a little one.
- 5. Don't make a deal with the ultimate devil. Some criminals should be dealt with as the end of the line no matter what they can do for you.
- 6. Do not let the informant control you: Do not become the "juice man."
- 7. Use informants primarily to develop additional incriminating evidence that does not require their testimony. Calling a codefendant to the stand might actually make your case worse!
- 8. Do not let paralegals and amateurs near your informant witnesses. Amateur managers will say and do things that will ruin your case.
- 9. Watch out for the "represented persons" rule.
- 10. Don't invade "the defense camp" when you debrief a codefendant.
- 11. Don't make a mistake with the polygraph.
- 12. Jail house informants are inherently unreliable and make terrible witnesses.

- 13. Don't be stingy on discovery of material that weighs on an informant's credibility <u>everything</u> goes. Live up to your <u>Kyles v.Whitley</u> duty.
- 14. Your rough notes of a conversation with an informant, and those of the agents, are probably discoverable.
- 15. Do not contaminate an informant in debriefing with "key" inside information.
- 16. Do not be timid in testing the informant's story.
- 17. Include on direct everything that might impeach your witness on cross.
- 18. Expect the worst on cross.
- 19. Don't let the Witsec subsistence payment kill you on cross as "a bribe."
- 20. Protect yourself against turncoat behavior.
- 21. Jurors hate informants, don't believe otherwise.
- 22. A jury will not rely on the word of an informant without corroboration.
- 23. Figure out why the jury can believe your informant witness. Get your jury arguments ready long before voir dire.
- 24. <u>Never</u> compromise your integrity, your office, or the ideals of justice.
- 25. If trouble arises, handle it fast, and handle it well. Otherwise, it will be turned against you!
